I. M. Peterson, AdjutantA contract for the construction of
the Powell Butte irrigation project
in Deschutes county has been sub-
mitted for the consideration of Percy
A. Cupper, state engineer.Thirteen head of Jersey cattle, out
of a dairy herd of 25 animals, owned
by Birch Brothers, were killed by a
Willamette Valley Southern railway
passenger car near Monitor.The people in the Greenbury com-
munity, about seven miles south of
Corvallis on the state highway, have
just completed the erection of a com-
munity house at a cost of \$6000.Joseph Charles Herron of Portland
has been appointed principal to the
military academy at West Point by
Senator McNary. Robert Lewis Easton
of Eugene, has been named first alter-
nate.

Route of Highway thru Kent Decided

Members of the county court, ac-
companied by Road Master H. S.
Wall, drove to Kent Tuesday for the
purpose of definitely deciding on the
location of the Sherman highway at
that place.A number of surveys have been
made in and near Kent until finally
the state engineers made location of
a route in'o the town along the pre-
scent route from the west, turning south
at the railroad depot. This location
was turned down by the government
engineers, who then gave the final
decision that the highway must come
into Kent from the north near the
Kent school house, or angle southeast
from the corner where the rock sur-
face is built into Kent.The business of the court was to
ascertain if the owners of land north
of Kent would agree to a right-of-way
through their farms. This was quick-
ly decided in the affirmative when it
became known that the government
engineers insisted on an immediate
decision between the two routes pro-
posed by them, so that the contracts
could be let at the February meeting
of the state highway commission.Demands of the Portland building
trades for a 10 per cent rise in wages,
to go into effect March 1 of this year,
will not be granted, according to ac-
tion taken by the Building Construc-
tion Employers' association.The Oregon State Dairy association
in convention at Albany overwhelm-
ingly endorsed the Cary bill before the
state legislature providing for increas-
ing the amount of butterfat in ice
cream from 8 to 14 per cent.Oregon City has received relief from
the water shortage which for more
than a week kept the city on rations,
caused by an 800-foot break in the
pipe line on the South Clackamas, two
miles below the headworks.The Gilpin Construction company of
Astoria submitted the lowest bids for
the construction and dredging work
at the Tongue Point naval base, it
was announced by the navy depart-
ment. Congress recently appropriated
\$250,000 for the work.
