Sherman County Pioneer Visits Moro

Mrs. Sherman Huff was a visitor
this week at the O. B. Messinger
home in this city. The family for-
merly lived in Sherman county, west
of Moro. They now operate farming
lands in Canada, about eighty miles
northeast of Edmonton, Alberta
province.

Mrs. Huff said, when calling at
the Observer office, that farming
operations "up north" are done quite
differently than in Sherman county.
Their harvest is now just nicely
started and after cutting and stacking
the grain, it is threshed during the
long winter months as good working
days permit. Such a small item as
forty below zero does not prevent
outdoor work, providing it is not
otherwise disagreeable. In fact Mrs.
Huff complained of being chilly when
Sherman county folks were enjoying
the fine late summer days of last
week.

The family left Sherman county
sixteen years ago. This being the
first time since that Mrs. Huff has
visited in this state. She was expect-
ing to go from here to Bend where
she will visit with two of her sons,
who are working at that place. A
younger son is accompanying her on
her travels. From Bend she will go
to southern Oregon, where she will
visit relatives before returning to
Canada in the spring.

Oregon News in Brief

Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy, Portland
physician, has been decorated with the
legion of honor by the French govern-
ment for her hospital service during
the war.

Operating and maintenance of way
officials of the Southern Pacific sys-
tem are expected to arrive this week
on the usual pre-winter inspection trip
of the lines of Oregon.

One hundred and sixty-three car-
loads, or approximately 78,900 head of
central Oregon lambs, have been ship-
ped out of Bend this fall to be fatten-
ed for the spring markets.

The driest fall in the 52 years dur-
ing which rainfall records have been
kept by the United States weather
bureau, with only one exception, is
the present season in Portland.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power
company has been granted a fran-
chise by the public service commis-
sion to construct a pole line along the
Columbia River highway between Port-
land and Seaside.

Mary Seymour, the last of the Wasco
tribe of Indians, which once inhabit-
ed the basin where The Dalles is now
located, and from which Wasco coun-
ty was named, died at The Dalles at
the age of 113 years.

One hundred and twenty-nine mills
reporting to the West Coast Lumber-
men's association for the week to
November 1 manufactured 109,354,944
feet of lumber, sold \$3,501,089 feet and
shipped 102,915,536 feet.

An extension of time to July 1,
1924, has been granted the Southern
Pacific for construction of the Maple-
ton-Cushman road, which is being re-
built to replace the one taken as a
roadbed for the Coos Bay line.

The constitutionality of the law re-
quiring a county to return to a city
70 per cent of the road taxes collect-
ed on property in the city limits is to
be tested in a suit brought by the city
of Astoria against Clatsop county.

The Cottage Grove city council and
the forest service practically have ar-
rived at an agreement whereby the
sale is permitted of about two billion
feet of timber upon the Laying creek
watershed, which supplies the city.

Officers of the Tillamook County
Creamery association have requested
the public service commission to is-
sue an order compelling the Ameri-
can Railway Express company to ex-
tend its free delivery zone in the city
of Tillamook.

La Grande is planning its future
water supply from Mill creek, near
Summerville, where three springs
come out of the ground, supplying
each day more than 7,000,000 gallons
of water. The system will require a
15-mile pipeline.

A. S. Johnson has moved his well
drill from the Eston farm, west of
Grass Valley, to the Q. E. Gwynn
farm, located about two miles east
of Emigrant Springs, near Hoodlake.

A. Zell, father of J. M. Zell,
proprietor of Zell's Funeral Home,
died at his home in Primville Mon-
day. At the time of his passing,
Mr. Zell was more than 90 years of
age.

A. S. Johnson moved one of his
well drills to the Art Barzee farm,
northwest of Moro, Tuesday. George
Witter of Kent will operate the drill
while Mr. Johnson operates a second
drill in the Klondike section of the
county.

One man killed and four persons
injured, two seriously, was the result
of Sunday evening auto accident near
the east city limits of The Dalles.
Glaring headlights of an approaching
car was the direct cause, forcing the
car to go over an embankment.

A party of four Grass Valley youths
upset and partially wrecked their
car in the early hours of last Satur-
day morning about five miles south
of that city. They all went to sleep
and let the car drive itself. They were
returning from a dance at Kent.

The annual Dorcas Society bazaar
will be held this year on Saturday,
December 8th, at Hotel Moro. The
afternoon will be given over to sales
of fancy work, embroidery, plain
sewing, and home made candies. A
home cooked chicken dinner will be
served in the dining room of the
hotel in the evening.

A party of four Moro hunters,
comprising E. R. Barzee, H. G.
Ginn, Bart Birrell and Raymond
Henrichs brought back 100 ducks
Saturday evening as proof of their
hunting trip to the vicinity of Fort
Klamath. They made the 254 mile
return drive in 13 hours, leaving
shortly after 7 a. m. and arriving at
Moro at 8 p. m.

Results from farm rotation are not
very marked at first. In a rotation
experiment of the Oregon Agricul-
tural college experiment station
farm which has been going for ten
years, grain continuously yielded 30
bushels of barley to the acre. On the
same soil which had a rotation that
included a legume crop the yield of
barley this year was 61 bushels to the
acre.

