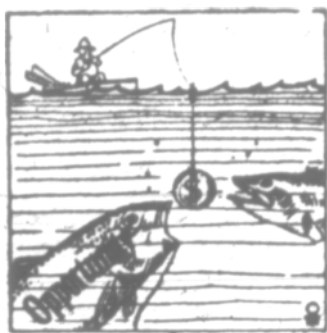

Movie News of the Current Week

The hour for evening movie shows
to begin at Moro theatre has been
changed to 7:30 p. m., one half hour
earlier than the former summer
schedule.

The Allan Dwan production of
"Zaza" for Paramount, with Gloria
Swanson in the title role, supported
by H. B. Warner, leading man, Fer-
dinand Gottschalk, Lucille La Verne
and a host of other prominent stage
and screen artists, will come to Moro
theatre Saturday night. The story
of this famous play, written twenty-
five years ago by the French play-
wrights, Pierre-Berton and Charles
Simon, brings Miss Swanson to the
screen as the queen of a music hall.
The role is one of the best ever
 essayed by this charming star, and
her rendition of it is reported to be
highly artistic and forceful.

There will be on view Sunday at
Moro theatre one of the most virile
and entertaining photoplays seen here
in a considerable span of time. Per-
haps its appeal is due in a large
measure to the fact that its author is
Rex Beach, whose plots invariably
are thrilling to the core. But, no
matter how large a share of the
credit belongs to him, the fact re-
mains that the offering is exception-

Candidates Named for City Office

At a mass meeting of citizens of
Moro held at the opera house on
Thursday evening to nominate candi-
dates for city office for the terms
beginning January next it was voted
that the following be named as
candidates for the offices indicated:

Roy Kunsman as mayor, to succeed
N. W. Thompson.
T. W. Alley, F. L. Burnett and
W. S. Powell as councilmen to suc-
ceed W. S. Powell, O. A. Ramsey
and W. H. Williams.

Mrs. Estella Benson as city treas-
urer to succeed herself.
About fifty attended the meeting.
N. W. Thompson acted as chairman
of the meeting and Ira M. Peterson
acted as secretary.

It was reported at Salem that a
suit would be filed in the courts to
test the authority of the secretary
of state in connection with the ar-
rangement of the ballot at the Novem-
ber election, as it relates to filling
vacancies in the state supreme court.
The plaintiffs in the action, whose
names have not yet been divulged,
will contend that all of the candidates
for the two vacancies in the court
should be grouped on the ballot, under
the designation of "vote for two." The
secretary of state has held that the
two vacancies in the supreme court
should be treated as separate offices,
and has arranged the ballot to that
end.

If any one has a better record of a
flock of chickens in Sherman county
than those owned by Mrs. J. C. Hock-
man we would like to be informed.
Mrs. Hockman has a flock of more
than 100 buff Orpington pullets,
about fifty being hatched between
the 1st and 15th of March. The early
hatched pullets began to lay about
July 15th and since that time she has
gathered from just a few to as high as
19 and 20 eggs daily from these early
hatched chickens. Not all have been
busy producing eggs during this
time, as she has had the usual trouble
incidental to breaking them from
wanting to set and rear a family of
young chicks.
