Relatives honored Mrs. B. F. Medler, residing at Wasco, last Sunday, by giving her family a surprise party in celebration of her 85th birthday. Mrs. Medler is one of the early pioneers of Sherman county.

W. F. Jackson returned the first of the week from Portland. While in that city Mr. Jackson attended the banquet given by members of the democratic party in honor of the anniversary of Thomas Jefferson's birthday.

Grandma Ragdale returned the day from a visit of several months at Silverton, Oregon. Mrs. Ragdale was seriously ill the last few weeks of her visit at Silverton and, at one period of her visit, was not expected to survive her sickness.

Dr. W. J. Miller, eye, ear, nose and throat specialist of Portland, will be in Moro, Thursday, April 26th, to do eye, ear, nose and throat work, including testing eyes and fitting glasses. Will be at Hotel Moro.

County Commissioner L. L. Peetz made an inspection tour Saturday of the route and progress of the work done on the Sherman highway south of Grass Valley. He reports that the contractors have six grading camps established at different points along the route and that work is progressing at as many places. It is expected to have all the work completed by December first and the Grass Valley-Kent section by early fall. Mr. Peetz stated that a quarter mile separates the present Shaniko road and the terminus of the Sherman highway at the county line. This short piece can easily be constructed pending completion of the highway to a connection with the California route near Shaniko.

Hubbard berry growers are to have a cannery of their own. Seventy-five thousand dollars has been raised for the building and purchase of the site, and the cannery will be in operation this season.

The Southern Pacific company will exert every effort to prevent a serious car shortage in the northwest this year, according to a letter received at the offices of the Oregon public service commission.

Odd Fellows from all sections of Oregon and southern Washington are expected to attend the ceremonies incident to the laying of the cornerstone of the new Odd Fellows' temple in Portland, April 26.

Oregon's population on July 1, 1923, will be 223,270, according to a bulletin issued by the census bureau. This is an increase of 28,881 since 1920. Portland's population on July 1 will be 272,621, an increase of 15,333.

Deterioration of Bend's hard surface pavements has become so rapid since they were laid in 1921 that the cost of repair or correction would run from \$80,000 to \$50,000, Robert B. Gould, city engineer, told the city council.

A tax levy of one-half mill for the purpose of creating a fund with which to erect a new courthouse will be recommended to the Douglas county court by a committee representing all of the leading organizations of the county.

Because of the failure of California and Washington to enact similar legislation, a law approved by the Oregon legislature at its last session, providing the eight-hour day in the lumber industry, will not become effective.

The Booth-Kelly Lumber company has taken an option on the timber holdings of the Auld brothers on the Mohawk river, northeast of Eugene.

Morrow county sheep men have formed a wool pool, representing about 174,000 pounds of wool, and are asking for bids at 45 cents a pound minimum.

Multnomah county has received from the state treasurer the sum of \$283,275.29, representing the first payment from motor vehicle license collections.

L. E. Bean, recently resigned as a member of the state game commission, has been named to succeed Richard S. Smith as state land attorney for Lane county.

Nearly all the mills of Klamath county are now operating, some with both day and night shifts, and lumber production is said to be normal for this season.

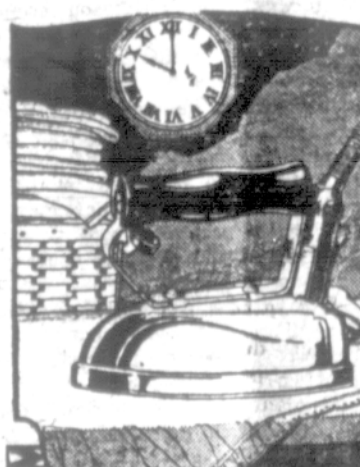
