electric motor at the city pumping
plant, necessitating the use of the old
gasoline engine while repairs were
being made to the motor.

Rev. Henry G. Hanson writes from
Portland that he will return from his
vacation this week in time for the
usual Sunday services at the Presby-
terian church on Sunday, the 13th.

F. E. Fortner has had the well on
his residence property deepened and
cleaned out. The supply of water is
abundant and will easily supply all
water necessary to irrigate his prop-
erty.

Luther Otto Miller of Sherman
county and Elmina Holland of Mult-
nomah county were married in Moro
on Tuesday, August 8th, Rev. U. C.
Smothers performing the ceremony,
in the presence of Olga Lahti and
J. M. Eddy as witnesses.

Part of the machinery for the new
drilled city well has arrived and it is
hoped that it will soon be installed.
The cost of the new well has been
provided for from this year's taxes
and very little, if any, will come from
the earnings of the water plant.

Tommy and Paul Fraser arrived
home last week from a six week's va-
cation spent in Portland and at the
beach. They were accompanied home
by their aunt, Mrs. E. R. Jones, who
will remain for a short visit with her
brother, Tom Fraser, and family.

A road laborer, working on new
gravel near Armstrong, B. C., picked
up several pretty pebbles. They later
proved to be gold nuggets. It is be-
lieved that the gravel came from a
municipally owned pit and the pros-
pectors are busy seeking the deposit.

Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Foss, accom-
panied by their daughter Margaret
and son Austin, went to Portland by
train Sunday, returning the next day
via the Columbia highway in a new
Studebaker special six. This was the
first time that Mr. and Mrs. Foss had
driven over the highway.

by members of his and his brother-in-
law's families that made a recent
tour of the Canadian Rockies. The
collection includes views of wild an-
imal life, Indian, camp and road scenes
and numerous views of the rugged
mountains through which the party
traveled.

Jay L. Saltzman, state traffic officer,
is back again in The Dalles, where
he is needed. The same use of high-
ways in Wasco county would be in-
creased by attention to the horse drawn
vehicles going east from The Dalles
at night without lights, and to the
parking of cars on the pavement while
visiting with pedestrians or when
changing tires.

The Dalles Chronicle has reserved
space on its front page for what it
terms its "daily automobile accident
story." Accidents are occurring at the
rate of two and three each day on the
highways near The Dalles, princi-
pally because courts all over the land
are licensing careless drivers by a
system of small fines, paid regularly,
to ignore all safe rules of the road.

Mrs. Catherine A. Burmester, aged
85 years, passed away on August 5th
at the home of her daughter, Mrs.
C. C. Deyo, at Rufus. Funeral ser-
vices were held at the Wasco Metho-
dist church, interment being in the
Wasco cemetery. Besides the daugh-
ter, Mrs. Deyo, two sons, Henry B.
Burmester, of Glenwood, Wisconsin,
and Herman Burmester of this city,
survive.

B. R. Thompson and son C. R. are
visiting in Moro from Pasadena, Cali-
fornia. They made the trip via auto,
stopping at Corvallis to visit with
relatives and at The Dalles to visit
with Mrs. A. Nish. Mr. Thompson's
sister, B. R. Thompson is a brother
to Mayor N. W. Thompson and to A. C.
Thompson, of this city. He lived and
farmed in the Monkland district about
twenty years ago.

Clarence Sparling had his left fore
arm badly injured Friday afternoon
while working on his combine east of
Moro. He was screwing down an oil
cup, his arm resting on the levelling
gears, when the header tender released
the lever to level the machine.
The gears started to move with safety
toward Mr. Sparling, but immedi-
ately they were reversed and his arm
was drawn into the gears, cutting a
slash four inches long, and to the
bone.

The record for warehouse handling
of grain by an individual in Sherman
county is held by W. S. Powell, in
charge of the Erskine F. & S. eleva-
tor for 1922. Tuesday he received 35
loads of wheat, aggregating 1800
sacks, for storage and loaded out a
hundred thousand pounds capacity car,
aggregating 775 sacks. This amount
of wheat handling, under the sack
system, would require five or six men,
but under the bulk system in use at
Erskine, machinery did all the work.

A total of approximately 70,000,000
feet of lumber were shipped from the
Columbia river by water to the various
markets of the world during the month
of July.

One man is dead and 15 others are
in a hospital recovering from injuries
received when train No. 4 of the O-W.
R. & N., westbound, was wrecked near
North Fork.

Fire destroyed the Gibson-Pennin-
ton sawmill, on the Coos Bay branch
of the Southern Pacific railway, 25
miles west of Eugene. The loss is
estimated at \$35,000.

The wheat crop of eastern Oregon
is only 60 per cent of that harvested
during 1921, according to E. R. Jack-
man, specialist in farm crops at Ore-
gon Agricultural college.

George A. Mansfield, of Medford,
president of the Oregon farm bureau
federation, has been recommended by
Senator McNary for appointment to
the federal farm loan board.

Up until July 24 the world war vet-
erans' state aid commission had com-
pleted 615 applications for loans ag-
gregating \$1,536,000. This is an av-
erage of \$2597 to each applicant.

An order calling a special election
for September 15, at Oswego, was is-
sued by the Clackamas county court
for the purpose of voting upon the
formation of a water district there.

Sigert Myers, 26, lineman for the
Mountain States Power company, was
electrocuted at Albany while working
in the auxiliary power plant. Myers
touched a wire carrying 2300 volts.

George Howard, who has been in
the penitentiary at Salem for more
than a year awaiting execution for
the murder of George Sweeney of Mal-
heur county, will be hanged Septem-
ber 8.

The secretary of state has appor-
tioned among the 36 counties of Ore-
gon for school purposes a total of
\$422,088.60, based on a per capita of
\$1.85 for the 228,156 children of school
age in the state.

Although existing forest fires are
nearly all under control, the con-
tinued drought is creating a very haz-
ardous situation which may result in
serious conflagration, according to
forest service officials.

The Oregon public service commis-
sion has ordered the closing and elim-
ination of 12 open public grade cross-
ings on the Heppner branch of the
Oregon-Washington Railroad & Nav-
igation company in Morrow county.

Predictions that Bend's population
will increase 2000, reaching the 8000
mark in the next ten months, were
made with the announcement of the
start of construction of a new saw-
mill unit by the Sheelin-Hixon com-
pany September 1. The mill is to be
finished March 1.
