OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Seven billion feet of timber in the Malheur national forest, the largest compact body of yellow pine timber owned by the government, is to be opened for sale and development, according to an announcement by the forest service. The timber region is on the watershed of the Silvies river. It covers an area of 550,000 acres and contains nearly seven billion feet of mature saw timber.

There were three fatalities due to industrial accidents in Oregon during the week ending August 24, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. There were a total of 514 accidents. Victims of fatalities during the week were: John Monroe, quarry driller, Roseburg; John Young, material checker, New York city; and Arthur Mapes, dredge operator, Nehalem.

William H. Emrick, chairman of the counting board in precinct 201, in Portland, was indicted on five distinct counts by the Multnomah county grand jury as a result of the probe into irregularities in that district ordered by District Attorney Myers when startling discrepancies between the votes cast and the ballots credited to candidates were discovered in the course of the Hall-Olcott recount.

Loganberry growers of the Liberty district at a meeting adopted a resolution demanding a minimum price of 6 cents a pound for berries produced during the 1922 season. It was set out in the resolution that this price is necessary in event the growers are to continue in business. Decision also was reached at the meeting to send letters to the growers in other districts of Oregon asking that they join in the demand for higher berry prices next year.

Proper Way to Display Flag.
When the American flag is hung as a banner the union, or field of stars, should be in the upper left hand corner. When hung with stripes perpendicular the union should be in the right hand corner. When hung from a rope stretched from building to building across the street, on streets running north and south, the union should fly to the east, on streets running east and west, the union should fly to the north. When hung from a rope stretched from the house to a tree in the yard the union should fly toward the street.
