What is said to be hog cholera is causing serious loss to stockmen in the Island City section of the Grand Ronde valley.

The union high school and the public schools at Spray, in Gilliam county, have been closed because of an epidemic of scarlet fever.

Thousands of sheep and cattle from all over Eastern Oregon have been driven to the Ochoco project to be fed during the winter on alfalfa.

The children of Vale must be home when curfew sounds at 8 o'clock every night, the new city council having just passed an ordinance to that effect.

Combined lumber shipments from the Willamette and Columbia river district for 1922 were 729,936,292 feet as compared with 536,298,929 feet in 1921.

Reports from the Willamette valley indicate that fruit buds are developing in all sections and are in danger of being frostbitten before the winter is over.

While cranking a tractor on his ranch near Prineville last week, C. C. Reynolds had his ear torn off when the crank slipped and flew, hitting him on the side of the head.

Gold found in the gizzard of a goose by Charles Brennan at Seaside has started several prospectors toward the upper reaches of the Necanicum river in quest of the mother lode.

Mrs. Mary Margaret Chambers, 57, last surviving member in Albany of those pioneers who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1845, is dead at her home, as the result of old age.

The measures making a federal appropriation to aid in the reconstruction of the burned area of Astoria are expected to be submitted to the respective committees of the senate and house this week.

The 1922 tax levy for Clackamas county schools, roads and administrative offices for 1923 may be invalid, through the failure of the levy court to file the order for the levy within the required time.

Two carloads of dairy cattle to improve the herds of cattlemen were shipped into Prineville over the City of Prineville railway. The cows are Jerseys and Holsteins from Bay Center, Washington.

The treasurer-elect was not sworn in at the last meeting of the old city council at Brownsville, although the old treasurer went out of office, and so the city is in the curious plight of being without a treasurer.

Johnson Smith of Portland was appointed warden of the Oregon state penitentiary by Governor Pierce. Mr. Smith will succeed James E. Lewis, who has served as warden of the penitentiary for the past two years.

Dr. J. H. Rosenberg of Prineville was elected president of the state board of health at the annual meeting of the board in Salem. Owing to the impaired railroad service Dr. Rosenberg was unable to attend the meeting.

Immediate investigation of the books and records of the former Peoples Bank of Portland and the State bank of Portland, defunct, and the subsequent removal of Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, is urged in a petition filed in the executive offices at Salem. The petition was addressed to the members of the state banking board, which is composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer. The petition was signed by approximately 75 persons.

Willia Buxton has resigned his position as assistant at the railway depot and has taken over the duties of rural mail carrier.

The double header basket ball games last Friday between the boys and girls high school teams of Wasco and Moro were both won by Wasco. The score of the girls game was 29-24; of the boys, 26-18.

Herman Pape was a business visitor in Moro this week from Corvallis. He left Corvallis via train Wednesday morning and, by courtesy of C. E. Johnson, motored into Moro at 4:30 that afternoon from Portland.

It is the intention of the county to improve the Scott canyon road leading south from Rufus with a rock surface this spring. An appropriation of \$2000 will be used to extend the new surface as far south as possible.

Wm. Rudolf and wife, former residents of this city now living at White Salmon, Washington, are visiting with Mrs. Rudolf's brother, George Hennagin, and family. Mr. Rudolf is a former councilman of this city.

Elective officers of Eureka Lodge A. F. & A. M. of Moro, installed for the current term are as follows: Dayton Henrichs, W. M.; E. R. Barzee, S. W.; W. A. Roggles, J. W.; W. K. Johnson, secretary; Wm. Henrichs, treasurer.

Road Master H. S. Wall, while in Moro Tuesday evening, stated that the rock work was all finished on the Fulton canyon road from the mouth of the canyon to the Hugh White place. A two-mile section of this road was built for less than \$5000 per mile.

Contractors report that the Sherman-highway, north of Wasco, to be nearly finished to the railroad section house and that thirty days more will complete the rock macadam surface on the recently graded portion of the contract to Wasco.

Rev. D. H. Leech and wife, from Portland, are visiting with A. M. Wright and family of this city. Mrs. Leech is a sister to Mr. Wright. On Sunday Rev. Leech will close the special meetings now being conducted by the Presbyterian and Methodist churches.

C. E. Johnson made the round trip via auto to Portland this week. He left Moro early Sunday and Portland Wednesday on the return. He reports the highway in fine condition, but the last few miles into Moro removed the pleasant impression of the improved section.

The city council at their last meeting accepted the recently built septic tank and the Court street sewer from the contractors. The council was well satisfied with the work on the septic tank, but expressed dissatisfaction with the work on the Court street sewer. It is probable that the council would have refused to settle at the contract price if those for whom it was built had not coupled onto it before it was legally completed.

Shrine Ceremonial Dated January 27th

Members of Al Kader Temple, Mystic Shrine who live here have received notice of the semi-annual Ceremonial which is to be staged in Portland on Saturday, January 27th. This Ceremonial will be the first to be presided over by Hal T. Hutchinson, who was elected Illustrious Potentate of the Temple in December.

The Ceremonial date is followed closely by the outstanding social event of the year, the annual Potentate's Ball to be held in the Portland auditorium on Wednesday night, January 31st. This affair will be attended by Shriners and their ladies from every part of the state.

Orin Urquhart has accepted the position of assistant at the Moro railroad depot, in place of Willis Buxton, who recently resigned.

W. C. Bryant has returned from a trip to Portland where he transacted legal business and to Monmouth where he attended a board of regents meeting at the state normal school.

The county road building crew is now moving to a location near Fred Bleu's farm, where they will grade and rock a two-mile section from the railroad crossing south, on what is known as the state road. This will improve a section of road that is cut up easily each year.

The Williams-Daggett Motor Co. is installing an up-to-the-minute electric charger to be used in connection with the battery work. The new machine is rated three horsepower and will charge a battery in from six to eight hours, giving the battery a longer-lived charge than the old system.

Chris Schultz Post 71, American Legion, of Moro, recently installed the following elective officers for the year 1923: Karl Schade, commander; I. M. Peterson, adjutant; M. E. Miller, vice commander; W. S. Carpenter, 1st vice commander; Theodore Johnston, 2nd vice commander; John Shearer, 3d vice commander.

The rapidly with which traffic at the Astoria terminals increased the past year is indicated by a report just issued by the port authorities. It shows that in 1921 150 vessels, with a tonnage of 64,876, loaded or discharged at that port, while in 1922 the vessels handled numbered 298, with a tonnage of 113,596.

Oregon City is without water for domestic use. By order of the city water commission the mains were closed and 2,000,000 gallons, representing one-third of the normal reserve, was kept for fire protection purposes. The city will be without water until the repair of the 800-foot break near the headworks is completed.

The Oregon public service commission, upon its own motion, has ordered an investigation of charges of unreasonable and unjustly discriminatory rates on farm products between points in Oregon, and the alleged failure of the railroads to provide through routes and joint through rates over the lines of the various carriers.

One million dollars has been paid to the prune grower-members of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association for the 1922 crop, according to officials, who state that this is the earliest and largest payment ever made to prune growers in Oregon by a co-operative organization—\$100 per ton being received by all prune members to date.

The work of clearing the right of way for the 24 miles of new highway to be built jointly by the bureau of public roads, the state of Oregon and Lane county, between Blashly and Rainrock, on Lake creek and the Siuslaw river, this being a part of the Eugene-Florence state highway, will begin as soon as contracts can be let and crews assembled.
