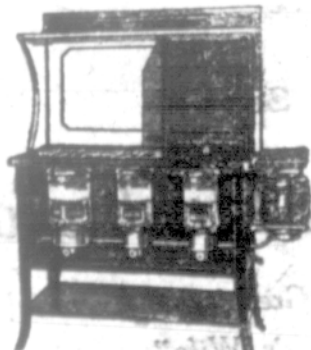

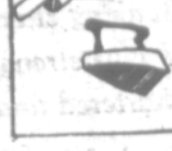

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ALIEN CUSTODIAN TO CONTINUE POLICY

Washington, D. C.—Alien Property Custodian Miller was directed by President Coolidge to continue the policy instituted under President Harding of liquidating alien property assets embraced in trust valued at \$10,000,000 and over.

Trusts with a less value are gradually being returned to former enemy aliens under the Winslow act passed by the last congress.

Liquidation of the larger trusts is being carried out wherever it would result advantageously to the government and the trusts involved.

Mr. Miller told the president that approximately \$300,000,000 of assets would be held by the government after the claims allowed under the Winslow bill were disposed of, and this sum will be held as an offset until the claims of American citizens against Germany are adjudicated by the mixed claims commission and paid.

Of the total amount of alien property approximately \$180,000,000, Mr. Miller said, is represented in the treasury by cash, drawing interest at 4 1/2 per cent.

Cuba's War Loan Paid in Full.
Washington, D. C.—The Cuban government is the first of America's war-time debtors to pay off the total amount of its loan. The second and final payment on the balance of \$5,000,000 owed by Cuba was paid to the treasury by the National City bank of New York, acting for the Cuban government.

Mexican Recognition Declared Near.
Washington, D. C.—Resumption of friendly relations with Mexico is regarded here as virtually a certainty and it is expected that official announcement of such a step will be made shortly by the Washington government.

Notes Fruitless, Belgium's Reply.
Brussels.—The usefulness of exchanging diplomatic notes over the reparations question has been exhausted; the allied governments have completed their study of the problem and the time has arrived for resumption of direct conversations between the governments. These are the conclusions of Belgium's reply to the latest note from the British foreign secretary.

Riot Breaks Up Parade By Klan.
Pittsburg, Pa.—One white-robed klanman was killed, another man seriously wounded and a number of other persons hurt during hours of rioting precipitated by an attempt of Ku Klux klanmen to parade through the village of Carnegie's suburb, after a spectacular demonstration on a nearby hill.

Yield of Wheat Best Since 1921.
Washington, D. C.—The 1923 wheat crop of countries north of the equator, which produce about four-fifths of the world supply, is estimated by the department of agriculture at 2,696,365,000 bushels, compared with 2,566,510,000 in 1922, and 2,477,828,000 in 1921.

Uchida Premier Pro Tem of Japan.
Tokyo.—Baron Uchida, foreign minister, is premier pro tem of Japan following the death of Premier Kato.
