An airplane passenger carrier will
be at the county fair to take any one
from off the earth who desires the
sensation. Jenkins brothers from
Walla Walla, now at Seaside, are
the owners. The plane is equipped
with a new motor, recently installed.

Free band concerts daily each

County Band, composed of players
from Wasco, Grass Valley and Moro.
The band uses twenty instruments.

Exhibits at Annual County Fair Next Week Covers Large Field

It is planned by the County Fair
Board that all who are planning to
make an exhibit at the Annual
County Fair, to be held at Moro
September 11, 12 and 13—next week—
bring their exhibits to the fair
grounds early on Wednesday and take
plenty of time to arrange them in
place. All exhibits must be entered
and placed on Wednesday, September
10th. Judging will begin early on
the morning of September 11th. Any
entry not in place Wednesday cannot
be considered for that reason.

A fine lot of grain samples has
been promised to be placed on exhibit,
says Secretary C. C. Richmond, but
many more are wanted. If at all
possible bring sheafs of grain, but if
not able to do this, bring an exhibit
of threshed grain of any kind and of

any variety.
A comprehensive exhibit of cattle
from the herds owned by Jack Mor-
rison, G. G. Thorp, C. M. Cunning-
ham and several others have been
secured. These include both dairy
and beef grades. Included will be a
surprising number of Holsteins, and
Jerseys, as well as a fine exhibit of
Herefords.

The exhibits of pure bred hogs
will range from all over the county,
including Berkshires from north of
Wasco to Polan-China stock from
south of Grass Valley. From be-
tween these two distant points will
come a surprising number of entries,
much more than is thought to be
owned in the county. It will pay
the owners of good stock to
show their animals, thus realizing
better sales later on.

The entries in the horse division
will include entries of Shire horses
from the Thompson farm, a group of

Belgian horses from the Landry farm,
an exhibit of Belgian horses from the
Wm. Roos farm, and many others.

It may as well be said, in referring
to the exhibits promised to date, that
the poultry, sheep and goats will form
a large and interesting part of the
live stock exhibit. In past years
many owners of pure bred poultry and
sheep made many future sales at the
county fair and it will be done again
this year. Both those who want to
buy and improve their stock and those
who want to sell good stock profit be-
cause of the interest taken in these
exhibits.

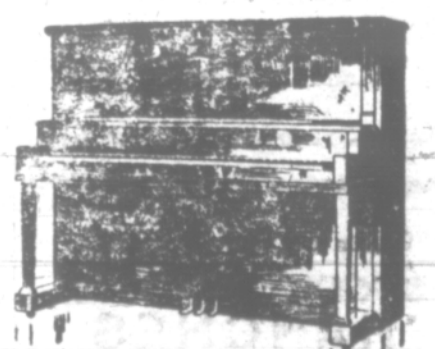
An exhibit out of the ordinary, for
Sherman county, will be the agri-
cultural exhibit to be made by Clyde
Crites. He has promised a sample of
red Mexican beans from off his eight
acre field. The vines of these beans
have an average of 30 to 32 pods each,
and each pod six to eight beans. He
grows the beans on summer fallow

land which he seeds in the fall to
wheat.

Another exhibit to be placed by
Mr. Crites will be from his sun-
flower field. He has sun flower stalks
nipe feet tall with heads of unusual
size. The seeds he feeds his poultry
and the stalks and roots is burned in
the heater in the winter time. It is
surprising what a hot and steady fire
sun flower stalks and roots make on a
cold day.

The school educational features of
the county fair is in charge of A. M.
Zevly. The exhibits will occupy
the west side of the pavillion. Edu-
cational exhibits from the schools,
community exhibits by both rural and
town schools, and cooking demon-
strations by pupils will be featured.
Members of the county school club
projects will also have exhibits. This
year the educational exhibits will be
a big feature of the fair.
