Notes of Interest to All
Local Denominations

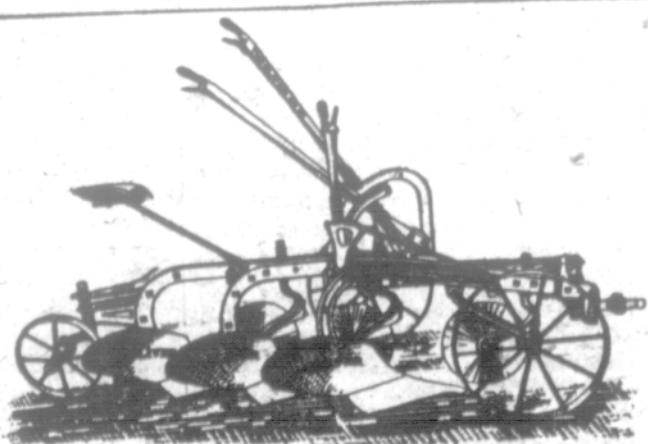
