Edward H. Edmundson of Salem has received highest honors at the Annapolis naval academy, according to a letter received in Salem. He is a son of Mrs. Alice E. Edmundson. His recent award makes him a "five-striper," the highest honor that can be bestowed upon a naval cadet, and an honor granted to only one man.

Fred Paraso, who recently shot and killed his stepfather, James Smith, trapper and hunter, residing at Peet, was indicted by the grand jury at Roseburg on a charge of murder in the second degree.

Approximately \$2,275,000 of second half state taxes have been received at the state treasury department. About \$390,000 is outstanding. Out of 36 counties in the state only six have not completed their payments.

In the absence of other employees a robber entered the Multnomah Commercial & Savings bank at Multnomah station, near Portland, forced the teller into the vault and escaped with \$1720.45 in cash and \$6060 in bonds.

A number of Serman county friends of L. H. McMahon, of Salem, were pleased to note in the news of last week that Mr. McMahon had received an overwhelming majority from the voters of Marion county in the race for circuit judge of that county to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Judge G. C. Bingham. Judge McMahon was the republican candidate on the ticket.

To this county goes the blue ribbon in competition with state at large as to the per cent of taxes collected. Sheriff Chrisman, in his report to the county court showed the amount collected on the 1923 current tax roll as ninety six per cent of the total amount turned over to him for collection. In addition to this, Sheriff Chrisman has to his credit a fair sized amount collected on previous rolls that have been delinquent.

The junior boy scouts, under the leadership of A. M. Zevely and R. A. Fenstra hiked on Armistice day to the John Day river at the Cottonwood bridge crossing. An incident of the trip was the capture of a young lone goose by Mr. Zevely. The bird settled on the water close to the boy's camp. Mr. Zevely shied a rock at it, hitting the bird on the head and then caught it as it floated on the water close to shore.

The Five Requisites Necessary For a Successful Movie Picture

A tribute to the devotion of women who will risk life itself or the living death of dishonor for the men they love is paid by Thomas H. Ince in this new drama, "Those Who Dance," a First National release which comes to Moro theatre on Saturday evening, November 15th.

Ince has told a remarkable story of a little country girl who falls in with the life of New York underworld in the attempt to save her brother from gangsters who have "framed" him on a charge of murder. When every other attempt fails, Rose, rather than abandon her brother to his fate, throws away her good name and, through an affinity whom she takes into the home of the bootleg king of the underworld, gets the necessary evidence which frees her brother. Blanche Sweet, as the innocent girl from up-state, has one of the most compelling roles she ever has portrayed. The dual characterization gives her full scope for the dramatic ability she displayed so tellingly in "Anna Christie."

Bessie Love plays an audacious underworld flapper role with an abandon that wins every heart, while Warner Baxter, Mathew Betz and Robert Agnew are thoroughly satisfactory in the male roles of the production. Lambert Hillyer directed and has screened the drama with a fine sweep of action that keeps the audience on edge from start to finish.
