Many prominent citizens from all
sections of Oregon are opposing with
every influence at their command the
proposed compulsory education bill,
so-called, on the November 7 ballot.
Space affords only room for the fol-
lowing expressions:

Mrs. Alexander Thompson, Oregon's
first woman legislator, now president
of the Federated Women's clubs of
Portland—The bill is not American;
quite the reverse. It is paternalism
at its worst. I do not for a moment
believe the generous, fair-minded peo-
ple of Oregon will vote in such an
iniquitous measure; I have too much
faith in them.

Edith Knight Hill, for years a club
worker, editor of the official state fed-
eration bulletin—With all the em-
phasis at my command, I will say that
this proposed bill is unfair, un-Amer-
ican and unnecessary. It should be
so badly defeated that for all time it
will lie buried deep under the over-
whelming avalanche of an indignant
electorate's ballots.

Mrs. Norman F. Coleman, widely
known educator and club woman—To
my mind, this bill is repugnant, un-
called for, mischievous, barking back
to the dark ages of persecution, big-
otry, witchcraft. It should be beaten.

W. L. Brewster, ex-city commission-
er of Portland, leading member of the
Oregon bar, member of the Portland
library board and chairman of the
Non-Sectarian and Protestant Com-
mittee for Freedom in Education, with
headquarters in the Consolidated
Securities building, Portland—I am
devoting most of my time in the ef-
fort to defeat the bill. I couldn't af-
ford to do that if it were not perni-
cious, vicious and violation of sacred
principles.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell, Pendle-
ton—I cannot too severely condemn
the measure. There is a fair com-
pulsory education law on our statute
books now. Nothing further need be
said except to ask all liberty-loving
voters to repudiate by their ballots
this bill.

Louis E. Bean, Eugene—I am un-
alterably opposed to the bill. It is
useless, a backward movement and en-
tirely out of place in liberty-loving
Oregon.

The Lutheran ministry in general
has condemned the bill; Presbyterian
pastors throughout the state have re-
fused it; the Episcopalians and Ad-
ventists, whose schools it would close,
have joined in the outcry against the
measure.

The Protestant and Non-Sectarian
Committee office has evidence from
all over Oregon that the bill is in-
creasingly unpopular, as people grasp
its sweeping, unfair provisions.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Infor-
mation of Our Readers.

Registration in Benton county shows
6983 voters.

James Dyer, aged 80, Oregon pio-
neer, died at his home near Albany.
The city of Condon has purchased
a \$3000 combined chemical and water
engine.

Work on the highway between
Grants Pass and Crescent City will
start immediately.

The annual convention of the Ore-
gon State Medical association will be
held in Portland October 26 and 27.

The Oregon Association of County
Judges and Commissioners will meet
in Portland on December 12, 13 and
14.

Eight thousand two hundred and
thirteen voters are registered in Mar-
ion county for the November elec-
tion.

A total of \$575,000 had been sub-
scribed by the end of last week to the
Willamette university endowment
fund.

Three hundred new members is the
goal of officials in charge of the Salem
chamber of commerce membership
drive.

Twenty-three I. W. W. members
were escorted to the city limits of
Portland by police and ordered to
move on.

Civil service examinations will be
held November 18, to select postmas-
ters for Amity, Gardiner, Kerry and
Pilot Rock.

By a vote of 91 to 13, a bond issue
of \$75,000 has been authorized by the
land owners of the Grants Pass irri-
gation district.

The records in the Clatsop county
clerk's office show the total number
of registrations for the coming general
election are 8096.

William M. Canning, prominent min-
ing operator and a resident of Baker
for 40 years, died at his home in that
city, aged 68 years.

The postoffice at Goble has been
advanced to presidential class as of
October 1 and the postmaster's sal-
ary fixed at \$1000 a year.

Kerr, Gifford & Co., of Portland
have bought the interest of G. F.
Standage and E. P. Whiting in the
Beaver feed mills of Eugene.

Notices have been posted in Lake
county calling a special election, Nov-
ember 7, for a vote on the recall of
Dr. E. H. Smith, county judge.

A report issued by the Clatsop
sheriff's office shows that up to the
present time the sum of \$1,552,795.68
has been collected in taxes on the 1921
roll.

The Scio Condensary last week paid
out \$700 in bonuses to the several
patrons of the concern who have con-
tinuously sold their milk to it for one
year.

By crawling into a burning house
through the bedroom window, Mrs.
Delbert Irving of La Grande saved her
little children from being burned to
death.

Petitions for the recall of County
Judge Cross of Clackamas county were
filed with County Clerk Miller at Ore-
gon City. The petitions contain 2563
signatures.

The largest registration ever record-
ed in Clackamas county was reached
this year. Official figures completed
by Fred A. Miller, county clerk, show
a total of 17,378.

The Rebekah convention for the
sixth district, comprising Linn and
Benton counties, held its annual ses-
sion at Shedd, with Shedd and Tangent
lodges as hostesses.

The World war veterans' state aid
commission has announced the ap-
pointment of J. A. Estes of Bend,
and W. E. Van Allen of Redmond as
appraisers for Deschutes county.

Odd Fellows of North Bend have
completed arrangements for the con-
struction of a \$75,000 temple. The
building will be three stories high and
cover a space of 100 by 102 feet.

More wheat has been sold at this
date this year than on the same date
in any past year which Pendleton
grainmen can recall. It is stated. Less
than 600,000 bushels of the crop re-
main.

More than \$65,000 worth of timber
has been sold during the last few
months through the United States land
office in Portland, according to figures
given out by Frank O. Northrup, re-
ceiver.

The five Alaskan baby moose, held
for the past fortnight in Brooklyn
park are on their way to freedom and
will soon be released near Kroll, in
the lake country of northern Coos
county.

Electrical energy from the big plant
at Prospect, Jackson county, is now
coming to Springfield over the new
transmission line of the California
Oregon Power company to the Moun-
tain States Power company, the last
link of the longest power line in the
world having just been completed.

Shamrock butter, manufactured at
the Lower Columbia Dairy associa-
tion's Astoria creamery, won the high-
est score at the international dairy
show held in Minneapolis, Minn., on
October 11 and 12, according to a
message received.

Irrigation activities in central Ore-
gon were increased when the United
Contracting company began the re-
placement of a large amount of old
wooden flume on the Tumalo project
with an earth canal. Excavation will
reach approximately 20,000 yards.

Over \$1,000,000 a year for operation

Over \$3,000,000 for buildings and grounds

THE first cost of state monopoly of schools
would be something over three million
dollars for new buildings and grounds. We
would have to pay a yearly tax of over one
million dollars for operation in addition to
what we are paying now.

now under the present law.
