

OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of
the Week Collected for
Our Readers.

Sweet Home has begun plans for its
Fourth of July celebration.

The Coos county high school field
and track meet was held at Myrtle
Point Saturday.

A convention of Oddfellow lodges
of Tillamook county was held in Till-
amook city Saturday.

Disabled war veterans from all sec-
tions of the state gathered in Salem
for their annual convention.

The Tomato Growers' association
set out about 150,000 plants at Free-
water during the last week.

Injured while at work on the post
road near Bridgeport by a rolling log,
M. Oranick died in a Baker hospital.

District wardens and inspectors of
the state board of forestry will gather
in Salem May 19 for a two-days' con-
ference.

Eugene Masons will erect a new
temple at an estimated cost of \$115,000
if successful in raising \$50,000 by the
sale of bonds.

The 24th annual district convention
of the Woodmen of the World was
held at Astoria with more than 200
delegates present.

Bids for laying more than 10,000
square yards of pavement within the
limits of Oregon City were let by the
city commissioners.

Since the first of the year build-
ing permits have been issued at Salem
for 101 new homes. The permits show
the average cost to be \$3500.

Mrs. Elizabeth Eliza Hawley, mother
of the late C. L. Hawley, state dairy
and food commissioner, died at her
home in Portland at the age of 82.

Frank Donley, 40, a resident of
Dixonville, in Douglas county, died
of injuries sustained when his team
ran away while he was loading wood.

Junior and senior classes in life-
saving are being conducted success-
fully at the Baker natorium by the
Baker chapter of the American Red
Cross.

At a recent meeting of the Silver-
ton school board a resolution was
passed which makes it impossible for
married women to teach in the Silver-
ton schools.

Feed and flour were heavy factors
in the April freight movement from
the Port of Astoria terminals, with
1887 tons of feed and 42,984 barrels of
flour being shipped.

An emergency hospital at McCredie
springs to care for injury cases of all
employees on the Southern Pacific Na-
tron cut-off work is being establish-
ed by the Eugene hospital.

Lincoln and Lane counties will enter
judging teams in the contests to be
held in connection with the Jersey
Chautauqua, to be held at the state
fair grounds at Salem, May 28 and 29.

William Grounds, W. Claude Mo-
tion and J. Robert Thacker, members
of the New Zealand Dairy Products
board, visited Portland in the course
of a tour of the United States and
Europe.

Portland, through its chamber of
commerce, will take no action on the
question whether Washington's prin-
cipal mountain should be called Ran-
ier or Tacoma, it was decided by the
board of directors.

Oregon leads all other states in this
corps area of relative strength of
its national guard, according to a
report received from headquarters,
ninth corps area, San Francisco, by
George A. White, adjutant-general.

Twenty-seven thousand gallons of
illicit whisky and mash were seized
and destroyed during the year 1923
by the force of deputies working under
Sheriff Hurlbut of Multnomah county
and 87 illicit stills were also seized.

Thomas Lee, working temporarily
for the Coos Bay Lumber company in
North Bend, in place of his brother,
who was ill, met death when he fell
against a saw. His heart was severed
and most of his left side was cut
away.

Northwestern fruit shipping com-
panies have telegraphed a protest
against proposed action of the board
of tariff appraisers to lower the duty
on pitted and seeded cherries, pack-
ed in brine, from 5 1/2 to 2 cents a
pound.

The annual track and field meet of
the high schools of southern Oregon
was held at the Jackson county fair
grounds at Medford with track teams
representing Roseburg, Grants Pass,
Klamath Falls, Ashland and Medford
contesting.

Appointment by the governor of a
non-political committee to investigate
and determine upon some plan look-
ing to the reorganization of the state
government on a more efficient basis,
was the suggestion contained in a
letter written by Joseph N. Teal of
Portland, which was received at the
executive office in Salem.

