GENERAL INTERESTImportant Occurrences of

Columbia River highway tourists are a month earlier than last year.

Ashland high school will graduate 46 seniors this year, 26 girls and 20 boys.

Central Oregon's field day track meet at Redmond was won by Redmond with 48 points.

The Salem Kiwanis club leads the world for attendance records covering a period of ten weeks.

A drive is on at Roseburg for the purpose of raising \$6000 for a proposed public library building.

The state land department turned over to the state treasurer \$94,703.82 during the month of April.

Fire losses in Oregon, exclusive of Portland, for April, aggregated \$423,315, according to the state fire marshal.

Thirty-two physicians attended the 32d annual meeting of the Southern Oregon Medical association at Ashland.

A division of destroyers will arrive at Astoria early in June to remain during the greater part of the month.

Peeling of cascara bark has begun in western Oregon and dealers look for a good output. Buyers are offering 7 cents.

The Albany Chautauqua probably will be held the week preceding the Fourth of July, according to present arrangements.

A novelty wood-working plant, at the cost of \$5000 will be built at Reedsport and will provide for employment of about 30 men.

Work on the reconstruction of the destroyed streets in the devastated area of Astoria is expected to be under way within a few days.

Sage-rat burrowing in the sides of the central Oregon irrigation canal resulted in one side of the canal giving way 12 miles from Bend.

Eighteen convicts from the Oregon state penitentiary are now employed at McMinnville, where they are cutting wood for the municipality.

With delegates present from all lodges in the Rogue river valley the Southern Oregon Odd Fellows association was organized at Medford.

W. F. Boettcher of The Dalles was elected president of the Oregon Retail Jewellers' association at the 16th annual convention held in Portland.

The annual Jersey picnic for the members of the Linn County Jersey Cattle club will be held at the J. G. Holt farm near Gilkey station on May 19.

Charles M. Snider, for the last eight years editor and publisher of the Wasco News-Enterprise, died suddenly at his Sherman county home of heart disease.

A wage advance of 40 cents a day for employees of the Brooks-Seaman Lumber company and the Shevlin-Hixon company of Bend, has been announced.

Irrigation claims to have produced the first strawberries grown in Oregon this season. N. Beaman and son made their first picking from a small garden patch May 5.

AW, WHAT'S THE USE

CHINESE BANDITS
KIDNAP PASSENGERSOne Prisoner Killed and Prom-
inent American Woman Is
Captured in Raid.

Pekin.—One foreigner was killed and 150 passengers were carried off when bandits held up the Shanghai-Pekin express train on the Tientsin-Pukou railway near the Shantung border according to word received here. Miss Lucy Aldrich of New York city, daughter of the late United States Senator Nelson W. Aldrich of Rhode Island and sister-in-law of John D. Rockefeller Jr., was among the passengers.

The foreigner killed was believed to be a Russian.

The express train was northbound from Soochow when attacked by the bandits, who tore up a long stretch of railroad track. Fifty first-class and 100 second-class passengers were carried off, it was reported here. Six foreigners escaped.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Mayor Hylan of New York issued a proclamation urging the public to observe Monday of each week as "sugarless Monday" until the price of sugar has been reduced.

Secretary of the Interior Work has issued invitations to 135 prominent citizens of the United States to form an advisory committee to solve the problems of the American Indians.

Fraud orders were issued by Postmaster-General Now against Dr. Frederick A. Cook, of North Pole fame, and those associated with him in the development of oil companies in Texas.

George Harvey, American ambassador to Great Britain, declared upon his arrival from England on the steamship George Washington that he knew nothing about reports that he had resigned.

The government shortly will reopen the International Harvester corporation dissolution case to determine if the separation of certain of its properties has been effected, it was said at the department of justice.

The government's application for a temporary injunction to enjoin trading in raw sugar futures by the New York coffee and sugar exchange and its clearing association was denied by the United States circuit court of appeals.

Bank Notes Quickly Retired.—An English bank note has a very short life. In fact, it averages only about two months. As soon as the Bank of England receives a note back from the public, it is not circulated again. It is automatically canceled by having the cashier's signature torn off. Some \$50,000 notes are thus canceled every week.

