Big Crowd at Sunday School Rally

The County Sunday School Rally held last Sunday was a splendid success. At the Sunday School session at ten o'clock over two hundred were registered. Due to the threatening clouds in the forenoon many did not arrive until later, so that in all about three hundred people or more were there in attendance.

The Sunday School, after a song service led by Rev. Clark Smith of The Dalles, Sunday School Missionary of the American Sunday School Union, the audience was divided into seven classes, as follows:

Men's class, Rev. B. L. Hicks of the Christian church of Wasco, teacher; women's class, Mrs. W. C. Bryant of Methodist church, Moro, teacher; young people's class, Rev. Clark Smith of The Dalles, teacher; intermediate junior boys, Rev. E. E. Cisma of Portland, teacher; intermediate junior girls, Miss Julia Hatch of Cheng-Mai, Siam, teacher; primary class, Mrs. Henry G. Hanson of the Presbyterian church, Moro, teacher; beginners class, Mrs. Richard Dingle of the Christian church, Wasco, teacher.

Following the Sunday school session was an address by Miss Julia Hatch, Presbyterian missionary from Siam, who spoke of her work as principal of a girls' high school of 250 pupils in Cheng-Mai, Siam. Illustrating her talk by presenting about eight girls in Siamese costumes. Rev. E. E. Cisma of Portland, state secretary of the Oregon State Council of Religious Education spoke on Religious Education.

After a sumptuous picnic dinner, the afternoon program consisting of numbers from the various Sunday Schools of the county were interestingly rendered.

At the close of the rally a union service of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches of Moro, was held, to which most of the large audience remained. Rev. E. E. Cisma preaching the sermon. A large share of the success of the rally is due to Mr. R. C. Byers, who has been busy for weeks planning and working for this event.

Campus Scenes in "The Great Alone"

Football enthusiasts, of which there are an ever-increasing number, will find some stirring moments in a grid iron conflict which forms one of the sequences of "The Great Alone," a production starring Monroe Salisbury, which will be presented at Moro theatre, Tuesday, July 3d.

Contrary to the usual custom of picturing a corner of a stadium with a handful of people as spectators, the producers have reproduced the actual feature game of California's football season: Stanford vs. University of California. And the scenes of the rosters' section in the stadium will prove a revelation, aside from the stirring action on the field. The Stanford stadium is one of the largest in the country. And the rosters, packed row on row, present a compact mass in monotone. But that mass possesses a chameleon-like ability to change its hue, and suddenly one finds that acting in unison, solid phalanxes of them have turned altogether white, and there stands out from the mass a big letter S. Another quick change and a letter T, another A, and then N, F, O, R, D. in the order named, spelling the name of the alma mater STANFORD. Never a hitch as the great letters, formed by hundreds of undergraduates, flash, one after the other, across the field of packed humanity. It is wonderful; and to any one in whom the college spirit has not died out it is positively thrilling. "The Great Alone" tells the story of a football hero who carried his chivalry into the great Canadian fastnesses and proved himself a man among men, though handicapped with the stigma: Half-breed.
