

OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

A gymnasium costing about \$5000 is in prospect for Brownsville.

Business of Umatilla county is on a cash basis now for the first time in several years.

The Baker Shrine club, to increase its charity fund, is sponsoring a Shrine circus to be given May 6-10.

The Albany cannery will resume operations June 1 with a force of 200 women at work on the early fruits.

Six boys' and girls' industrial clubs of Lane county have received their charters from the Oregon Agricultural college.

About 150 Knights Templar of Oregon attended the 38th annual convocation of the Grand Commandery of Oregon at Albany.

Coquille valley towns appear to be opposed to the good roads bond issue of \$375,000 which has been proposed by the Coos county court.

The Clatsop county court will open bids on May 3 on paving slightly more than one mile of the market road between Olney and Young's River Falls.

The back of his head blown away by a shotgun, A. E. Westcott, farmer residing about five miles northwest of Newberg, was found dead near his home.

The La Grande Y. M. C. A. has failed. The building will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder, a struggle of years for existence thus ending.

I. F. Godfrey, 53, an employee of the California-Oregon Power company, was killed while working on a 600-volt line near Carnes, five miles south of Roseburg.

Malheur and Jefferson counties have the distinction of being the first counties in the state to remit their first half taxes for the year 1924 to the state treasurer.

Announcement is made in La Grande of the formation of the Walla Walla Lake Wonderful corporation. Walla Walla lake resorts expect many tourists this year.

A carload of dynamite is being taken to Crater Lake to blast a road through the Watchman peak section of the Rim drive around the lake early in the tourist season.

Lumber interests at Klamath Falls are worried about the embargo on California fruits, which threatens to cut down the demand in California for Klamath-made boxes.

Miss Anne M. Lang of The Dalles, Or., was elected one of the vice-presidents-general of the Daughters of the American Revolution at their convention in Washington, D. C.

Approximately 6,000,000 rainbow trout eggs have already been taken for the Klamath hatcheries of the game commission and prospects are good for the best egg-take for years.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Berrang of Westchester, Conn., have crossed the country in a wagon drawn by oxen. They are now at Medford, their destination. Mr. Berrang is 61, his wife 55.

Expenses incidental to the search for the six convicts who made a sensational escape from the state penitentiary at Salem three weeks ago, aggregated approximately \$1850.

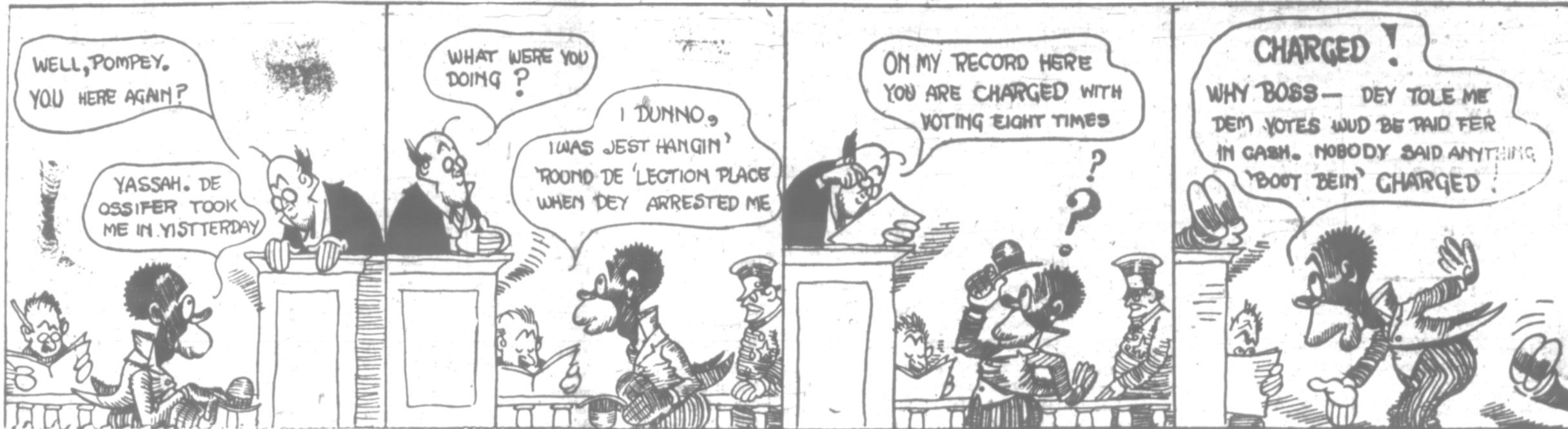
Eighty-eight candidates who filed for various offices at the primary election have submitted statements to the secretary of state for publication in the voters' pamphlet. This pamphlet under the law must be in the mails eight days prior to the election. Of the total 79 are republicans and nine democrats. A total of \$5005 was paid to the state by these candidates.

There will be no relaxation on the part of Oregon officials in enforcing the embargo against California products offered for shipment into Oregon. This was made plain when Governor Pierce sent a letter to F. M. Hudson, secretary of the Produce Exchange at Los Angeles, to the effect that a stricter quarantine may be expected in case the foot and mouth disease is not immediately brought under control.

The mystery of month's standing caused by the sudden disappearance of Sheriff Topping of Jefferson county in December ended just as suddenly with his reappearance in Madras last week. Topping was accompanied by his attorney, Denton G. Burdick of Redmond. He sought out Howard Turner, justice of the peace, waived preliminary hearing on the charge of larceny of public funds preferred against him early in the year, and was held to the grand jury.

The Marion county circuit court, in a decree signed by Judge C. G. Blingham and Percy Kelly, enjoined the state tax commission from collecting the state income tax imposed upon the Standard Lumber company of Portland, plaintiff in a suit brought against Governor Pierce and other members of the state tax commission to test the validity of the income tax act. The state immediately filed notice of appeal to the supreme court, and the case has been set for argument on May 22.
