Tonolais, among the first municipalities to have a city government composed entirely of women, has elected men to serve in the various city offices for the coming two years, and only two women remain in power, these serving on the council.

Indorsement of the Umatilla Rapids power project as the first step in the open-river programme for the Columbia, indorsement of the Smith-McNary bill now pending in congress and request for the appointment of a board of engineers by the secretary of war to make a survey of the Columbia river from Vancouver, Wash., to Priest Rapids in Idaho, as directed, was the outstanding action by the Open River conference in Pendleton.

The assessment of all property in Oregon, together with the ratio that the taxable property in the counties will bear to the full cash value in 1923, based on the 1922 tax rolls, has been determined by the state tax commissioner. The assessment, according to the report prepared by the commissioner, will be approximately \$8,000,000 lower than for the present year, while the ratios will be practically the same as fixed for the year 1922. The most drastic reduction in assessments is in Multnomah county.

Dr. Foley, Jack Noonan and C. W. McKinney brought home thirteen geese as the result of a brief trip to feeding grounds near Biglow, early Wednesday morning.

Ernest Jacobsen, known to a large number of Sherman county people as "Big Jake" when he was in business in The Dalles, was found unconscious in his car at the Vista House on the Columbia river highway Wednesday afternoon, suffering from an apopleptic stroke. He was carried into the building, but death came before medical aid could reach him.

Members of the Moose lodge are planning to erect in Corvallis a home to cost not less than \$40,000.

Work on the Mount Hood loop highway within the Oregon national forest has been ended for the winter.

Governor Olcott urges the people of Oregon to observe "American Education Week," December 3 to 9.

Net earnings of Happy Canyon, the side show of the Pendleton Round-Up during the year 1922, were \$3784.20.

An association of former University of Oregon students and graduates in Lane county was organized at Albany.

Six warehouses belonging to J. F. O'Bryen and operated in Haines by the Marshall Grain company, have been sold.

The state treasurer, on December 2, will consider bids for the sale of Oregon district interest bonds aggregating \$231,000.

If members of the city council do not change present views, one-way traffic is certain to have a trial in Portland soon.

Bishop William P. Remington, recently elected to the Episcopal diocese of eastern Oregon, was installed in his office Sunday in Pendleton.

Governor Olcott has completed the task of signing \$150,000 of road bonds which were sold at a recent meeting of the state highway commission.

LUNDGREN ENTERTAINERS TO PRESENT MUSIC AND DRAMA

Mr. Lundgren and Miss Young Both Are Artists of Wide Experience

State News in Brief

The Coast Power company in Tillamook has closed down for three months pending improvements entailing the expenditure of \$150,000 in the building of a new and up-to-date plant.

Complete election returns from all counties, part of them unofficial, show that the so-called compulsory school bill carried in Oregon by 13,986. The opposition measure was defeated by 12,581.

The sum of \$84,068.11 of market road funds was expended on 19 different projects in Lane county from January 1 to November 7, according to a report to the state highway department.

Increased needs of the Bend public schools, the result of the rapid growth of the population there, will be met by a 12-month \$80,000 note issue, arrangements for which have already been made.

J. J. Handsaker, representing Oregon in the Near East relief campaign, states that the \$2000 given by Riverside Community church in Hood River exceeded the contribution of any other church in the state.

NOVEMBER TERM CIRCUIT COURT

Judge Orders Directed Verdict in Suit State vs. Walter Givens.

The usual routine of docket cases were disposed of by Judge Parker at the convening of the November term of circuit court in this city Monday.

The case of the State vs. Blake Shaw, order made by the court that case be dismissed.

The case of the State vs. Lyle Boots, defendant pleaded guilty to larceny, sentenced to thirty days in the county jail.

The case of the State vs. Walter Givens, charged with embezzlement of \$12,000 while manager of the Kent Elevator Co., was postponed until Thursday and heard before Judge J. U. Campbell of the Fifth Judicial District. After the case had been concluded by the attorneys on both sides, the court directed the jury to bring in a verdict of not guilty.

The girls of Moro have organized a camp fire club under the leadership of Miss Bessie Anderson. The charter from the national organization has been received and several preliminary meetings have been held. Last Saturday, November 18th, a meeting was held for the election of officers, the following being voted positions: Helen Bryant, president; Laura Urquhart, vice president; Vivian Hulery, secretary-treasurer. Charter members to the number of six have enrolled.

Approximately 75 per cent of the Oregon prune crop for 1922 has been sold and 50 per cent of it has been shipped, according to fruit men of Salem.

William McKinley and Charles Pool of Tillamook were killed when an automobile in which they were driving went off the grade at the bridge at Beaver.

Snowfall on the Blue mountains in several sections of the Umatilla national forest is now over 12 inches deep, according to J. C. Kohne, forest supervisor.

The section of the old Oregon trail state highway between Baker and Huntington in Baker county has been materially improved during the last few weeks.

Taxpayers of Pendleton decided at the recent election that the council should not exceed the 11-mill levy, and the proposed budget of \$114,311 must be cut to \$97,185.

Figures prepared by U. G. Boyer, Marion county clerk, show that out of a total of 94 women selected for jury service during the last year, only 21 have consented to act.

Of the 12 precincts in Lane county that voted November 7 on the question of whether to allow stock to run at large, four voted in favor of it and eight to keep the stock up.

DELEGATION MEETS COMMISSION

Sherman Highway Will be Completed Assures State Commission

A. M. Wright, the members of the county court and H. S. Wall met with the state highway commission at Portland Tuesday to secure early completion of the Sherman highway from Grass Valley to a junction with the Dalles-California highway near Shaniko. The state commission informed the delegation that both the Dalles-California and the Sherman highways were designated and accepted as federal roads and their completion in the near future is assured.

The party returning Tuesday night in Judge McKee's car witnessed the effects of strong winds then prevalent on the highway around Crown Point. They counted seven cars, all large and one a sedan, between Crown Point and Eagle Creek, with their tops completely wrecked.
