Early fruit trees are blossoming in Eugene.

Bend's first automobile show was held last week with 14 makes of cars, including 35 models, on display.

The erection of a cannery in Newberg was assured at a meeting in that city of more than 100 fruit growers.

Indications of a good mohair season for Oregon growers are seen in reports from the east of continued firm markets.

Lane county pear growers have begun their first spraying of the year as the buds are now shooting forth on the branches.

L. W. Metzger, contractor, will construct a building in Marshfield for the Coos and Curry Telephone company to cost \$150,000.

In a special school election Klamath Falls voters approved by a ten to one vote a \$25,000 bond issue for the purchase of a new school house site.

Enactment of a law authorizing the state to print its public school textbooks probably will be requested at the next session of the legislature.

A welfare clinic under the auspices of the Portland school of welfare work of the University of Oregon will be held in Pendleton March 12 and 22.

Samuel Boyer, 50, warehouseman for several years at Bredwell station, west of Amity, committed suicide by placing strychnine in his coffee while eating his lunch.

company have started a survey from the Southern Pacific railroad near Kirk and leading into company timber in that locality.

The Nevada-California-Oregon railroad has asked the Interstate commerce commission to authorize six miles of new line northward from Lakeview into timber tracts.

Senator McNary's bill to appropriate \$500,000 for a veteran's hospital at Portland, was disapproved by General Frank L. Hines, director of the veterans' bureau, in a letter to congress.

Salem merchants have petitioned the city council to draft an ordinance prohibiting preachers, peddlers, musicians and various religious sects from operating in certain sections of the business district.

The public service commission has suspended until a date to be fixed by the commission the proposed new tariff filed some time ago by the Home Telephone & Telegraph company of southern Oregon.

W. C. Culbertson, one of the owners of the Corneliuss and Seward hotels in Portland, was appointed by Governor Pierce to succeed Arthur C. Spencer as a member of the state bonus commission.

In future all auto camps operating within the corporate limits of the city of Pendleton will be required to pay an annual license fee of \$1000, according to the provisions of an ordinance

adopted by the city council.

Formation of a three-county export commission league in support of the McNary-Haugen bill for farmer relief took place at a meeting at the Dalles attended by more than 200 farmers and business men from Wasco, Sherman and Gilliam counties.

The Oregon State Retail Merchants' association closed its sessions at Eugene with the adoption of a resolution pledging the support of the merchants to the McNary-Haugen wheat price regulation bill and the Kelly-Stein manufacturing bill now before congress.

A uniform system of accounting and statistical records covering all transactions of the various automobile passenger stage and truck corporations operating in Oregon will be demanded in rules and regulations now being formulated by the public service commission.

I. H. VanWinkle, attorney-general, acting at the request of Governor Pierce, will assign a special prosecutor to Yamhill county to assist the district attorney there in handling the cases against Walter Toose Jr., and J. M. Templin, prominent residents of McMinnville.

At a meeting held in Condon and composed of the majority of farmers and business men of Gilliam county, two resolutions were adopted without a dissenting vote, urging congress to pass the McNary-Haugen export corporation wheat bill. In addition to this, every man and woman present contributed to a fund to be used in defraying expenses and organizing themselves into the Gilliam Farmers and Business Men's league.

Miles Cannon, field commissioner of the bureau of reclamation, Washington, D. C., met with 300 Klamath irrigators to hear complaints and recommendations of the water users. Cannon's findings on this project will be submitted in a report to the secretary of the interior.

A meeting of the labor officials of Oregon, California and Washington probably will be held within the next few weeks to determine the best methods to be used in handling unemployed in the three states, it is announced by C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

Helen H. Moore, 19-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Moore, of Salem, was declared winner of the first prize in the contest conducted by the Salem chamber of commerce with relation to designing an automobile windshield sticker appropriate for advertising that city.

A new town will spring up at Odell lake within the next six weeks with a population of more than 1500 persons, according to the railroad contractors on the Eugene-Klamath line, who plan to establish camps at Odell where a small army of workers will be quartered probably for the next year.