NEZ PERCES CLAIM STRIP

U. S. Court to Pass on Right to Land in Montana.

Kamiah, Idaho.—The Nez Perce Indian tribe, in session here, adopted a resolution authorizing the signing of a contract on behalf of the tribe with Erven, Joyce and Barlow and John G. Carter, attorneys of Washington, D. C., for the presentation in the United States court of claims of the right of the Indians to a strip across the state of Montana 150 to 200 miles wide from Hellgate, near Missoula, to Miles City, under terms of a treaty of the United States government with the Indians in 1855.

The territory to which the Indians lay claim includes Billings, a part of the Yellowstone national park and the country adjacent to the Northern Pacific and Milwaukee transcontinental railways, and its value will run into many millions.

Rehearing on Wenatchee Road.

Washington, D. C.—Notice was given that the interstate commerce commission would conduct a hearing at Wenatchee, Wash., July 23, before Commissioner Atchison on the application of the Wenatchee Southern railroad for permission to build a new line between Kennewick and Wenatchee. Application has been once denied, but the case was reopened for presentation of further evidence. Commissioner Atchison will also hold a hearing at Spokane, July 30, to take evidence in the commissioners' investigation into the adequacy of transportation facilities in the Pacific northwest.

Nations to Join in China Inquiry.
Washington, D. C.—A joint inquiry by representatives of the foreign governments in Peking as to the causes which made possible the capture of American and foreign citizens in Shantung by Chinese bandits has been agreed to by the Chinese government.

E. P. Farley to Head Board.
Washington, D. C.—Edward H. Farley of Chicago has been selected by President Harding to succeed Albert D. Lasker as chairman of the United States shipping board, formerly vice president of the United States emergency fleet corporation.

Johnson Inspects Ruhr Incognito.
Paris.—Senator Hiram Johnson of California traveled incognito through the Ruhr but refused to discuss what he saw upon arrival here.

Land Bank Directors Chosen.
Washington, D. C.—Selection of 13 directors-at-large for the federal land banks was announced by the farm loan board. They include E. F. Faust, St. Paul; D. P. Hogan, Omaha; Miles Lanster, Wichita; S. A. Lindsay, Houston; William D. Ellis, Berkeley, Cal.; and D. G. O'Shea, Spokane.

Michigan Radical Convicted by Jury.
St. Joseph, Mich.—Charles E. Ruthenberg of Cleveland was found guilty of violating the Michigan law against criminal syndicalism. Ruthenberg faces a prison sentence of 10 years or a fine of \$5000, or both.

Antioch's Claim to Fame.
Antioch, in the Fourth century, is believed to have been the first city to make any attempt to light its streets at night.

4,000 on London Exchange.
The London Stock Exchange has a membership of some 4,000.

U. S. TO DEMAND
ACTION BY CHINA

Washington, D. C.—A situation regarded as seriously menacing good relations between the United States and the Peking government was described by American Minister Schurman in the first official report to reach the state department regarding the capture of American citizens by bandits near the Shantung border.

The American minister is understood to have made official representations on his own responsibility and it is expected he will be instructed by the government to pursue the most vigorous course to secure the release of the prisoners unhurt.

Should any American lose his life, the state department is prepared to make vigorous demands on the Peking authorities for restitution. Not only will suitable apologies be required, but indemnity must be paid and those responsible must be punished if good relations between the two governments are to continue.

E. F. Grable, Labor's Member on Board

Washington, D. C.—President Harding completed the personnel of the United States railroad labor board at Chicago by reappointing Judge R. M. Barton and Horace Baker and naming E. F. Grable, former head of the railway maintenance of way employes. Grable will represent labor on the board. Barton represents the public and Baker is the representative of the railroad managements.

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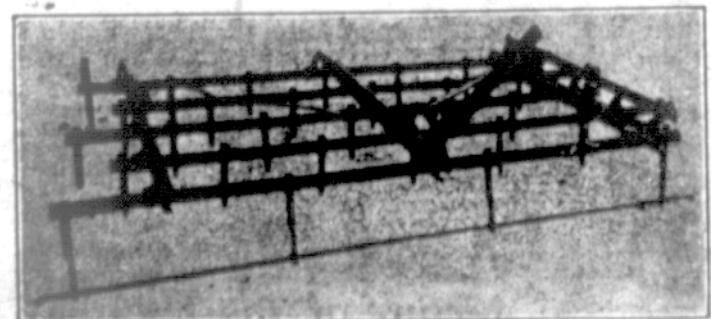
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
