Bids received October 10th by the city council for the construction of a concrete septic tank were rejected and this week new bids are advertised to be submitted at the meeting of the city council October 17th.

Henry Schadevitz and J. L. McClintock were in Moro Thursday on their way to their home at The Dalles from Kent. Henry says that grain sowed last week is coming up nicely. He said that the fields were beginning to turn green thru the entire length of the county.

EDUCATORS TALK ON PROBLEMS

Two Associations Organized; Churchill Endorsed for Superintendency

The annual teachers institute for Sherman county was held on October 9th, 10th and 11th at Moro. Dr. F. A. McGruder from Corvallis, Dr. Dan E. Clark from Eugene, W. G. Beattie from Monmouth and Mrs. Nellie Muh from The Dalles acted as instructors for the first two days. Mrs. Muh substituted for Miss Ida Mae Smith of the Oregon state normal school, who was unable to attend on account of illness.

The subject of government and training for good citizenship was discussed from various angles. "The Oregon Primary" was one of the most important subjects discussed by Dr. McGruder. Dr. Clark's discussion of "School Lands," given on Tuesday, was well followed by Mr. Beattie's detailed talk on school taxes, the subject topic being "The Teacher and the Dollar."

On Wednesday these instructors were replaced by assistant state superintendent W. M. Smith and state club leader H. C. Seymour. For the opening exercises Geraldine Vinton of Grass Valley and Lenore Amidon of Moro gave an excellent account of their club work experiences. Gwendolyn Foss of Moro demonstrated the canning of meat.

During the institute a county division of the state teachers association was organized. The following officers were elected: L. E. Webb, president; J. O. Russell, vice president; Miss Isla McCain, secretary; Miss Rosa Drager, executive committee member. A normal school association was organized with Miss Bessie Andersen of Moro as president and Miss Marjorie White of Grass Valley as secretary.

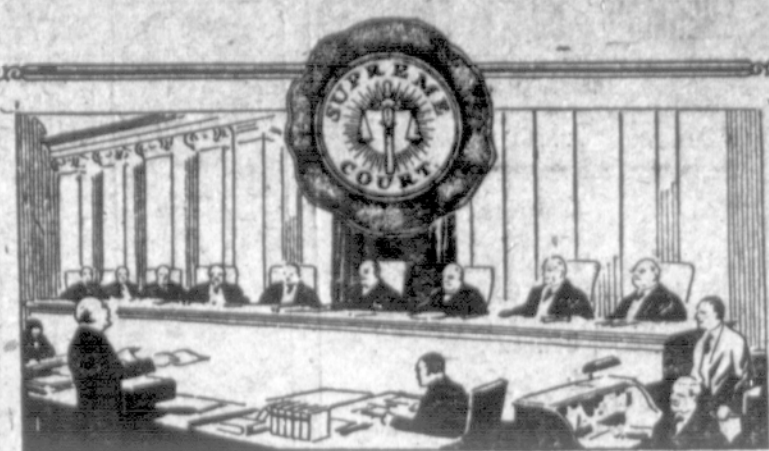
