The Roseburg city council has put into effect an emergency ordinance limiting the loads of trucks operating through the city to 400 pounds to each inch of tire width.

Valuation of imports in the Oregon district for five months ending with May, according to official tabulations, were \$3,194,347, as compared with \$1,406,846 for the first five months of 1921.

The average grade for all milk distributed within the city of Portland is as high as that specified by law for certified milk, according to Dr. D. W. Mack, chief dairy and milk inspector.

Men above the age of 15 years outnumber women in Portland above the same age by 5841, according to figures which have just been released by the department of commerce at Washington, D. C.

D. L. Hamilton, aged forty-two, died at Klamath Falls from injuries received when a logging truck upset, crushing his body and pinning him beneath a stream of boiling water from a burst radiator.

A statewide association of poultrymen probably will be organized at the national convention of instructors and investigators in poultry husbandry at the Oregon Agricultural college this month.

Because of the increasing distance between mills of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company of Bend and the logging camps, a new 50-ton Baldwin locomotive has been added to the company's transportation facilities.

Lack of cherry and berry pickers is hindering operations at the cannery of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, and may cause a loss of a great deal of fruit on account of allowing it to become too ripe.

Archie Blue, George and Herbert Ellsworth have returned from a home-stand hunt in the section south of Prineville. They found some land which they may file upon after harvest.

Fire destroyed the Model laundry, Washington hotel, and two Chinese stores in The Dalles Monday night. The hotel was located over the laundry. The loss amounts to \$75,000, partly covered by insurance.

The grade of the Cow canyon stretch of The Dalles-California highway has been completed west of Shaniko and is now being rock surfaced. The new grade extends a distance of nine miles from the Jefferson county line to about two miles past the top of the Cow canyon hill.

Miss Gwendolyn Reese accompanied Mrs. Reese's sister, Mrs. Elmo S. White, and party, on their return to Salem last Wednesday, following a brief visit at the Reese home east of Moro. Returning July 9th, Miss Reese was a guest of C. C. Richmond and mother on the drive up the highway.

C. P. Flegel has been appointed agent for the Eastern Oregon Land Co. for Sherman county in place of C. E. Johnson who has resigned to accept the position of cashier with the Bank of Moro. Mr. Flegel moves to Moro from Prairie City where he was agent for the E. O. L. Co.

J. N. Landry and family spent the Fourth at Blue Mountain hot spring, near Frairie City. He made the 200 mile drive from that place to Moro on his return in a short day. He said that the scenery along the John Day highway is grand and altogether different from any other part of Oregon that he has visited. The most wonderful sight to all in the party was the changing colors and formation of the rock palisades bordering the highway for miles.

The bureau of standards, department of commerce, at Washington, D. C. has issued a pamphlet containing complete instructions for the building of a radio receiving set. These instructions are well and clearly written, contain a list of all the parts necessary, together with their approximate cost, and are supplemented with several drawings. The manner in which the construction of the set is described should make it simple for any one. The pamphlet has been written especially for school children.

Presbyterian Church Anniversary

Thirty five years ago last Monday, July 10th, a committee from the Oregon Presbyterian, consisting of Rev. E. N. Condit, Rev. W. O. Forbes, and Elder T. W. Rutherford came to Moro and organized the First Presbyterian Church of Grass Valley. Nineteen members signed the roll, of whom just two are left on the roll, Mr and Mrs. James Woods. Eight others are still living, as far as is known, but have moved to other parts. At the same meeting Mr. O. W. Axtell, Mr. J. M. Black, and Mr. J. H. McLean were ordained and installed elders. Rev. J. M. Morrison, who had already been preaching in the community for some time, having visited the field the first time in November, 1885, became the first pastor of the church and remained as pastor for more than twelve years.

Next to the two charter members above, the oldest according to seniority are Mrs. Margaret McCallum, who united with the church about 34 years ago, and who has been in the Moro or Monkland churches every since. The next in order is Mrs. W. F. Jackson, who came into the church about 31 years ago. In 1892, or five years after the church was organized 13 members were dismissed to help organize the Monkland Presbyterian church, the starting of which took place on October 10th of that year.

The Moro and Monkland churches have always been joined in one charge and have had the following pastors:— Rev. J. M. Morrison 1887 to 1899, now living with his daughter in Portland.

Rev. S. C. Elder 1900 to 1904, now living near Grove City, Pennsylvania.

Rev. A. J. Adams 1904 to 1912, now in Oakland, or Los Angeles, Calif.

Rev. B. K. Moseley 1912-six months, now living at Durant, Oklahoma.

Rev. A. J. Adams 1913 to 1916, second pastorate.

Rev. B. Trueblood Smith 1917 to 1919, died in Portland in fall of 1919.

Rev. E. E. McVicker 1919 to 1921, now living at Gervais, Oregon.

Rev. Henry G. Hanson, Oct. 1st, 1921 to present time.

Greetings were read from Rev. S. C. Elder, Rev. E. E. McVicker, and Mrs. B. Trueblood Smith.

Rev. Henry G. Hanson spoke on "The Church Invisible," after which the Lord's Supper was celebrated.

The Moro church at present has 96 members on the roll, a Sunday school of 85, and last year handled about \$320.00 of which more than \$500 went for benevolent objects. The church owns half a block of city property on which is a comfortable church and parsonage, free from debt with the exception of \$800 and has an endowment of \$3000. A fine spirit is manifest in the church, and the people look into the future with anticipation for bigger things thru which to serve the community.

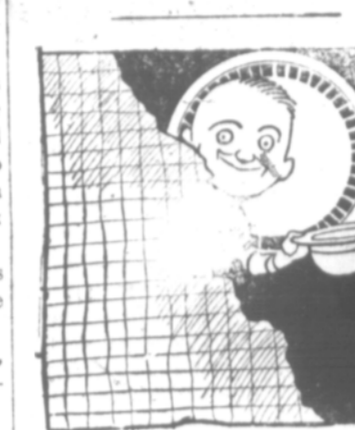

Attends Meeting of Synod

Rev. Henry G. Hanson, pastor of the Moro Presbyterian church, left Monday morning for Corvallis, Oregon, where he attended the annual meeting of the Synod of Oregon, July 10th to 14. Among the special attractions this year were an address by Dr. Calvin C. Hays of Johnstown, Pa., the new moderator of the General Assembly, and daily devotional lectures by Rev. Joseph A. Vance, D. D., of Detroit, Michigan.

After the close of the synod Mr. Hanson expects to take his vacation, visiting Santa Rosa, where he has a cousin, and San Francisco, Berkeley, Oakland, San Jose, and San Francisco Bay cities. He will be gone four Sundays, expecting to return for services on August 13th. In the meantime the Sunday School will hold its sessions at the usual time, and the union evening services and mid-week services will alternate between the two churches, Rev. U. C. Smothers doing the preaching.

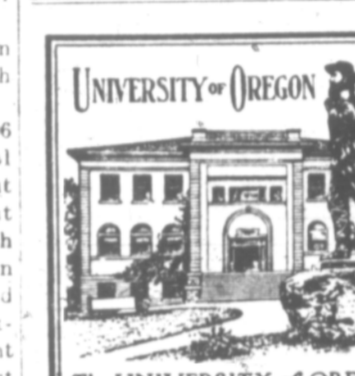
