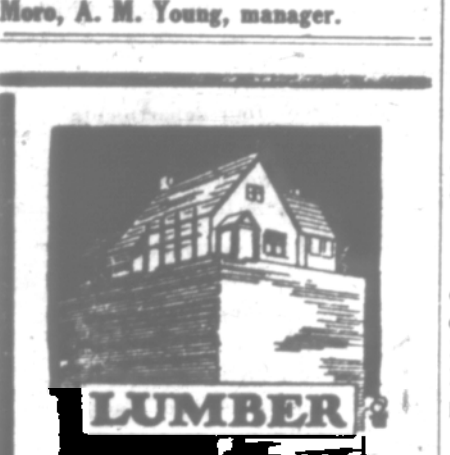

Vinton Hotel Destroyed by Fire

Moro, Oregon

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Fire totally destroyed the Vinton hotel at Grass Valley last Friday afternoon about four o'clock. When first discovered by the operator in the telephone office, across the street, the roof was ablaze. It is said that the building was flat on the ground within forty minutes from the first alarm and that during this time every thing of value in the building was removed, even to the new big French kitchen range recently installed. This was mainly because the fire was between the roof and top floor ceiling and as the fire burned down, the contents of the building was removed. Insurance to about \$9,600 was carried on the building and its contents. No other damage to property resulted from the fire other than windows in the telephone office and garage building, facing the hotel, being broken by the heat. The hotel was owned and operated by Clarence Ealinger. The building housing the equipment of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company was ablaze for a time, but was saved. All of the farmer lines operating out of Grass Valley were burned out at the central office, however.
