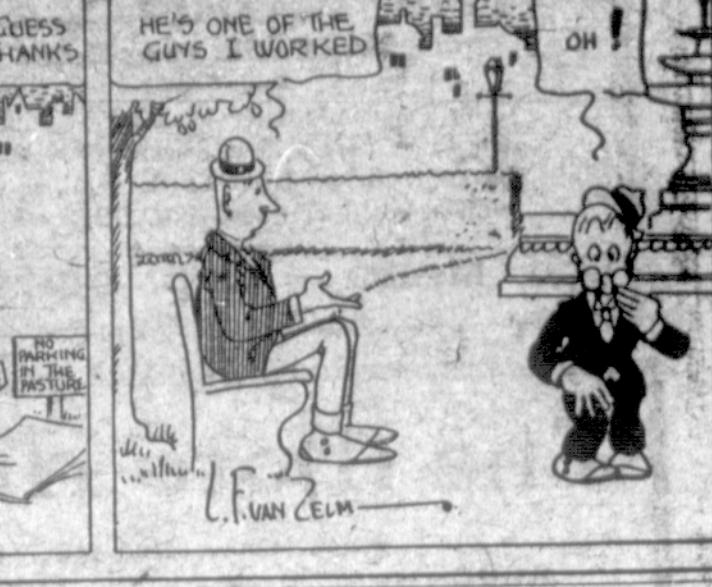

RAILWAY EMPLOYEES GRANTED WAGE RISE

Pay of 451,911 Men Lifted 2 Cents an Hour by Railroad Labor Board.

Chicago.—The wage bill of the nation's railroads was increased an estimated \$22,125,000 by a decision of the United States railroad labor board granting increased pay of 2 cents an hour to 451,911 maintenance of way employees.

Four of nine groups of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railroad Shop Workers were affected by the raise, the largest single group being common laborers. The decision raised minimum rates of pay for the classes affected from the present 23 and 35 cents to 25 and 37 cents.

Chairman Hooper of the labor board in a statement following the decision said that the board based its finding on a general upward trend in wages since the board's decision of last July reducing wages for this and other groups of workmen and not on any pronounced change in living costs. The decision marked a victory for the public group of the board which proposed the 2-cent increase, the proposal being rejected at first by the three members of the railroad group, who favored no change, and the three members of the labor group, who favored a much larger increase.

GOVERNORS INVITED TO ATTEND MEETING

Olympia, Wash.—Governors of all the states west of the Rocky mountains were invited by Governor Louis F. Hart to meet in a conference in San Francisco Thursday, November 16, to consider a uniform gasoline tax, uniform speed laws and other matters, which Governor Hart believes should be the same in all states.

Several western states are considering changes in the gasoline tax as well as other laws applying to the automobile and it is hoped that action taken will be uniform. One matter which will be considered at the conference, which may be enlarged to include highway departments and automobile departments, will be the question of registration and permits for transient automobiles.

The invitation was sent to the governors of Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, Nevada, Idaho, California and Oregon.

SLAYER HANGS HIMSELF

Paul Starch Cheats Gallows at Walla Walla.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Paul Starch, Wilson creek murderer, who was brought here on October 2 under death sentence from Grant county for the killing of August Bongiorini, 19-year-old nephew of a Grant county farmer, hanged himself in his cell.

Starch killed the Bongiorini boy and severely wounded his uncle, he said when captured, because of wages which he said were coming to him from the elder Bongiorini and which he said he could not collect.

Veterans' Bureau Assailed by Legion

New Orleans.—The American Legion, through its national commander, Sanford MacNider, affirmed that the welfare of disabled veterans was the chief interest. The government's handling of the disabled, from the time the armistice was signed down to the present, was described as one of "tragic mistakes, politics, alibis and blunders," in the report of the legion's rehabilitation commission, and Colonel C. R. Forbes, director of the United States veterans' bureau, in a counter-statement to newspapermen, asserted that the bureau which he heads was "the most perfect large organization in the world" and that implied criticism of it was not justified by facts.

Striving for salmon is the subject of discussion on the lower Coquille river, where it is held the practice is not approved by the sporting element, who believe the river eventually will become a poor fishing district if seining is allowed. Fishermen and cannerymen who profit by taking salmon hold an opposite view and the question is likely to be settled by the state legislature at next winter's session.

The suit brought by the Warren Brothers company to collect royalty from the state for patented pavements laid by Oscar Huber, state contractor, will be carried to the highest court for final determination, according to a statement made by L. A. Liljequist, assistant attorney-general, who handled the case in the federal court. The action was tried in the United States district court in Portland, with the result that Judge Bean ruled in favor of the plaintiffs. The decision carried a judgment in the amount of approximately \$15,000.