A total of 446 animals and 28 stock
judging teams from the northwest
were heavy competitors in the boys'
and girls' livestock judging contest
held in conjunction with the Pacific
international livestock exposition
held in Portland last week. Oregon
was represented by 350 animals and 19
crack judging teams, while Washing-
ton and Idaho had an exhibit of 296.
Idaho sent one judging team and
Washington eight.

At a mass meeting held Tuesday
evening at the Presbyterian church
in the interests of organizing a civic
circulating library and, possibly,
a public reading room for Moro a com-
mittee was appointed consisting of
L. M. Peterson, D. E. Stephens, Mrs.
N. W. Thompson, Mrs. O. A. Ram-
say, and H. G. Hanson, to formulate
plans and report at a meeting to be
held next Monday evening, Novem-
ber 19th, in the council room.

Glen Schultz, Bob Rash, Millie
Benson, and Zella Burnett had a
narrow escape from serious injury
Wednesday evening when a super six
Hudson roadster, owned and driven by
Rash, upset near the north limits of
Wasco. The party had been enjoying a
ride, had turned back and were going
towards Wasco when the accident
occurred at a curve by too close driv-
ing to the edge of the road. The drop
was hardly more than two feet, the
car going over onto its side. Those in
the car escaped with bruises and sprains.

About sixty members and friends,
not counting children, attended the
Dorcas social at the L. L. Peetz
home Wednesday afternoon. Novem-
ber being Thanksgiving month, the
rooms were set off with decorations
emblematic of the month, turkeys,
butterflies, corn, and fruit predom-
inating. A guessing game occupied
part of the time, Mrs. Ina Kusman
favored the guests with a vocal solo
and Miss Frances Morrissey with an
instrumental selection. Refreshments
consisting of crackers, fruit salad and
coffee were served.

The annual farmers short course
in farm mechanics at the Oregon
Agricultural college covering selec-
tion, care, repair, and adjustment
of farm tractors, trucks, automobiles,
and other mechanical equipment and
farm buildings will open January 2d
for eleven weeks, and the special
short course will open February 18th
for one week. This course is particu-
larly adapted to the man on the
farm, giving him a chance to enjoy
the fellowship, social and athletic
activities and chances for advancement
with the college student. Further

Mechanics department, Oregon Agri-
cultural college, Corvallis, Oregon.

Items of Interest From Every where

The Eastern Oregon Light & Power
company has filed with the public
service commission application for re-
valuation of its properties.

Fire broke out in the basement of
the new Baptist church at Corvallis
and before it was subdued had done
damage estimated at \$10,000.

Work is being rushed on the McKay
dam near Pendleton. About 200 men
are employed and double shifts are be-
ing used on tunnel and rock work.

Tuesday's special election in Oregon,
which resulted in approval of the in-
come tax law, cost the taxpayers of
the state between \$75,000 and \$100,-
000.

The Hood River Traffic association
composed of all fruit shippers in the
county, have petitioned rail lines to
adopt a practical emergency rate on
apples.

Five hundred Knights of Pythias
from southern Oregon attended a dis-
trict convention of the order at Med-
ford at which 70 candidates were in-
stituted.

The Stout Lumber company, oper-
ating two sawmills at North Bend, is
preparing to open a large area of ex-
cellent timber in the Seven Devils dis-
trict, fifteen miles southwesterly from
the city. Several miles of logging
railway from the timber to the head
of tidewater on South Inlet will be
constructed and two logging camps
will be operated.

Assessed valuation of property in
Oregon, exclusive of public utilities,
this year aggregates \$15,879,880.16 in
excess of the valuations last year, ac-
cording to a statement prepared by
the state tax commissioner. Valua-
tions as reported by the assessors in
all counties of the state total \$901,-
672,976.

The volume of products canned by
the Ashland Preserving company will
be at least 50 per cent greater this
year than during any former year, and
the entire product has been sold. An
average of 75 persons were employed
during the season.

The Clatsop county court will open
bids December 6 on the construction
of a reinforced concrete bridge across
the Necanicum river on Broadway at
Seaside to replace the present struc-
ture, which it reported to be in a
dangerous condition.

An oil lamp, knocked from the hands
of Henry Linster, manager of a re-
sult at East lake, near Bend, as he was
passing through a low doorway, start-
ed a fire, which resulted in \$20,000
damages. The hotel, bath-house, boat-
house and 19 boats were burned.

Members of the Ku Klux Klan from
every section of western Oregon gath-
ered in Salem on the occasion of the
first ceremonial of the organization
held in that part of the state. Officers
of the Klan estimated that between
5000 and 6000 persons participated in
the ceremony.

George Neuner of Roseburg, until
recently district attorney of Doug-
las county, who has been at McMinn-
ville investigating the finances of
Yamhill county is in Astoria to assist
the prosecuting attorney of Clatsop
county in investigating a number of
bootlegging cases.

Oregon walnuts this year are of
higher quality than ever before, ac-
cording to reports received at the
offices of the Oregon Growers Co-op-
erative association at Salem. It was
said that practically all of the 1923
crop has been contracted, at prices
satisfactory to the producers.
