Auto License Fund Growing Larger

Receipts from motor vehicle registrations for the first five months of 1923 exceed those for the entire 12 months of 1922 by approximately \$200,000. Receipts of the department to date aggregate \$3,531,712 according to a statement prepared by Secretary of State Kozar which shows the total receipts for 1922 as \$3,340,519.58.

The report shows that 120,635 passenger cars and 10,233 trucks have been registered to date as compared to a total registration of both classes of vehicles of 106,380 for the same period a year ago.
