opera house on Friday, September 1st.
Music will be by Foister's orchestra.

Dan McLachlan, Sr. was in Moro
last week-end on what he terms his
usual three-day visit from his home in
Portland. He spends one day coming,
one day here and one day going back.

Auto drivers who have had trouble
with loose spokes and shaky wheels
will be glad to know that W. H.
Williams has added to his repair shop
a machine that will line up and tighten
any kind of a wheel, iron or wooden
felloe. All four wheels can be
tightened for the price of one new
wheel. The work is guaranteed to
last the life of a new wheel.

Rain storms visited all parts of the
county the past week. Harvesting
operations were delayed, causing
damage to grain in the fields. The least
rainfall was in the Kent section.
Moro and Grass Valley sections just
missed a heavy hail storm that de-
vastated a part of Wasco county in the
Dufur section. The edge of this storm
was felt in Moro and west of here
Monday, when a light hail fell in this
part of the county.

Ira M. Peterson, practicing attorney
formerly located at Echo, Oregon, has
rented the office recently vacated by
the county agent in the Moro bank
building, and has been busy all week
arranging his possessions. Attorney
Peterson is a native of North Carolina,
coming to Oregon in 1920 from
Tennessee, locating at Echo. He is a
graduate of Cumberland University
Law School at Lebanon, Tennessee, ad-
mitted to the bar in Tennessee in 1918
and in Oregon in 1920.

Chris Andersen and wife, accompa-
nied by their daughter Bessie, motored
to Arlington the first of the week,
where C. C. Calkins met them by ap-
pointment and Miss Bessie changed
cars for Heppner where she will visit
with the Calkins family. This was
the first time in 28 years that Chris
had seen Arlington, he having work-
ed there for Smith Bros. when first
coming to Oregon. Yet he said that
he felt perfectly at home because
"not a dog-gone thing had changed."

The barn on the Barker estate farm,
seven miles north of town, burned
Tuesday night about 9:30 o'clock, to-
gether with 27 head of horses and
harness belonging to W. A. Morgan,
who is farming the place. A quantity
of hay was also burned. The loss to
Mr. Morgan is probably \$4000, with no
insurance. Among the horses burned
was a highly prized saddle horse. One
horse only was saved from the burning
barn—a stallion. Two others were
almost out but ran back to their
stalls. (Cordon Globe-Times.)

George Frazier, foreman of the rail-
way bridge crew, was fatally injured
Wednesday afternoon while working
on the high trestle near Hay Canyon.
A report states that Mr. Frazier was
astride a plank, pushing it to place,
when the end back of him fell off the
trestle and threw him 25 feet to the
ground. He fell on his hands, break-
ing both wrists. The local passenger
train, arriving shortly after the ac-
cident, was stopped and the injured man
taken to Grass Valley, but he died
before reaching the doctor's office.

Grain and Hay Show Plan Aids Exhibitor

The second annual Northwest Grain
and Hay Show will be held at Pendle-
ton September 18th to 23d. This is
the greatest show of its kind west of
Chicago. Every important wheat
growing section in the West will ad-
vertise itself there with a good ex-
hibit of wheat.

There is no excuse for the fellow
who says that he would like to exhibit
but is too busy. It is easy to do for
the fellow who wants to. If each
grower will ship a hundred pound sack
of his best wheat just as it comes
from the machine, directly to the
Northwest Grain and Hay Show at Pen-
dleton, the show will pay the freight,
clean and re-clean down to a fifty
pound exhibit sample. This makes it
an easy matter for the exhibitors.

K. E. Baumgartner, engineer in
charge of investigations of the war
mineral claims commission, is on the
Pacific coast on a trip which will
include investigation of chrome and
manganese claims in Josephine and
Jackson counties.

Mrs. Joseph E. Walker, millionaire
and philanthropist, with headquarters
at the Dorchester hotel in San Fran-
cisco, has sent \$500 to Dr. R. E. Lee
Steiner, superintendent of the Oregon
state hospital, as a donation to the
amusement fund of the institution.

The largest pear crop in the history
of the Rogue River valley has begun
and from now until late fall there will
be daily shipments. Southern Pacific
officials estimate the total pear crop
at 1150 cars, which is a 50 per cent
increase over the largest previous out-
put.

The world war veterans' state aid
commission, to date has approved 18-
063 claims for cash bonus aggregating
\$4,147,938, and has passed on 2347
applications for loans amounting to
\$5,327,700. Loans approved for pay-
ment number 842 and aggregate \$2-
009,500.

MILLION DOLLAR CHECK

ISSUED BY PENNEY FIRM

Amount Covers Only Part of Company's
Expenditures for Year

Twenty years ago J. C. Penney
opened a general store in Kemmerer,
a small Wyoming town. In the first
year of its existence it did a business
of nearly \$29,000. This Spring, says
the New York Times of July 22nd, the
J. C. Penney Company, of which Mr.
Penney is founder and chairman of the
board of directors, issued a single
check for \$1,671,693 51, in payment
for shoes it had bought, and this check
covered only a part of the company's
purchases from a single manufacturing
concern.

Mention is made of the check refer-
red to, the largest yet drawn by the
company, because it typifies the growth
of the business in the twenty-eight
years that have passed since the first
store was opened. Other indications
of its rapid growth are that the com-
pany now owns and operates 313 stores,
located in twenty-seven different
states and that steps are being taken
to open fifty-eight additional estab-
lishments during 1922.

One feature that has contributed to
the unity and cooperation that is evi-
dent in the company is the educational
department, directed by Dr. B. F.
Short. The endeavor of this depart-
ment is to have a personal contact
with every employe of the company,
in order to inspire them in their work
and to assist in their personal develop-
ment. The department publishes an
attractive monthly house magazine,
and has produced a course in busi-
ness training that has passed the
scrutiny of the best writers on busi-
ness matters, as well as the practi-
cal tests of experienced business men.

This course, which is for employes
of the company, is furnished to every
salesman and saleswoman without cost.
It is given for the double purpose of
helping them to serve the public more
intelligently and aiding them in ad-
vancing to higher positions with the
company.

The company does business on a
strictly cash basis, both in selling
and buying, regardless of the size of
the order placed. No deliveries are
made of goods purchased by consumers,
which is a factor in keeping down the
already low overhead cost of operat-
ing the stores. One of the most dis-
tinctive features of the company's
selling policy, however, is that no
store in the group is permitted to hold
special sales of any kind. The first
price at which the goods are offered
is the last price, and executives of the
company say that, due to the low cost
of doing business, the first prices are
so low that no reductions would be
necessary to move the goods, even if
they were permitted.

Under the novel cooperative system
by which the company does business,
the manager of almost every store
owns a third interest in the store he
manages. Very often the money with
which to buy this interest is advanced
by the company, and the manager is
allowed also to own a third interest in
as many other stores as he has the
ability to develop. Large amounts of
money are distributed annually among
the saleswomen. The business of the
company, according to Mr. Penney,
was founded on the Golden Rule, and
for some time the stores were known
as the Golden Rule stores. While
this name is no longer used, he asserted
that the principles upon which the
business was founded will never be
changed.
