Highway Construction Camps Located

Carl Bauers, of the contracting firm
of Bauers & Bauers, was in Sherman
county last week for the purpose of
beginning construction of the Sher-
man highway south of Grass Valley.

Mr. Bauers stated, when in Moro,
that two construction camps will be
established by his company and that,
profiting by their experience in the
construction of the highway between
Wasco and Grass Valley, the work
will be rushed during the spring and
early summer.

Location for one camp has been made
along the route of the new highway,
in Finnegan canyon, south of the
Henry Peters farm near Bourbon. A
rock crusher will be set up at that
place and construction of grade and its
surfacing between Grass Valley and
Kent, will be handled from this loca-
tion.

The second camp will be established
at the Guy Haskinson farm, south of
Kent. This camp will handle all the
construction work and surfacing be-
tween Kent and the county line. A
location for the rock crusher has been
secured in the southeast corner of sec-
tion nine, across the road from Mr.
Haskinson's house.

Mr. Bauers also stated that road
working outfits and machinery were
being shipped into the county for both
camps and that work would be under
the direct supervision of A. D. Emory,
superintendent of construction for the
contracting firm when the Wasco-
Moro-Grass Valley sections were being
constructed.

acres of wheat crop and an equal num-
ber of acres of early plowing was
blown out by the wind storm of last
Friday in the northeast section of
Sherman county. One farm has a
mile strip of farm land buried under
sand as a result of the storm.

that place Saturday evening, March

section, who has begun plowing and

living near Wilcox, collected \$42 last
Sunday pulling automobiles through
mud holes at a charge of three dollars
per pull. Some pulls came within
twenty feet of each other.