Decision not to raise the embargo
on fruits and vegetables from the dis-
tricts of California not infected by the
foot and mouth disease was reached
by the Oregon State Livestock board.
The recommendation was sent to Gov-
ernor Pierce.

TRACES CARTOON TO HOLLAND

Charles Dana Gibson Says This Form
of Art Originated There
in 1688.

In the modern sense, the cartoon
originated in Holland, stimulated by
the revolution of 1688, says Charles
Dana Gibson in the Mentor. From
there it migrated to England and there
found fertile and congenial soil. The
most significant cartoons of the Eight-
eenth century were directed against
the "bubble mania," the speculative
madness engineered by the South Sea
company in London. Cartoons such
as the famous one picturing fortune
riding in a car driven by folly, were
displayed in London shop windows and
influenced the art of Hogarth, who is
accepted as the father of the modern
cartoon. Following Hogarth came
Rowlandson, who devoted himself to
social satire, and James Gillray, who
stirred public opinion against Na-
poleon.

Benjamin Franklin was the first
American cartoonist. His work was
crude; still it inspired the colonists.
His most famous cartoon was that of
a snake cut up into sections and named
after the thirteen colonies. Under this
cartoon were the words "Unite or Die."

America's first great cartoonist,
Thomas Nast, was the product of the
Civil war and for years afterward he
continued to influence public opinion.
It was Nast who finally drove Boss
Tweed out of New York. Another
great cartoonist of that period was
Tenniel, who drew the reverent and
splendid "The Nation Mourning at
Lincoln's Bier," printed in Punch just
after the death of the martyred presi-
dent.

Following Nast came Keppler, Victor
and Gilliam, Rogers, Walker and Her-
ford, followed by men who have given
the American cartoon a permanent
place in our national history.

BLIND FIDDLER IS WISE MAN

Psychology Teaches Him Where to
Play to Get Coins From
the Public.

It is the fad to talk psychology
these days, but few put it to such
practical use as does one blind fiddler.
Somebody told him that a well-
known violinist was to give a recital
at one of the large concert halls. A
half hour before the recital, just as
the early birds were arriving, the old
fiddler chose the curb in front of con-
cert hall for a recital of his own.
He unpacked his well-worn instru-
ment, dropped his shabby black hat
and started his repertoire. "The Last
Rose of Summer" was followed by
"When You and I were Young, Mag-
gie," "The Old Oaken Bucket," and
others of the same school.

The enthusiastic crowd grew so
large pedestrians had difficulty in pass-
ing, says the New York Sun and Globe.
As time for the recital inside the hall
drew near, the crowd regularly dis-
persed, but not without first filling the
old hat with bills and coins.

Nobody knew what the old fiddler
muttered as he packed up his fiddle
and went on his way. Maybe it was
"They know good music when they
hear it." But just as likely it may
have been "You've got to know when
and where to catch 'em."

Queer Probation Suit in India.
Twin babies of unequal size are the
starting point of a unique probation
suit. A rich Indian merchant, Dev-
karan Nanji, died leaving his fortune
to his male children, of which he had
several by his first wife. His second
wife, a young Indian woman of thirty,
gave birth to twins soon after her be-
nevolence for while traveling in a train
from Bombay to Baroda. It was given
out that the twins were a boy and a
girl, and the widow immediately en-
tered a claim for a share of the for-
tune on behalf of her son. The ap-
parent difference in the ages of the
children, however, aroused suspicion
among the other heirs, and it is now
alleged that the woman exchanged one
of the twins, both of which were girls,
for a boy baby from a foundling asy-
lum. The case is in the courts.

A Kite Fight in India.
Two boys are standing on some
waste ground flying kites. The kites
are square, and the strings have been
sharpened by passing through a mix-
ture of starch and pieces of crushed
glass. One kite is blue and one is
green. The green kite hits the blue
one, but neither is hurt. Then they

with the blue kite gives a sharp pull.

green kite, which drops quickly to
the ground some yards away. The
