Indians from all parts of Oregon are to meet in Roseburg January 26, with representatives of the Federation to Women's Clubs of California, Oregon and Washington. The women have been interested in the claim of the Indian tribes of western Oregon that the government still owes \$11,500,000 for lands lying west of the Cascades and south from the Columbia river to the Rogue river, which were procured under the treaty of 1855, and plans will be made at the coming meeting to obtain further recognition of the claim from the government. Women it is stated, have been instrumental in adding the California Indians in obtaining their money on a similar claim.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Reports of the arrest of Minister of War Trotsky, which have reached Moscow officials through various newspaper correspondents, are emphatically denied.

President Potomac renewed his declaration before the French chamber of deputies that the French government would not accept a reduction in the German reparations.

The act of the 1923 Alabama legislature providing for a presidential preferential primary election in Alabama was held by Attorney-General Davis to be unconstitutional and void.

Unhindered by immigration quota restrictions that restrict the entrance of Europeans and Asiatics, Canadians are flocking into this country, taxing the Detroit immigration office to its utmost.

Finally barred from playing in the Olympic tennis matches as an American, Mrs. Molla Mallory, former national champion of this country, probably will resume the Norwegian colors which she wore into competition in the Olympic games of 1912 at Stockholm.

Mexican Troops in U. S. Territory. Naco, Ariz.—While hundreds of citizens of Mexico and the United States looked on Sunday, Mexican federal troops crossed the international boundary at this little town, entrained in special cars waiting for them, and began their journey to Juarez, Mexico.

Vancouver Doctor Held Drug Vendor. Vancouver, Wash.—Dr. Charles G. MacCallum, formerly city health officer here, and a resident of this city for about ten years, was arrested by federal officers on a charge of violating the Harrison anti-narcotics act.

Details Crisped By Rail Strike. London.—Railway service through out England, Scotland and Wales was badly crippled, and in some places completely paralyzed Monday by the strike of locomotive engineers and firemen.

French Torpedo Hits Colorado. London.—The American cruiser Colorado was struck by a torpedo from a submarine during naval maneuvers and slightly damaged, according to a dispatch from Cherbourg.

The public service commission has announced the establishment of joint through rates, effective February 19, between Gypsum, eastern Oregon, on the Oregon Short Line, and points on the lines of the Southern Pacific south of Portland on carload shipments of wall plaster, land plaster and gypsum rock. The new carload rate on a 60-400-pound car of land plaster to Eugene is 38 1/2 cents for 100 pounds, a reduction of 7 1/2 cents for 100 pounds, or 4 1/2 per cent.

Reductions in automobile insurance rates which may result in a saving as high as \$200,000 in premiums to the motorists of Oregon in a year were made public when new insurance manuals were received in Portland. The reduction involves about 50 per cent of the insurance companies doing automobile coverage in Oregon. According to the new manual, fire and theft insurance has been reduced an average of 15 per cent. Liability insurance rates, it is estimated, have been cut 30 per cent on the average, while collision insurance has been cut 50 per cent on the average.

The epidemics of diphtheria and measles which have been raging in Portland for several weeks are rapidly waning, according to the records of the health bureau. There are now but sixty cases of diphtheria in quarantine as against about 185 during the peak of the epidemic, and only 255 cases of measles against near 1000 during the epidemic's worst period.

County judges and commissioners who gathered at Salem in annual convention were requested by W. I. Fullerton, commissioner of Columbia County, to go on record urging Governor Pierce to call a special session of the Oregon legislature to untangle the tax situation following the recent action of the supreme court in declaring void the law creating the tax supervising and conservation commission.

Reports received in Salem during the past few days indicate that there will be at least three candidates for the office of secretary of state at the republican primary election next May, included among the men mentioned prominently in connection with the contest are Sam A. Koser, incumbent, Carl D. Shoemaker, secretary of the state fish commission, and A. H. Lee, former secretary of the state fair board.

County Clerk Florey has issued a further notice to dog owners of Jackson county that dog licenses of 1924 are overdue and that failure to get a license means that all dogs without them will be summarily dealt with.

A dairy products exchange has been organized by dealers of Portland and will begin active operations next week. It will be known as the Portland Wholesale Dairy Produce Exchange and starts out with 15 charter members.

A movement to provide for the maintenance of the forests along the state highways throughout different parts of Oregon has been launched by the state chamber of commerce, which is seeking the aid of the United States forest service.

Income tax return blanks have been adopted by the state tax commissioner, and are now being prepared by the state printer. Names of persons affected by the income tax are being assembled, and it is likely that the work of sending out the blanks will start within the next week or ten days.

Operatives of the state prohibition department caused the arrest of 530 persons on charges of violating the prohibition laws during the nine months ending December 31, 1923, according to a report prepared by George L. Cleaver, state prohibition director. Fines during the nine months aggregated \$101,344.94.