U. S. BOND OFFERING IS OVER-SUBSCRIBED

Washington, D. C.—The treasury's new offering of \$500,000,000 of 4 1/2 per cent 30-year bonds has been over-subscribed approximately \$1,000,000,000. It was announced by Secretary Mellon. Books for cash offerings closed at noon October 14.

Subscriptions for which 4 1/2 per cent victory notes or December 15 treasury certificates are tendered in payment will be received and allotments will be made in full until November 1. Approximately \$150,000,000 of such subscriptions already have been allotted in full under the terms of the offering.

Subscriptions received to date, according to reports in hand, were said to aggregate more than \$1,550,000,000, of which about \$1,400,000,000 represent cash subscriptions. Of the cash subscriptions more than \$325,000,000 was in amounts not exceeding \$10,000 for any one subscriber.

300,000 STORKS INVADE TOWN

From Ten to Twelve Roost Nightly on Each House in Oeynhausen, Westphalia.

Oeynhausen, Westphalia.—A flock of storks, estimated to number 300,000, has invaded Oeynhausen. From ten to twelve of the birds roost nightly on each house in the town. The storks are very tame and the visitors every morning as they fly to the neighboring fields where they pass the day feeding, and when they return to their roosts in the evening.

LAND TRUST IS HELD VOID

Washington State Anti-Allen Law Prevents Any Circumvention.

Olympia, Wash.—The supreme court upheld the anti-alien land law passed by the 1921 legislature, construing it as a bar to the holding of property in Washington by citizens for aliens under a declaration of trust. The decision was in the case of the state against E. J. O'Connell and wife, J. D. O'Connell and Pierce Loneragan, and reversed Judge Gilliam of King county, who sustained a demurrer in the complaint.

The state sued to escheat to itself lands held by J. D. O'Connell and Loneragan for E. J. O'Connell and wife and D. P. O'Connell, a minor, all British subjects, under a declaration of trust executed after the passage of the anti-alien land law.

Hoover is Against Debt Repudiation

Toledo, O.—Reputation of the loans made by the United States to the allied and associated nations during the war would undermine the whole fabric of international good faith. Secretary of Commerce Hoover, a member of the allied debt commission, declared in an address here. He added that he did not believe any public official, either in the United States or any other country, could or should approve their cancellation.

Five Injured When Dirigible Burns

San Antonio, Tex.—The army dirigible C-3, which recently completed a transcontinental flight and had reached San Antonio on its way back to Washington, was burned while being taken from its hangar at Brooks field preparatory to a flight over the city. Four members of the crew and a newspaper man, one of the passengers, were injured when the dirigible fell and burned. No fatalities resulted.

The Oregon State Game Warden, Captain A. E. Burghdoff and the forest service bureau of this district, through George H. Coell, district forester, have signed a written agreement formulating a pact whereby the co-operation of the law-enforcing and protecting agencies of the two services be insured. The agreement is one for mutual assistance in propagation, protection and control of game and fish in this state as well as for guarding against needless damage to the Oregon forests from fire and other sources.

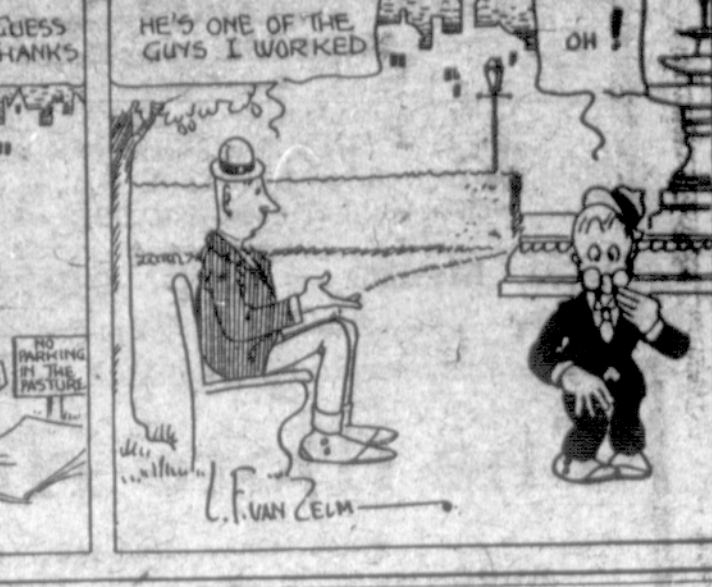