The winter fishing season on the Columbia river will close Saturday and no commercial fishing will be permitted from then to the opening of the regular spring season at noon on May 1. The winter season has been a fairly successful one for the comparatively few fishermen who have had their nets in the water.

Roy Klein, secretary of the state highway commission, announced that he had instructed John Baker, district attorney of Hood River county, to proceed with the prosecution of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company on charges of wanton destruction of trees along the Columbia river highway in the vicinity of Castle Rock.

A list of bootleggers and moonshiners in Wasco and Sherman counties, was received by Sheriff Chrisman from Sheriff Hill of Tulare, Cal. The list was taken from the body of Roy Vincent, alias "Alabama," who was killed by the California sheriff while resisting arrest in connection with the Mosier bank robbery of last November.

While engaged in blasting stumps on their land between Aurora and Wilsonville, Naef brothers, prosperous farmers, found in the wreckage of one big stump a \$10 gold piece and two silver dollars. A careful search failed to reveal any more money. There is a general impression that the money was a part of the loot stolen from the Aurora bank.

The Fidelity & Deposit company, with headquarters in Maryland, which in April, 1923, bonded George L. Cleaver, state prohibition director, in the amount of \$5000, has notified Governor Pierce and Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, that the protection afforded the official under the bond would be terminated at the expiration of the 30-day period.

Cutting of bag limits and shortening of open seasons for fish and game in the interest of wild life conservation is a definite program agreed upon by the state sportsmen's association at its annual meeting in Portland.

Theodore T. Geer, who served as tenth governor of the state of Oregon in the years 1899-1903, died at his home, 470 East Fifty-third street North, Portland, as the result of a stroke of paralysis suffered recently. The ex-governor was 73 years old.

There were three fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending February 21, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims included: C. A. Moran, Portland, faller; Ernest Soash, Seaside, truck driver; and A. E. Aldridge, Rector, logger. A total of 599 accidents was reported.

Fines collected through the activities of the state traffic officers operating under the direction of the law enforcement bureau of the state motor vehicle department during 1923 aggregated \$28,761.15, according to the annual report of the traffic department. Fees totaled \$32,459.63. The report indicates that the traffic officers covered 247,996 miles and made 1575 arrests.

Twin Falls was selected for the state nominating convention, August 25, and St. Maries was chosen for the convention to elect delegates to the national convention, June 24.

DAMASCUS A BEAUTIFUL CITY

Homs, Hama and Aleppo Also Are Among the Near East's Attractive Places.

Damascus is considered one of the most beautiful cities of the East. All along the road from Beirut to this ancient city in the desert there are camel trains, almost in a continuous line, carrying the grain of the plains to the sea and bringing back the produce of the Western world. The bazaars of Damascus are the most interesting in the Near East, although they are not so extensive as those of Constantinople. After Damascus, Homs and Hama, on the road to Aleppo, attract attention, as they are in the midst of wild, desert country, but refreshed by never ending water. Homs is the center of a great grazing country, and Hama, with its ancient waterwheels pumping water in primitive fashion, is the center of an important silk industry and market. Aleppo is a source of delight, for her bazaars are more primitive than those of any other city in the country, and for the same reason full of charm. One can buy any produce of the Near and Farther East from these merchants, the produce of the looms of Persia, the silk of China, brought thousands of miles by caravan, and wonderful brass and inlay work.

Church on the Roof.

A roof garden has been installed on the top of the new \$250,000 Methodist Episcopal church at Austin, Tex. Lacking the lawn which usually surrounds churches in cities the size of Austin and smaller, and on which the night services of summer may be held, the board of stewards decided to build a roof garden where the congregation may worship in the outdoor breezes. Over the four-foot parapet wall, which will surround the roof garden, the congregation will look on the east into the grounds of the state capital. Special electric fixtures, attached to the walls, will illumine the garden. Movable seats will be installed, and special arrangements made for seating the choir of the church.
