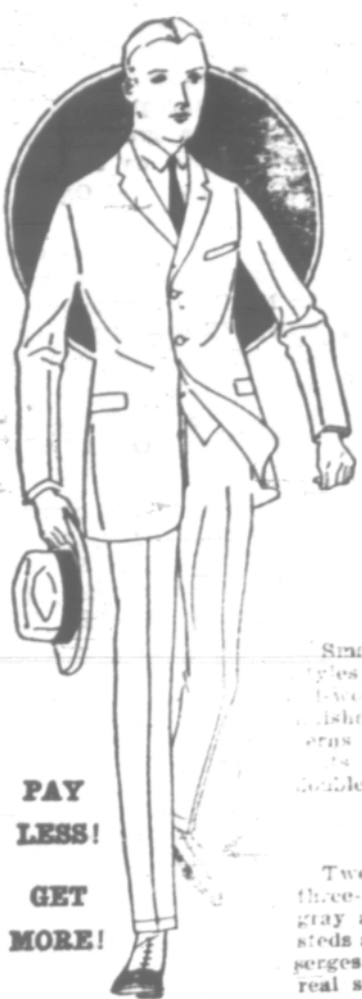

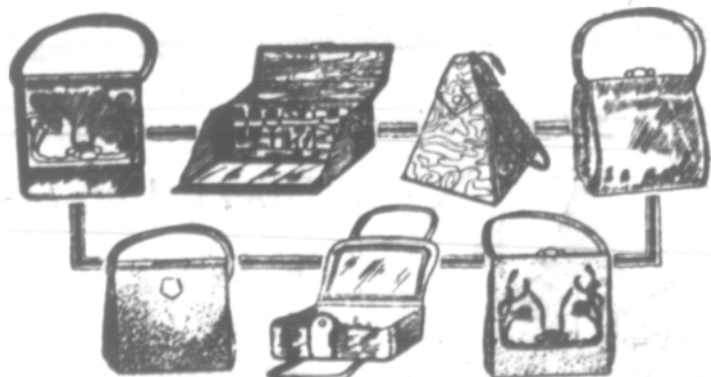

### Wallace May Completes Junior Work

Wallace L. May, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. D. May of Moro, has completed the junior requirement of his farm management major in the school of agriculture. He is a member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity, farm management club, treasurer of the field artillery club, and agricultural club.

Mr. May's major course deals with the organization, equipment, and operation of the farm as a business enterprise. The courses in farm management are designed to give the student a broad, well-rounded training in all the phases of agriculture that will prepare him for successful production, with emphasis laid upon those studies which will fit him best for successful management of the farm. They also prepare students for professional work as farm managers, county agriculturists, extension specialists, farm appraisers, instructional and investigational workers and other work of similar nature.

### State Happenings of Note

Fire losses in Oregon outside of the city of Portland for the month of April aggregated \$150,575, according to a report prepared by the state fire marshal. There were a total of 36 fires reported. The most disastrous fire was at Elgin, where a warehouse burned with a loss of \$41,000.

More than \$1000 was netted as a result of the so-called Cherringo held in Salem. This money will be turned over to the committee in charge of the construction of Salem's new hospital. The event was staged by the Salem Cherrians and was attended by people from all parts of the Willamette valley.

Recommendations that a road up the North Umpqua river be sponsored by the government for the purpose of increasing the value of its range and grazing lands in the Ilabeo, Big Camas and Diamond lake districts will be contained in the range appraisal report being prepared by the forest service to submit to congress, according to D. C. Ingram, appraiser.

Officers charged with enforcement of the state anti-purse seine law, are planning to ask for a submarine chaser to patrol the coast to prevent violation of the law by purse seine fishermen operating within the three-mile limit. Reports have been received that a fleet of purse seiners from Washington is planning to come to the mouth of the Columbia river July 1.

H. M. Schilling, manager at Hermiton for the Umatilla project, has received instructions to begin on July 1 negotiations for the purchase of lands lying above the proposed McKay creek dam which will be inundated when the waters are impounded for irrigation purposes. It is understood that high prices will not be paid for the lands. The move to purchase is considered proof that the government expects to complete the McKay creek project as quickly as possible.

After a conference with Forester Greeley, Representative Hawley announced that three units of the Roosevelt highway in Oregon are to be constructed this summer through forest reserves. The first is from Tidewater bridge to Waldport, in Lincoln county, eight miles, at a cost of \$100,000. The second will be from Brush creek to Mussel creek, in Curry county, six miles, at a cost of \$150,000. The third, south of Neokwin, in Tillamook and Lincoln counties, 20 miles, will cost \$300,000.

A luten arch type steel and concrete bridge was selected by officers and directors of The Dalles-Oregon-Washington Toll Bridge company, meeting at The Dalles, for the span across the Columbia river three miles above The Dalles. The plan was one of three submitted by President Sears of the Union Bridge company. The complete working plans for the construction of the bridge will now be made, the financing campaign put over and the contract awarded probably this summer. It was decided at the meeting. All but three of the bridge spans will be of concrete. The longest span, of steel, will cover the main river channel, a distance of 267 feet. The total estimated cost is \$254,250.

That section of the Oregon coast between Neokwin, in Tillamook county, and the Siletz river, in Lincoln county, inaccessible save for hikers, is to be provided with a road, which will be a section of the Roosevelt highway. Final agreement on this was had at a meeting of the state highway commission in Portland. The Tillamook end has been disposed of, but Lincoln county officials explained that they had no bend money for the northern end, up to the Tillamook county line. If will cost above \$500,000 to construct the road and this cost Lincoln county will contribute \$150,000. The rest is to be provided by the state and the United States forest bureau. The work is to be on a continuing basis until completed.

After adopting several resolutions of importance, some of which caused spirited debate, the State Federation of Women's clubs adjourned at Tillamook. The more important resolutions adopted were: The attacks on the millage system for the state's institutions of higher learning should be frowned upon; commending Will H. Hays, high commissioner of motion pictures, for his attitude toward clean movies; endorsing the bill which proposes to give independent citizenship to immigrant women; protesting against the removal of tuberculosis patients among ex-service men from parts of Oregon to other states, and endorsing a proposed bill to remove property qualifications for the purpose of voting at school bond elections.

### Big Crowd at Sunday School Rally

The annual Sunday School Rally held at Grass Valley June 18th was well attended by more than 400 people. The morning hour of lesson study was very interesting and instructive to all who took part. A bountiful repast was served at 2:30, consisting of chicken, strawberries, cake, pie, and all that goes to make a Sherman county picnic dinner. This part of the program was well received by the large groups assembled under the beautiful trees of the Grass Valley park.

The afternoon program, beginning at 1:30, was given by nine Sunday schools of the county. This was well presented and enjoyed by all present. The attendance at the lesson study in the five great divisions totaled 335. The collection, amounting to \$22.56, was divided among each of the Sunday schools represented. The afternoon collection, amounting to \$4.86, was for the county Sunday school work, for which we thank the givers very much.

The officers and members of the association wish to extend their thanks and appreciation for the use of the Grass Valley park and auditorium and for many courtesies received.
