PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Now Is the Time for Passage of School Bill
Vote 314 x Yes

Passage of the Compulsory Public School Attendance bill now—this year—will insure that a minimum number of private schools and private school pupils will be affected. Of the 36 counties of Oregon 16 are at present without any private schools whatever. The combined aggregate of pupils in all the private schools in five other counties is fewer than 200. The total attendance at the private schools, of the grammar grades, of Oregon is about 9841. The total attendance at the public schools, of the grammar grades, is about 131,689. Surely if the public schools are good enough for the 131,689, they are also good enough for the other 9841.

At present, while the private schools are few and small, is the time to make the change proposed by the public school bill.

COSTS. No tax will be levied for years to come, as the bill does not take effect until September, 1926, and no tax then if the amendment is in the courts for several years.

When all attend our free public schools the additional cost will be slight, for the overhead will be the same. Most of the children will find a place in existing classes and the added expense to the average taxpayer will be nominal. The great benefit to our nation will be worth many times the small cost.

Now is the time to pass this measure, insuring that in Oregon all of our children will be educated to a common patriotism, common ideals and a unified allegiance to our institutions.

Judge D. R. Parker held a special session of the circuit court Tuesday for the consideration of matters affecting the McDermid estate, appealed from the county court.

Geo. B. Bourhill was called to Portland Tuesday by the reported serious illness of his younger brother, Frank, who recently submitted to an operation in a hospital in that city.

Two new street lights were placed on First street this week by the Sherman Electric Co., one at the intersection of Court street and the other at the intersection of Hood street.

The army aviation camp on the Eugene municipal flying field is being broken preparatory to the return of the members of the 91st squadron of the army air forces to the home station at Crissley field, San Francisco. The recent rains have extinguished all fires in western Oregon and there is no more need of the patrol.

Sixty thousand rainbow trout have been sent from the McKenzie hatchery for distribution in Linn county streams. This consignment was originally intended for the streams east of Cascade, but the weather conditions prevented taking them there, so the trout were liberated in lakes and streams in the vicinity of Seilo.

An unusual amount of worm damage, together with small sizes and more or less "brown spot," have materially reduced the prospective 1922 commercial apple crop of Oregon, as compared with the earlier indications, is the opinion of F. L. Kent, agricultural statistician, department of agriculture, who has very recently visited the principal apple-growing districts of the state.

W. said that it was the first time in twenty years that he had seen Goldendale, and that the place looked much as it did thirty years ago, when he first visited the place to get lumber to build a house on a farm he then owned east of Moro. The lumber mill was located about eight miles beyond Goldendale, and Axtell paid for the lumber he bought by hauling from the mill to the yard at Goldendale. Axtell remembered that he settled his bill at the rate of six dollars a thousand for dimension and common lumber and higher for finish.

WILLIAMS-DAGGET CO. BEGINS PROGRESSIVE AUTO BUSINESS

Men Who Became Acquainted in Army Pool Interests in Local Garage

Two business transactions were completed last week that are of much interest to automobile owners of Sherman and of Moro in particular.

The first transaction was the formation of a partnership agreement between Walter H. Williams of this city and William Dagget of Spokane, by which the two became equal owners of the auto repair and battery service business built up by Mr. Williams, and conducted in the Deschutes Garage building in Main street.

The second transaction was the completion of a deal by which the newly formed partnership of Williams-Dagget Co. bought the interests of J. L. Matthes in the DesChutes Motor Co. and consolidated the business with their other interests in the same building. The newly organized firm will handle all kinds of automobile business that goes with a complete garage business, such as selling accessories, tires, storage and doing repair work of all kinds.

Mr. Dagget is a first class mechanic and machinist. He has done nothing else but mechanical work since he left high school. His acquaintance with Mr. Williams began in the army, the two working shoulder to shoulder in the service for two years, of which time one and a half years was with the A. E. F., in Co. 11, 1st Air Service.

The members of the new firm unite in saying that they "are in business to give the public service in all respects," and it is believed that they will.

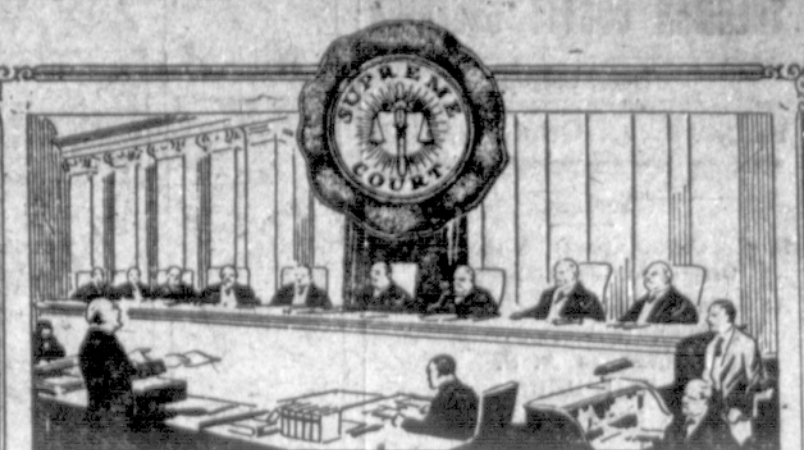
