Paragraphs of State News

Portland council of Boy Scouts and 54 individual troops have been awarded "round-up" streamers by President Harding in recognition of having achieved a net increase in scouts in excess of 25 per cent by February 15 over what it was December 31, 1921. Portland now has 108 troops of scouts with a total membership of 2300.

Charles Goff Thompson, superintendent of Crater Lake national park, with a crew of laborers and two big automobile trucks loaded with food and other supplies, left Medford for Crater lake to begin the work of shoveling a way through the deep snow from the lodge down to Anna spring camp preparatory to the opening of the season July 1.

There were three fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ended June 7, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Marion Coffman, laborer, Mulino; T. E. Whittlesley, laborer, Portland, and John Law, laborer, Prescott. A total of 798 accidents were reported to the commission.

Culmination of 15 years of progressive effort in the breeding and development of blooded stock was exemplified at Union, in the heart of the great stock raising country of eastern Oregon, when its annual stock show opened for the 15th consecutive year with an array of purebred animals which has won for the show the distinction throughout the west of "the baby Pacific International."

Twenty-one per cent of the bonuses that have been paid by the ex-service men's state aid commission have been paid to men who are now non-residents of the state, amounting to \$1,026,088. This represents 4271 claims. The total number of claims sent in by residents of the state is 16,075, amounting to \$4,445,200. The total amount paid out in soldier loans is \$10,105,904, representing 4037 claims.

Investigation of the popular theory that sea lions destroy large numbers of salmon annually off the coasts of Oregon and Washington will be made by Ray C. Steele, federal game warden for the two states. Steele will gather specimens of sea lion stomachs which will be analyzed at Stanford university for the presence of salmon flesh. If no excessive amount is found in the stomachs, Steele will make efforts to check the destruction of sea lions.

Continued reduction of beef cattle production in central Oregon is indicated by applications for grazing permits so far received at the office in Bend of H. L. Picmb, supervisor of Deschutes national forest. Allotments provide range for 3765 head. Application has been made for but 5440 cattle and horses. This is 400 less than cared for in the national forest last year, according to Plumb's figures, and is in sharp contrast to conditions up to four years ago, when the demand for grazing lands exceeded the supply.

A heavy rain visited the Eskine district Wednesday about noon. The roads were made nearly impassable to autos equipped with chains and wheat sown along the road for pasture was laid flat on the ground.

The state highway commission has awarded to Bauers & Bauers the contract for grading and surfacing John Day highway in Grant county. The improvement covers a distance of 14 miles and the cost will total \$167,000.

A spectacular imitation of a frontier carnival, said to be the most elaborate in that line ever given in southern Oregon, will be presented by the Craters' club of Medford at the Douglas county fair grounds Friday and Saturday.

Raymond E. Willis, 30, of The Dalles, and Olive M. Salgado, 27, of Moro, were married late Monday afternoon, June 11th, in the county court chambers at The Dalles, by Judge J. T. Adkinson. Willis is a trainman.

Apportionment of the county fair fund aggregating \$50,574.96 has been completed by Secretary of State Koser. This fund is created by a levy of one twentieth of one mill on the taxable property in each county in the state. Where no county fair is held in a county the fund may be diverted to road purposes. The apportionment for Sherman county amounts to \$769.30.

Governor Pierce at a special commercial association luncheon at Pendleton declared that there can be little reduction made in state expenditures and that the real remedy is in tax equalization.

What is believed to be a new record for wool production on a big flock of range bred and range run sheep was established in Umatilla county by the J. E. Smith company with Delaine-Merinos, a flock of 4629 averaging 14.6 pounds.

By the end of this summer the entire Mt. Hood loop highway will be surfaced with the exception of nine miles within the Oregon national forest. H. D. Farmer, highway engineer of the United States bureau of roads, has announced.

Lumber production in Oregon increased 22 per cent during the first 22 weeks in 1923 compared with the same period for 1922, according to a report by Robert P. Allen, secretary-manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

The reports for May sent into the office in Portland of Stanley G. Jewett, United States biological survey, from 23 government hunters employed to kill predatory animals in Oregon show an unusual good record. Animals totaling 371 were killed by these hunters.

The second annual reunion of the Thompson family of Oregon was held recently at De Moss springs, in Sherman county. The family consists of 125 members, 91 of them descendants of Charles W. and Delilah Thompson, who came to Oregon from Iowa in 1875.
