## LOCALS

### Happenings of Interest in The Old Home Community

The local Presbyterian church will observe the thirty-fifth anniversary of its organization at the morning service next Sunday, July 9th. All the bridges on the main line of the O-W. R. & N. Co. in Oregon have been placed under guard of special deputy sheriffs. Upon specification of the railway company, Sheriff Chrisman, Monday afternoon, swore in J. H. McCune, Chas. Man. and Will Chrisman as special guards for the bridge over the John Day river. The bridge at DesChutes is under jurisdiction of the Wasco county sheriff. Wages of the guards are paid by the railway company. The expense is incurred because of the strike of railway employees for higher wages.

The Sherman county wheat harvest is almost at hand. Many farmers have been waiting until after the Fourth to begin active cutting of right of ways and the usual hay harvest. Grain is maturing rapidly with the recent spell of hot weather, and calls for harvest hands have been coming in increasing numbers. A few harvesters will begin this week in the vicinity of Wasco to be followed by all outfits next week north of Gordon ridge. Harvest in Sherman county this year will follow the recognized schedule of being probably a week later at Moro than at Wasco and a week later south of Moro than at this place.

W. H. Williams has added two new appliances to his auto repair shop that will be of great benefit to his customers and, as he said, gives him a chance to do better and more satisfactory work. One appliance is a crank shaft truing machine. The other is a connecting rod and piston aligning machine. By the use of these machines Mr. Williams is able to align connecting rods and pistons exactly where they should be for perfect work in automobile engines. One of the machines this week showed a wrist pin opening to be wrong in the piston and saved the owner of a new car several dollars in a repair bill, which he would have had to pay just as soon as the ill-fitting piston had scored the cylinder block.
