SCIENTISTS FIND HEAT OF SUN LESS

Earth Becomes 3 to 4 Per Cent Colder Than 15 Months Ago.

Washington, D. C. — Government scientists, including the heads of the United States weather bureau, have been thoroughly startled by results of examinations of the sun's world heating capacity, made by Dr. C. G. Abbot, home secretary of the National Academy of Sciences. According to Dr. Abbot, the sun appears to have gone on strike and is exerting its warming qualities upon the earth to an extent from 3 to 4 per cent less than 15 months ago.

This unusual action on the part of the sun is assumed to be responsible for the present late spring, may have had its influence upon the strange winter season just passed and may presage a damagingly cold summer and an intensely severe season next winter.

Scientists see in the present situation a possible duplication of the disastrous summer of 1916 when frosts occurred during June and July, causing wholesale loss of crops and reducing food production to a minimum.

Weather bureau officials refused to commit themselves on the startling statement made by Dr. Abbot in a paper before the meeting of the Academy of Sciences just closed saying the experiments upon which Dr. Abbot bases his conclusions are so new that it is impossible to determine their value in anticipating weather conditions for long periods in advance.

U. S. Rights Upheld Over Ship Owners.
Washington, D. C. — The United States can compel masters of arriving vessels to submit manifests showing all articles aboard, including those whose importation is prohibited, the supreme court held in a case brought by the government from the state of Washington against Wesley L. Sisco.

Seattle Metal Trades Workers Strike.
Seattle, Wash. — Between 2500 and 3000 metal trades workers went on strike here when employers refused a demand for a flat increase of 10 cents an hour.

GERMAN OFFER REJECTED

French and Belgian Governments Agree Proposals Unsatisfactory.

Paris — France and Belgium have again served notice on Germany that they intend the reparations bill shall be paid in full and that there will be no consideration of any German proposal as long as passive resistance in the Ruhr continues to be the Reich's watchword.

Replying to a joint note to the German offer of last week, the Ruhr allies said that the sum of 30,000,000,000 gold marks represents less than one-fourth of the total which both the reparation commission and Germany recognized as the amount of the debt. France and Belgium advance no proposals of their own, restricting their reply to a categorical rejection of the German terms.

The French note to Germany was communicated in substance to Premier Mussolini of Italy before the final draft was made, it was declared in official circles, and he expressed full approval of it, agreeing with Premier Poincare that the German proposal could not be taken into consideration.

Wall Street Stirred by Fake Buying.
New York — Wall street and stock brokerage houses throughout the East, including Boston, Philadelphia and Wilmington, were thrown into confusion Monday by receipt of buying orders sent by mail, accompanied by spurious certified checks. The orders to buy named many stocks and the checks are on various Pennsylvania banks. The protective department of the American Bankers' association at once put 15 investigators to work in endeavoring to run down the perpetrators.

Ancient Jewish Coinage.
The first allusion to Jewish coinage is found in the Apocrypha in I Maccabees 15, where it is related that Simon, the high priest, was granted permission to coin money bearing his own stamp.

Many Unnecessary Deaths.
From 12 to 14 years have been added to the average human life in the last half century, due to the progress of medical science. But 600,000 persons still die in the United States annually from preventable diseases.

The first Barred Rock hen in the world to lay 1000 eggs in her lifetime is the distinction of F977, an Oregon Agricultural college hen, which began laying January 5, 1916.

Lambs of a probable market value of \$1200 have been killed in the Butter Creek country, near Pendleton, in the last few days by lynx, according to the report of stockmen of that section. A government trapper has been placed on the trail.

Lewis Nixon, 16-year old student of Columbia college at Milton, has confessed to the firing of the Seventh Day Adventist school house, which was burned on election morning last November at Milton, H. H. Pomeroy, state fire marshal, announced.

One hundred dollars in prizes will be distributed among the boys and girls of Douglas county by the county court and farm bureau, which have started a campaign to rid the section of digger squirrels, which are causing considerable loss and damage to the farmers.

There were three fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending April 26, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were George Jackson, Myrtle Point, logger; Louis W. Stittie, yardman, Portland; and John Clifford, logger, Portland. A total of 664 accidents were reported during the week.

Strikes and threatened walkouts of the L. W. W. have not had the effect so far of cutting down the production of lumber in the mills of the northwest nor stopping the continual influx of new business. Reports from the 134 mills to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ended April 21 showed that production was 21 per cent above normal. New business was 18 per cent above normal and shipments 4 per cent above new business.

Referendum of the so-called oleomargarine law enacted at the last session of the Oregon legislature will not be possible at the special election to be held next November. This was the opinion expressed at Salem by a number of attorneys who have examined the bill authorizing the special election. The law passed by the legislature last January providing for the special election on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1923, sets out explicitly that only revenue measures shall be referred.

HARDING TO GO SLOW ON FLEXIBLE TARIFF

Washington, D. C. — President Harding told a delegation from the south, which protested to him against revision of the vegetable oil schedule of the Fordney-McCumber tariff act, that in acting under the flexible provision of the tariff law he would modify rates "only in most striking evidence of the necessity for such a change in rates."

"I can tell you surely," Mr. Harding said, "that the president would proclaim no reduction of the tariff unless there were very pronounced reasons for it."

The flexible provision of the tariff law, which was enacted by congress largely at the insistence of the executive, the president told the delegation, is designed, "to protect the American consumer against inordinate charges as well as the American producer against unfair competition."

Stone Age Copper Mine in Canada.
A copper mine that was worked by miners of the Stone age has been found on an island near Port Arthur, Ontario. The shafts or pits were 20 to 30 feet deep in the solid rock, and the tools which evidently were used were black, egg-shaped stones of great hardness. —Compressed Air Magazine.

Indians to Sue U. S. for \$750,000,000.

Washington, D. C. — The government will be sued for approximately \$750,000,000 by the Sioux Indians who claim a gigantic fraud has been perpetrated against them through violation of their treaty rights. The suit, probably the biggest ever filed against the government, was entered in the court of claims here Monday. Attorneys for the Indians claim that \$,000,000 acres of valuable lands, including the Black Hills of South Dakota, where gold was discovered shortly after the Civil war, were taken from the red men in violation of their treaty rights and without just compensation.

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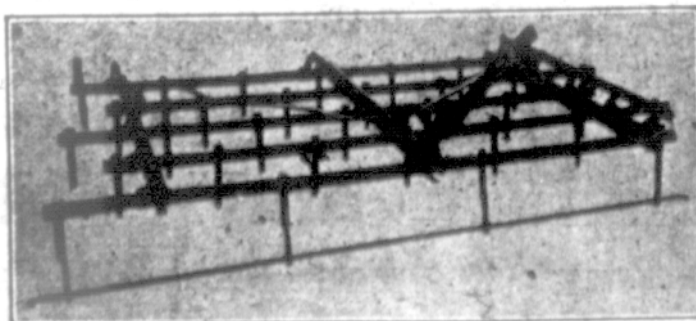
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
