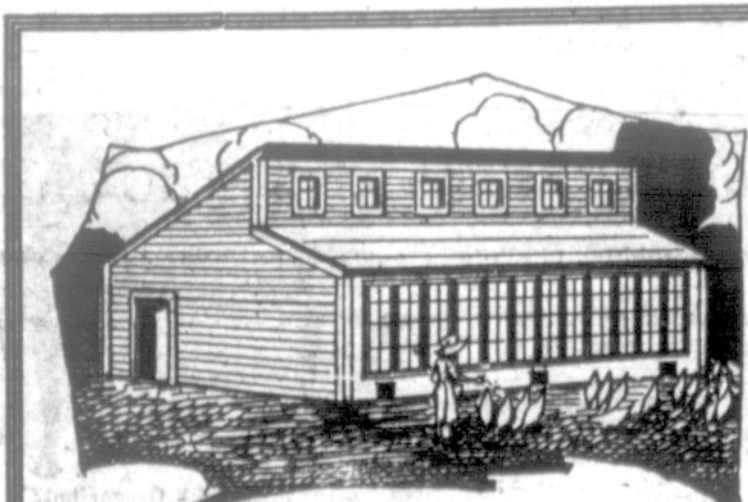

Movie News of the Current Week

Don't miss that most thrilling picture "One Week of Love," at Moro theatre Saturday, December 22d. A little birdie whispered something about this picture being a "bird" and the little birdie was right. Action, beauty of photography and some excellent acting by Elaine Hammerstein and Conway Tearle raise this Selsnic photoplay to the heights. It is worthy of taking its place in the motion picture hall of fame without further ado.

The backgrounds are those constructed by nature; mountains of incomparable magnificence, raging torrents and great spaces of sky! Without its story, "One Week of Love" would be a succession of very beautiful pictures, but when you add a yarn about a highstepping society girl who falls into a nest of outlaws—you have the picture you have been waiting for through many a film-hungry day.

F. C. Moquet, farming on the Homer Belshie place at the east end of the base line road, was in town Tuesday.

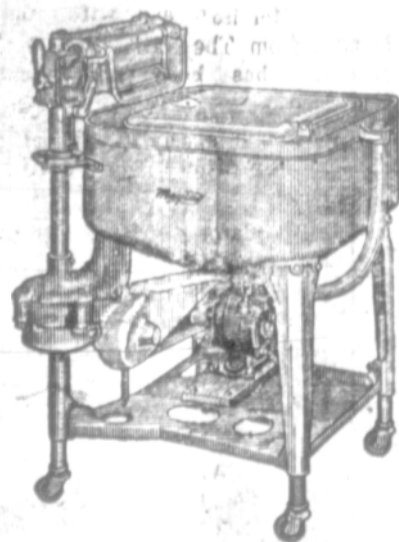
Mrs. Leah Sibray, from Baker, was a visitor the past week at the home of her parents, E. A. Cushman and wife, north of Moro.
