International Stock Show Prize

Awarded Sherman County Team

One of the most important features of the children's part in the Pacific International stock show held in Portland during the first part of this month, was the prune bread demonstrations given by cookery club members from different counties in the state. The club department encouraged this idea hoping that it would serve as a direct aid to the prune growers of the state by providing a new use for their product. Sixteen counties of the state sent demonstration teams. Sherman county was represented by Mary Reese and Clara McDonald from the Harmony school. They made the bread on the last day of the show, but did not learn until the first of this week that they had won third place in the contest. Different companies are furnishing the prizes for this work and these girls will receive theirs from the Fleishman yeast company. The counties winning first and second places over Sherman county were Jackson and Malheur.

The state text book commission met this week at Salem and adopted a large list of books to be taught in the public schools of the state, beginning with the September term next fall. The newly adopted books will be much higher in price than those discarded.
Mail route No. 2 Legan to function out of Moro on Wednesday morning under a contract with Phil Starr as carrier. Mail will leave Moro office three times a week, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 8 a. m. The route is about 28 miles long and will be served by auto.
I. R. Conlee and D. W. Nish were arrested last Sunday by two game wardens, a federal and state representative, charged with shooting an over limit of wild geese. Upon appearance before Justice Young they both pled guilty and were each fined \$27.50, their guns confiscated and their license forfeited for one year.
Wheat around Walla Walla is being contracted for delivery next fall at from \$1.15 a bushel up, according to reports. Dealers are reticent in discussing this unusual practice, although admitting that it is being done. Eighty-two per cent of the Walla Walla crop for this year has been sold at prices ranging from \$1 to \$1.50 a bushel.
Daylight bank robbers secured about \$2000 from the bank at Madras Wednesday afternoon about 1:30. Two men and a woman is supposed to be implicated in the robbery. After the robbery the Dodge car with which they got away was traced for several miles toward Ashwood. Latest accounts seem to indicate that the robbers got stuck in the dobie roads near Antelope and were captured the day of the robbery.
A news item from Hood River states that H. G. Vanallen, J. M. Johnson and R. L. MacDonald, operating the ferry between Hood River and White Salmon, have purchased the business and equipment of the ferry operating between Maryhill and Grants. They will continue to operate the ferry at Hood River until the new bridge at that place is opened to travel and then move their ferry equipment to Maryhill.
W. H. Williams returned from Portland on Tuesday, driving an all-steel body Ford truck with canopy top and wire enclosed sides and end. The truck was delivered at Moro to F. M. Kellar, contractor on a mail route between Maupin and Ashwood and will be used on the mail route between those places. When delivered the truck was equipped with Ruckstell rear axle, speedometer and special size tire.
J. W. Cochran returned on Monday from an absence of several months spent in the northeastern part of Washington at and near Mazama, about 70 miles from railroad travel. About three weeks of his absence was spent in a hospital at Wenatchee, where he was seriously ill from the effects of drinking poisoned water while in the mountains. His companion, taken to the hospital at the same time died from the effects of the poison.

George Davis, living about ten miles southeast of Grass Valley died last Sunday morning at the family home. Mr. Davis has been ailing for about two years, but had been in bed about a month, suffering from paralytic strokes and other complications. The funeral took place Monday afternoon at the family home, in charge of Rev. Henry G. Hanson of the Presbyterian church of Moro. Mrs. Roy Kunsman of Moro played while those present joined in the singing of appropriate hymns. Interment took place at the Grass Valley cemetery.
George W. Davis was born near Cedar Rapids, Iowa, October 27th, 1861. He moved to New Castle, Nebraska, where he was united in marriage to Miss Susie Taylor. To this union were born six children, Mrs. Allie Noyes, Mrs. Mary Owens, Lawrence Davis, Nicholas Davis, Joshua Davis, and Viva Davis, all of Grass Valley, Oregon. He departed this life November 16th, 1924, at the age of 63 years and 19 days. He leaves to mourn his loss beside the widow, six children, eight grand children, and many distant relatives and friends.
