

OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Jesse A. Crabtree, acting postmaster at Girard, has received permanent appointment to the office.

The annual conference of the Congregational church started in Salem Tuesday to continue for three days.

Malcom Hunter, city recorder of Newport, has been discharged on the ground that he is not an American citizen.

An Oregon City ordinance forbids candidates mailing campaign cards on telephone or telegraph poles within the city limits.

Places where poultry is kept for sale in Eugene must be kept sanitary, according to an ordinance passed by the city council.

Thousands of cattle are being taken out of Lake county by the large ranchers on account of a shortage of hay for the winter feeding.

A modern cold storage plant will be erected in Astoria in the near future by the Ryan Fruit company, according to announcement.

Statistics recently compiled show a low death rate for Cascade Locks. From January, 1924, to date there have been but two deaths.

The planting of 1,000,000 baby trout raised at the Necanicum hatchery in the various streams of Clatsop county was completed last week.

Employment was furnished last week through the United States employment bureau at Eugene to 186 persons, 154 men and 32 women.

After many months of vexatious delays, the postoffice department has announced an order establishing free mail delivery in North Bend, effective October 1.

A. C. McIntyre, who was nominated at the republican primary election for the office of district attorney of Umatilla county, has withdrawn from the contest.

The proposal to bond Baker county for \$500,000 for the construction and improvement of the Baker-Unity and the Baker-Cornucopia roads will be submitted to the voters at the general election, November 4, according to a resolution adopted by the county court.

The city of Klamath Falls has filed a protest with the public service commission in connection with the application of the Oregon-California & Eastern Railroad company for permission to establish a half dozen railroad crossings within the boundaries of the municipality.

Judge Percy Kelly of Albany will be the only candidate for justice of the state supreme court to succeed the late Justice John McCourt at the November election. This was announced by the secretary of state when the time for filing for the November election expired.

Burns realized last week its dream of nearly 50 years when the first passenger train, with scores of passengers from various parts of the Union Pacific system pulled into the city to the accompaniment of cheering automobile horns and the cheers of hundreds gathered to welcome the visitors.

The demand for breeding ewes is keen that orders for them are impossible to fill, according to a statement by Mac Hoke of Pendleton, secretary of the Oregon Wool Growers' association. He estimates that between 25,000 and 30,000 head have changed hands during the past few weeks.

An outbreak of rabies among dogs in the Dryden section of Josephine county has been reported to the United States bureau of biological survey here. Stockmen have been killing off all dogs in the region suspected of having rabies. The disease has already caused some loss among livestock.

TREASURER MYERS HITS AT FARMERS

Asks That School Fund No Longer Be Loaned Out to Producers.

Portland, Or.—(Special).—Supposed friend of the farmer, the Pierce administration, or at least one of the chief wheels in it, Jefferson Myers, Governor Pierce's own appointee, is showing his concern for the producer's welfare in a strange way, according to the republican state central committee, which is calling attention to the recommendation, presumably inspired by Myers, to call off further loans to farmers from the common school fund and foreclose at once upon farmers who have borrowed school money but who are now delinquent in payment of interest and principal.

Now, if ever, the Oregon farmer needs help, it is declared, and that it remained for the Pierce administration to rain added blows upon his head is perhaps the kindest cut of all.

Myers, of course, thought he was accomplishing something when he got an account of the school fund and foreclosed upon the Oregon farmer to the school fund, this being intended to reflect upon Thomas B. Kay, his predecessor in office as state treasurer, who is expected to beat Myers in November for the office.

But the alleged disclosure is calculated to be a boomerang, at least that is the way Henry M. Hansen, political editor of the Portland Telegram, looks at it in a recent signed article. It would be strange, indeed, in view of agricultural conditions, if some of those who participated in the more than \$5,000,000 loaned out of the school fund did not become delinquent in their payments.

But now, it is held, is a time for extending the utmost help to farmers, both for the good of the farmers and for the state fund, too, so there would be a minimum of loss to both interests.

Anyone who knows Tom Kay realizes that he, if anyone on earth, being a man of the soundest business judgment, could be trusted to make loans because he would be extremely diligent in seeing that the funds were safeguarded. None, probably, could be more cautious in watching the state's interests.

Myers, however, does not make the point that Mr. Kay was reminded of the fact that the school fund was in the state act. Instead, he proposes to stop all loans to farmers and to use the school funds to purchase bonds.

This appears to be all a tangle, intended to advance the political fortunes of Myers. The report, made by an accountant at the direction of Myers, hinted at a loss of \$1,000,000. G. C. Brown, clerk of the state land board, denied the school fund had shrunk to the amount of \$1,000,000 or any other sum. Other state officials in commenting on the report, said the \$1,000,000 estimate was extravagant and the maximum could not exceed a third of that amount.

Brown pointed out that both republican and democratic administrations had sustained losses to the fund by reason of bad loans but that they complied with the law, which provides security for the loans must be thrice the value of the credit extended, and that this was as ample a safeguard as could be thrown about the fund. Losses sustained were made up from the interest fund, which made the school fund, as the law describes it, "irredeemable."

It is held that investment in bonds would be likely to meet with equal or even greater losses than by loans upon farm lands. However, Mr. Myers, if he carries out his plan, will, probably, cut the Oregon farmers off from credit if they are entitled to a low interest rate if he can either evade or modify the law.

Coolidge on Taxation.

Of all the services which the congress can render the country I have no hesitation in declaring this one to be paramount.
