Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, telegraphed from Washington to Salem \$100 to be used in construction of the proposed new Young Men's Christian association home. Secretary Hoover spent his boyhood days in Salem.

Five robbers attempted to hold up the George W. Bates & Co. bank at Williams avenue and Knott street in Portland, but were routed by Andy G. Larson, traffic policeman, after a gun battle in which a schoolgirl was wounded by a stray shot.

B. K. Lawson of Wedderburn was re-elected president of the Coos-Curry Del Norte counties good roads association at the convention in Brookings. The association appointed committees to watch construction of the Roosevelt highway through Curry county.

One fatality was due to an industrial accident in Oregon during the week ending October 16, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victim was John Brewster, winchman, with headquarters at Bandon. A total of 606 accidents was reported.

A new concrete log dump, to cost several hundred dollars, will be constructed at the sawmill in Springfield of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company.
The water bond election to raise \$25,000 for installation of a water system in Garibaldi carried with but one dissenting vote out of a total of 92.

At a recent meeting of the Lake County Woolgrowers' association wages of shepherders in Lake county were reduced from \$100 to \$75 per month.

I. L. Young, Portland contractor, has received the contract to construct the Wasley hospital, which will rise in Marshfield during the next few months.

For the first time in the history of Astoria, improvement bonds of that city were sold at a premium, a lot of \$22,000 bringing 100.5, plus accrued interest.

A bond issue for \$125,000 will appear on the ballot in Klamath county November 4. The money is wanted for work on the Dalles-California highway.

A. J. Johnson, prominent pioneer of Lane county and early day merchant of Eugene and Creswell, died at his home at Creswell on his 80th birthday.

Deaths exceeded births in Pendleton during September, according to the report of the city health officer. During the month there were 15 births and 20 deaths.

S. Taylor Jones, 51, district agent for a life insurance company, was killed accidentally at his home in Salem, when a shotgun which he was cleaning was discharged.

J. F. Campbell, since 1922 district ranger at Oakridge, in the Cascade national forest, has been transferred to Tacoma as assistant supervisor of the Rainier national forest.

The appointment bureau of the school of education of the University of Oregon placed a total of 137 teachers in positions in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California last year, according to figures given out by the university.

The public service commission has entered upon a series of hearings to the end of adopting a uniform system of accounting for all automobile stage lines operating in Oregon.

D. H. Pierce, 72, ex-county commissioner, member of the Oregon legislature and prominent farmer and stockman of southern Linn county died at the family home in Albany.

Governor Pierce granted conditional pardons to Philip Forrester and Pasquello Lombardo, prisoners in the Oregon state penitentiary, so that they may be deported by immigration of officials.

Byron Robertson, who escaped from the state penitentiary flax fields at Salem July 14, has been apprehended at Washington, D. C., and will be returned to Salem to serve out his unexpired term.

Oregon postmasters have been appointed as follows: Mrs. Delight E. Beckman, Holdman, Umatilla county; Martin Bauerlied, Morgan, Morrow county; Mrs. Emma F. Denham, Promise, Walla Walla county.

High school pupils in Deschutes county will cast a practice vote at the general election November 4 as the result of an arrangement made by J. H. Haner, county clerk to furnish the students with ballots.

Two million Chinook salmon eggs have been delivered to the fish hatchery at Enterprise, in Walla Walla county, by Frank Minney, in charge of the hatchery on the McKenzie river. The eggs will be hatched at Enterprise.

James M. Snider, 35, a trapper and packer residing near Peel, was shot and instantly killed by his stepson, Fred Parazoo, 23, who said, following his surrender to the county officers, that the shot was fired in self-defense.

The new connecting link between the east and west side Pacific highways by way of Albany and Corvallis was formally opened Friday. Some 300 automobiles gathered at Albany and made up a caravan over the new pavement.

Leiston Wright, W. H. Williams and Lloyd Hennagin drove to Portland last Sunday returning the next day with four new Ford roadsters. Leiston Wright taking his new car at Portland. Mrs. Williams, who had been visiting in Portland, drove back in the car used for the down trip.

Hon. Jim Stewart of Corvallis will address the voters at Grass Valley on Saturday, October 25th; at Moro on Monday, October 27th, and at Wasco on Tuesday, October 28th. Everybody is invited to come to these meetings. Jim Stewart formerly lived at Fossil, a great many Sherman county people know him to be a forceful and instructive speaker.

Benjamin F. Hockman and Miss Frances Morrissey were married at Wasco on Wednesday, October 22d. The groom is a son of J. C. Hockman and wife and has been employed with the Williams Motor company. The bride is a daughter of Mrs. Mary Morrissey of this city and has become a popular member of musical circles since becoming a resident here.

C. M. Cunningham and H. P. Oresch each loaded their autos with wheat on Monday and drove to Tygh mill where it was ground into flour. Registration of voters in Marion county for the November election to take place 23,795.

The annual convention of the Oregon State Undertakers' association was held in Portland.

Deposits in the three banks of The Dalles now total \$3,534,407.28, a gain of \$500,000 since June 30.

During the past month 9000 head of sheep and 1200 head of cattle were shipped from the yards of Prairie City.

There were 95 fires this season in the Santiam national forest. The previous high record was 63 for a single season.

County Assessor Lee Giddings announced an increase in the assessed valuation of Linn county this year of \$109,653.

Competitive civil service examinations will be held November 15, to select postmasters for Philomath and Rainier.

Voters' registration records of previous years in Clackamas county were smashed this year. The total registration is 17,489.

The Eugene Fruit Growers' association has shipped 314 tons, 15 car loads, of canned string beans during the past season.

Rev. J. Bogstad was elected president of the Oregon conference of the Lutheran church at the circuit conference held in Bend.

A summary of the Clatsop county 1924 assessment roll shows valuations of \$36,957,537. This is a drop of \$795,000 from the 1923 roll.

Pioneers and sons and daughters of pioneers of southern Oregon held their 48th annual reunion in Jacksonville with more than 300 present.

Mrs. Nancy House Brown, who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1850, settling with her family at Sublimity, died at Falls City, aged 80 years.

The Summer Lake Irrigation district has just sold another bond issue of \$100,000 to a San Francisco bond house at 90 cents on the dollar.

Rodney Baird, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Baird of Halfway, died from concussion of the brain after being struck on the head by a batted baseball.

More than \$2000 is offered itself, an entire wing of the new building having been prepared especially for these entries. Other substantial prizes are being offered by various livestock associations throughout the country, while \$750 will go to winners of stock judging contests.
