BRIEF NEWS

Paragraphs on State, County and Community's Events

C. C. Richmond and wife were visitors in The Dalles Tuesday. Mr. Richmond was in that city on business connected with the Sherman county fair.

Mrs. Ruth Fox and children, from Portland, are visiting at the C. E. Johnson home. Mrs. Fox and Mrs. Johnson were school mates, graduating in the same class.

S. H. Arbutnot is in charge of the Moro Hardware and Implement Store this week, during the absence of N. W. Thompson and wife on their annual vacation trip.

Sixty-five farmers from Gilliam and Morrow counties and two families from Jefferson county visited the Experiment Station on the special day set aside for farmers from Gilliam and Morrow counties.

The six miles of rock surfacing of the Old Oregon Trail highway over the Blue mountains is being rushed to completion for the big dedication celebration to be held on top of the mountain at Meacham on July 3rd and 4th.

The state highway department is resurfacing the Columbia river highway for 14 miles west of Pendleton, by working the old road bed and laying a new macadam coating of two inches of crushed rock.

Roy Kusman, Arch Fortner, Guy Pickard and H. B. Pinkerton spent part of last Sunday trying to tempt trout from the DesChutes river near the Rattlesnake grade. They had the usual fisherman's luck, the catch was light, Kusman leading with six to his credit.

The report of Prof. Wm. Ridgeway, treasurer of the Sherman County Field Meet Association, shows a total of \$134.98 on hand after all bills were paid that were incurred by the association this year. This amount will be distributed among the four districts into which the association is divided according to the total points won by each district in the field meet contest held last month. Each district will also divide its proportionate amount among the schools in its district in accordance to the points won by the district and members of each school participating in the meet.

In small plots, and the final test by farmers of the county of wheat is finally brought to what may be considered commercial growing.

The Station has plots of ground that have been cropped continuously for 13 years, this to demonstrate that continuous use of land under one crop is detrimental to the land. Other plots are used to show the effects of continuous hit and miss farming, commonly called guesswork. Other plots are used to show the effects of well considered farming along proper lines.

These tillage experiments show that the best time for plowing is always in April, the earlier the better, and that the proper time for sowing wheat is late September or early October. The work of the Station also provides that any winter wheat, regardless of variety, must have a definite number of days and nights in which to mature a crop.

Farmers who understand the work of the Station visit the farm as many times during the year as they visit Moro. The reason for their interest is not hard to understand when it is known that from a single head of wheat, now known as federation, grown on the Station in 1915 there is 15,000 acres of this wheat being grown commercially this year. Tests show it to be a high grade wheat of superior milling qualities and that within a short time it will be accepted as a better wheat for farmers to grow than turkey red which is a prime favorite at this time.
