Religious Council Elects Officers

The Sherman county council of religious education met last week at Kent. There was fine attendance right through, the Kent community especially having a splendid representation. Moro had the largest representation on Wednesday evening, fourteen people being in attendance. Thursday afternoon and evening there were fair representation from Moro and Wasco at the conference. The Kent schools furnished special numbers both evenings. Wednesday evening J. M. Wilson gave the address of welcome, and on Thursday evening Mr. Sibley, principal of Kent public schools gave an interesting talk. The main messages on both evenings were given by Rev. C. C. Cissna, of Portland, state secretary of the council on religious education. At the business session on the second day it was decided to make the budget for the coming year \$90, of which \$50 is to go for state work. R. C. Byers the county president, and who was again re-elected to the same office for the third time, was elected delegate to the state convention at McMinnville, which meets there this week.

The following were unanimously elected county officers for the coming year: President, R. C. Byers, of Moro; vice president, B. M. Sias, of Kent; district superintendents: R. L. Birks, Wasco; W. L. Dillingham, Moro; Mrs. Westerfield, Grass Valley; J. C. Hartley, Kent; adults department, superintendent, J. M. Wilson; children's division, Mrs. O. A. Ramsey; older girl's division, Mrs. C. L. Foley; older boy's division, A. M. Wright.

The next annual convention will be held in Moro November, 1924.

Thirty million trout will have been planted in the streams of Oregon this year by the time the season ends this fall, according to State Game Warden A. E. Burghdoff.
