Brief Review of Soldiers' Bonus Bill

The soldiers compensation bill, now pending before congress, is different from the one vetoed by president Harding. Briefly, the bill provides that ex-service men who served overseas or afloat are entitled to adjusted service credit of \$1.25 for each day of service and those who served at home \$1.00 for each day of service. From this would be subtracted the \$60.00 bonus paid when leaving the service.

Men entitled to \$50.00 or less would be paid cash. Those entitled to more than \$50.00 would be issued endowment insurance policies, payable at the end of 20 years bearing 4 1/2 per cent compound interest, with liberal loan values.

Vocational training aid at the rate of \$1.75 per day to complete education interrupted by the war. Credits based on length of service to assist veterans in purchasing homes, land or improving same, or to pay off landed indebtedness.
