Odd Fellows Meet at North Bend

The grand encampment of the I. O. O. F. at North Bend, Oregon, concluded business and elected officers Tuesday afternoon. The Rebekah assembly convened Tuesday afternoon and the assembly degree was conferred on 300 candidates. The assembly elected officers Wednesday. The following were delegates from Lupine Rebekah lodge to the assembly: Mrs. M. A. Bull, Mrs. Geo. Hennagin and Mrs. G. B. Bourhill. The delegates drove to North Bend with Miss Mary Johnson, former member of the assembly. The grand lodge convened Wednesday. A special session was held Tuesday night to confer the grand lodge degree on 200 candidates. A. M. Young, Otto Peetz and W. B. Johnston were delegates to grand lodge from Moro lodge no. 113. Mr. Johnston was accompanied by his wife, and they expected to later visit at Marshfield with Emmett Sells, former resident of this city.

Lumber Camp is Setting of Movie

A story of red-blooded ruggedness of the lumber camps is "The Man From Lost River." House Peters, who did such good work in "The Storm," is the starring player. The entire cast includes many of the most famous actors under the Goldwyn banner. The picture is taken from the story of Katharine Newlin Burt, which attained such a success a few years ago. Those of the movie fans who are tired of the insipid society picture will welcome this strong, two-fisted, outdoor picture as one of the most satisfying entertainments.

Major Alexander W. Cleary, now in the infantry school at Fort Benning, Georgia, has been ordered to Portland as instructor of infantry in the Oregon national guard.

A public celebration will be held at the opening of the O-W. R. R. & N. tie treating plant at The Dalles, which is expected to take place some time during the next few weeks.

The body of Elmer E. Robbins, prominent Amity resident, was found in his home in that city. Death apparently had been caused by a gunshot wound, self-inflicted.

In preparation for the opening later in June of the new mill of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company at Bend, which will double the company's pine output, a fourth logging camp has been placed in operation.

A bonded indebtedness of \$45,088.15 at present faces the people of Portland and Multnomah county, according to a detailed statement completed by the tax supervising and conservation commission.

A new road, which has been under construction for several months, from Lockhart to Sumpter valley, following Powder river and the Sumpter Valley railroad, will be opened to traffic within a few days.
