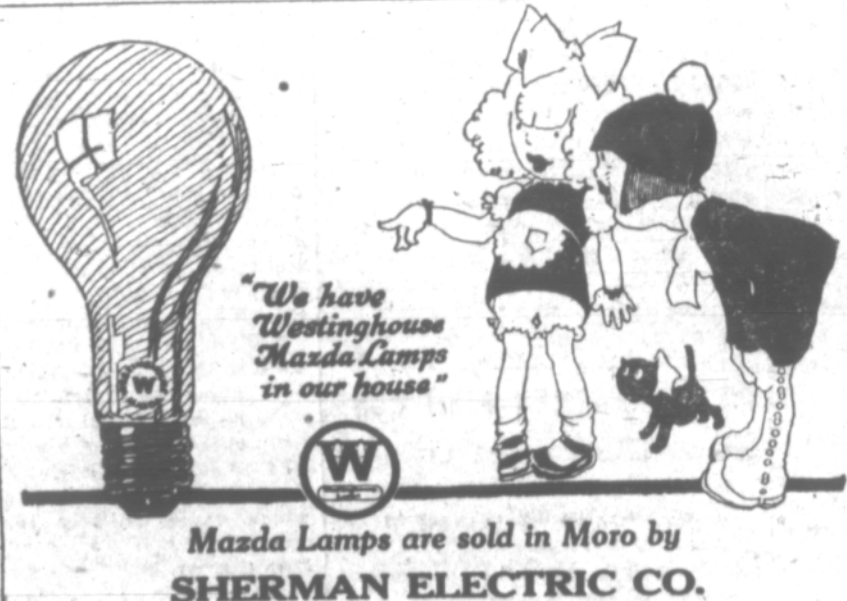

Four hundred and fifty years will soon have elapsed since the birth of Nicolaus Copernicus and plans are already under way in Europe to commemorate this event next year. His revolutionary views on astronomy were the product of an early dissatisfaction with the Ptolemaic doctrine, and in the midst of an unusually full life he found time to elaborate an entirely new system of astronomy by the adoption of which man's estimate of the universe was fundamentally changed, says the Christian Science Monitor. One of the chief tributes to his achievements is to be a public library in the city of his birth, Thorn, on the Vistula, and the foundation of its structure has already been completed. Even though, in those early days, his discoveries were regarded as purely hypothetical fancies, the later centuries are according him a measure of the honor due him as a great and courageous thinker.

Eternally debated is the question of whether a college education is or is not an advantage in a business career, says the Nation's Business. Perhaps there is no answer. Perhaps the individual who is headed for business success will get there with or without. Perhaps it depends entirely on the man, that a college course may be excess baggage to one and usable equipment to another. Perhaps there's a need of definition. Series of Potluck Suppers to Begin on Tuesday, February 13th

The social as well as the intellectual life of Presbyterians and their friends will soon be stimulated by a series of potluck suppers to be given weekly at the church. The first supper will be held next Tuesday evening at 6:30. Come with your baskets and your families and enjoy the hour together. Following the satisfying of the inner man, the people will divide into sections, all taking up the study of "The American Negro." The adults and young people will meet in the main auditorium and will use Hayne's book, "The Trend of the Races." Sixteen copies of this book have been ordered. People who find it impossible to take part in the supper should be at the church about seven-fifteen.

STUDENT KILLED IN ACCIDENT

Stanley Reine Meets Death When Car Overturns North of Wasco

Charles Stanley Reine, high school student of Arlington, was killed in an automobile accident on the Girkin canyon road, between Wasco and Rufus, about midnight last Friday. The car contained six high school students from Arlington, three in each seat. Reports of the accident agree that the driver of the car was traveling over a road he knew little about and that the breaks refused to control the car on the steep grade.

Two other passengers in the car were severely injured, taken to the hospital at The Dalles and later discharged from medical attention. The students had been in attendance at the Arlington-Wasco basketball game and were returning to Arlington at the time of the accident.

The world war veterans' state aid commission sold \$5,000,000 of soldiers' bonus bonds to John E. Price & Co. of Seattle, representing a syndicate of New York bankers. The successful bid called for \$4,000,000 of 4 1/2 per cent coupon bonds at \$1000.35, or a total of 4,450. The sale increases the total of soldiers' bonus bonds sold to \$20,000,000. There are yet \$10,000,000 of these bonds in the hands of the bonus commission. It probably will be at least six months before the demands will necessitate the sale of more of these bonds. There were five bidders for this offering.

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BOY SCOUT ORGANIZATION ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED

Morgan, Thompson, Dean, Coleman and Bryant Participate

Last night the Moro boy scout troop observed the 15th anniversary of the national boy scout organization at their headquarters in the old Baptist church. Sixteen wide-awake scouts, with scoutmasters, parents, troop committee and their wives, about 45 in all, gathered and partook in interesting games, stunts, speech-making and eating for the space of two hours.

Harold Bryant read a paper on the history of the scout movement. The first scout charter was obtained just 19 years ago. Today there are between four hundred and five hundred thousand scouts in the United States. Wallace Cochran followed Harold Bryant, giving an account of the local troop, which was organized a little over a year ago. Next came setting-up exercises, then a competitive contest between the two patrols in wheelbarrow and crab races, squaw-wrestle and "Thompson" flop. The score resulted in 23 to 24 in favor of the Beavers.

J. R. Morgan and C. J. Thompson assisted Scoutmaster Henry G. Hanson in conducting the scout law tests and the various stunts. Roy F. Dean addressed the scouts on "Discipline." J. E. Coleman and W. C. Bryant gave informal talks.

A committee consisting of Mrs. Woods, Mrs. Cochran and Mrs. Hastings, mothers of scouts, had arranged for refreshments, which capped the climax for both scouts and guests. All came away pronouncing the anniversary a howling success both literally and figuratively.

The largest individual lumber transaction ever consummated in Oregon was closed when the Buehner Lumber company mill and timber located on Coos bay were transferred to eastern and southern operators for an actual cash consideration of approximately \$4,000,000.

Road patrolmen or supervisors of Lane county this year will receive pay at the rate of \$4 a day in cases where they have charge of one district each and where they have charge of two or more, their stipend will be \$5 a day, according to an order made by the county court.

Drastic slashes in the city payroll were made by the Pendleton city council on recommendation of Mayor Fee, and two employees were cut from the payroll entirely. The cuts range from \$25 a month to \$10, all salaries but one being cut. The total saving in a year will be \$5280.
