

Oregon News in Brief

The Pendleton Tribune, established in 1878, has announced its suspension as a daily paper.

Between 600 and 600 grammar school students in Marion county will be graduated this year.

A project for the organization of the Astoria Golf and Country club has been launched at Astoria.

The lumber shipments by water from the Columbia river for May were the largest in several months.

Pioneers of the inland empire, mostly from Umatilla county, gathered at Weston for the annual pioneer picnic.

A total of 675 accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission during the week ended May 31.

Lebanon is to have a genuine wild west round-up during the annual Strawberry Festival which will be held Friday and Saturday.

Feeding of potatoes to sheep is profitable, experiments in Malheur county show, according to the state livestock sanitary board.

Two men were committed from Umatilla county to the eastern Oregon state hospital as the result of drinking moonshine whisky.

William F. Gratke, who has been secretary of the Astoria chamber of commerce during the past two years, has tendered his resignation.

Hardware dealers from all parts of the Willamette valley assembled in Salem and discussed a proposal to organize a permanent association.

About five hundred members of the Cattle and Horse Raisers' association of Oregon attended the annual meet-

ing held at Union, Monday and Tuesday.

The city street department of Eugene has just completed an asphalt paving plant and will start the work of repairing all streets in the city paved with asphalt.

The state land department turned over to the state treasurer during the month of May a total of \$106,987.35, according to a report prepared by George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board.

Another oil drilling outfit will be put in operation east of Sutherlin, within 30 days, according to an announcement made by C. G. Van Hook, who has taken leases on the property held by the Sutherlin Oil & Development company.

A total of 2057 vehicles, motor-driven and horse-drawn, were inspected in the last week for alfalfa weevil at the quarantine station situated on the old Oregon trail near Baker, according to W. J. Brook, inspector in charge of the station.

Two hundred and seventy cars of all grades of lumber were shipped during May by the Baker White Pine Lumber company of Baker, establishing a new record for the eastern Oregon district.

Franchell & Parelus of Portland have received the contract for the erection of the new gymnasium on the Willamette university campus. The cost of the building will be approximately \$75,000.

George I. Smith of Portland has assumed the duties of state parole officer at Salem. He succeeds Jack Little, also of Portland, who is slated for the position of secretary of the child welfare commission.

Opening of the Salem canneries for the season's operations has resulted in an unusual demand for the issuance of working permits to children between the ages of 14 and 18 years, according to C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

A letter from the Kiwanis International headquarters at Chicago is to the effect that the Salem Kiwanis club stands second in the attendance contest in which more than 1000 clubs are participating. The report gave Salem 97.51 per cent.

Preceded by a program of speeches, in which officials and employees of the O-W-R & N. company were featured, The Dalles' newest industry, a \$540,000 treating plant, was formally dedicated Friday before a crowd estimated in excess of 1000 persons.

Existence of a severe epidemic of rabies among the coyotes of Lake county was reported to officials of the Oregon biological survey. Coyotes were said to be entering ranch yards and corrals near Warner mountain and attacking dogs and stock.

The taxpayers of Medford are not only faced with a special election on June 15 to vote on a bond issue of \$180,000 for the construction of a new high school building, but it is understood that soon the people will be called upon to vote a \$900,000 bond issue for a new city water system.

Marked reduction in the number of cattle thefts in the Oregon interior is due in a large measure to the fact that the large majority of these offenders have engaged in the more profitable occupation of manufacturing and selling moonshine liquor, according to a report prepared by Dr. W. H. Lytel, state veterinarian.

The recent decision of the United States supreme court, in which parts of the so-called minimum wage law for women in the District of Columbia were declared to be unconstitutional, does not affect the hours and conditions of labor under the Oregon minimum wage statute, according to an opinion by the attorney-general.

The lumber business in Oregon and the entire Pacific northwest will be ten times as great in ten years as it is now, predicted Colonel William B. Greeley, chief forester of the United States, while in Eugene on his way to Oak Ridge to inspect the tract of 685,000,000 feet of fir timber which the forest service is offering for sale.

One hundred and eighty thousand Douglas fir trees have just been planted on a tract of 115 acres in the Mount Hebo district in the Sitka national forest in Tillamook county. A crew of men averaging 20 in number has been at work for the last month and a half.

Through the use of a form letter in which corporations operating in Oregon have been urged to remit promptly their license fees for next year, the receipts of the state corporation department have increased rapidly during the past few weeks, and are far in excess of the receipts during a similar period in 1922.

The Idaho Power company, in a brief filed with the public service commission, voices its objection to providing electricity for pumping purposes to the Payette-Oregon slope project that the district already owes more than \$25,000 for power, and that there is no indication that the amount will be paid for some time. The public service commission recently ordered the power company to furnish electricity to the district.

Governor Pierce announced that he had removed the entire state board of chiropractic examiners and had appointed among the new members Dr. R. C. Ellsworth of Pendleton, who was relieved of his duties on this board by Ben W. Olcott. Dr. Ellsworth succeeds Dr. D. T. Brown of The Dalles, whose term would have expired June 1. Dr. C. A. Johns of Albany has been appointed on the board to succeed Dr. W. G. Hoffman of McMinnville and Dr. F. T. Nots of Portland has been named to succeed Dr. George Hoeye of Oregon City.

The sale of fishing licenses over the entire state is heavier this year than last and violators of the game laws are less than in any year for eight years, according to reports to the state game commission.

Five tons of dynamite will be set off at the quarry of the A. C. Mathews company of Eugene, near Cosburg in a few days to loosen a large ledge of rock that will be crushed for highway and railroad purposes.

A larger head of irrigation water than has ever before been available is doing much to offset the slight damage to crops incurred during the recent water famine in the Grange Hall, Alfalfa and Powell Butte sections.

The California Packing corporation, with headquarters at San Francisco, has filed application with the public service commission for a postponement of 30 days for the hearing on freight rates on fresh and dried fruits and vegetables. The hearing had been set for June 14 in Portland.

There were five fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ended May 24, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were William Glavey, laborer, St. Helens; Archie McCrea, lineman, Newberg; J. M. Whitney, lineman, Reedsport; E. A. Smith, timekeeper, Estacada, and Herman Hazelwild, chaser, Eugene. A total of 679 accidents were reported during the week.

Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar of Portland was elected president of the state federation of women's clubs on the closing day of the state convention at Medford. Resolutions indorsing the stand of Senator W. E. Borah against the world court plan of President Harding were defeated by a large majority. Other resolutions introduced included a war on the narcotic evil and physical examination for all school teachers, the latter being defeated.
