## Movie News of the Current Week

If Victor Hugo could but return to the world for one single night there is little doubt that he would gasp with amazement at the magnificence of the Universal production "The Hunchback of Notre Dame," adapted from his greatest masterpiece. Each tiny detail of the book and of the period was studied for months and faithfully reproduced on the screen, and the hardened critics of New York, Chicago and a score of other cities, here, at last, "is the quintessence of perfection in screen art."

Residents of Sherman county are eagerly awaiting the advent of the production at Moro Theatre Saturday evening and Sunday matinee, April 12th and 13th. The fame of the wonder picture reached here a few days after its opening in Portland and there was general pleasure expressed when it was learned that Manager Williams had "scooped" all opposition and landed the production for this city.

Lon Chaney is the star of the production. He is supported by a brilliant cast including Ernest Torrence, Patry Ruth Miller, Tully Marshall, Norman Kerry, Brandon Hurst, Caesar Gravina and Gladys Brockwell. In all there are 75 principals and 3275 extra players. The entire Cathedral of Notre Dame was reconstructed especially for the production, as were "eight blocks of Parisian streets and houses of the time of Louis XI.

Gilda Gray, one of Broadway's most famous dancers, will be seen in her celebrated South Sea dance in Allan Dwan's production of "Lawful Larceny," which comes to Moro Theatre next Tuesday, April 15th, with Nita Naldi, Hope Hampton, Lew Cody and Conrad Nagel in the featured roles. The interior of the Rens-Vous cabaret, which is one of New York's celebrated dance clubs, was reproduced in the studio as a background for Miss Gray's dance and the four dancing girls, who work with her, also dance. The Cornell College Orchestra, which is a feature at the cabaret, also was hired to play the music for the dance.

In addition to Miss Grey, Alice Malson and Wesley Totten do a specialty dance in the scene, which will be one of the highly colorful spots in "Lawful Larceny." Mr. Dwan's screen version of this popular play is said to be highly diverting in every respect.
