

REPUBLICAN CAUCUS BARS INSURGENTS

Washington, D. C.—Senator Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin and three of his principal supporters in the senate practically were read out of the republican party at a conference of senate republicans.

The other three were Senators Brookhart, Frazier and Ladd.

Charles Curtis, senior senator from Kansas, was selected successor to the late Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts as the republican leader in the senate.

The conference adopted a resolution by Senator Reed of Pennsylvania under which Senators La Follette, Ladd and Frazier of North Dakota and Brookhart of Iowa will no longer be given republican places on senate committees or invited to attend future party conferences.

The resolution, offered by Senator Reed of Pennsylvania, was vigorously opposed in the conference by Senators Cummins of Iowa, Howell of Nebraska and Harrell of Oklahoma. Its adoption also brought strong statements of disapproval from Senators Borah of Idaho and Senator Norris of Nebraska, who is one of the insurgent leaders. Neither of these senators attended the conference.

88TH CONGRESS IN FINAL SESSION

Several Important General Bills
Are on Calendar Awaiting Disposition.

Washington, D. C.—With the breach between the regular and insurgent republican organizations still further widened, the 88th congress, which already has established a record as the most turbulent in the nation's history, reconvened Monday for its short and final session.

In the three months intervening before March 4, efforts will be made to put through some important general legislation in addition to the annual appropriation bills, but with little apparent prospect of success.

Hanging over the session that ended last June are many bills that must be taken up on the floor for consideration. Coupled with these are other bills, practically completed in committee, but not reported. In the closing months of the session numerous investigations were ordered. Many of these gained momentum during the summer recess, and the report of their work must be crowded into the house legislative program.

The supply bills, making available the money to carry on the government's machinery for the next fiscal year, probably will be acted upon first.

Standing at the top of all business remaining from the last session is the Howell-Barkley bill to abolish the railroad labor board.

Both the republican and democratic leaders in the senate declared they looked for little affirmative action other than the disposition of the supply bills. Senator Curtis of Kansas, the newly elected majority leader, said he hoped to have the senate take up general bills now on the calendar in such order as the steering committee may decide.

TO AID GERMAN RAILROADS

\$15,000,000 Credit Placed by American and British Bankers.

New York.—First steps in financing Germany's railways, as reconstituted under the Dawes plan, were taken by the American and British bankers, who placed a credit of \$15,000,000 at the disposal of the German State Railway company.

Organized in accordance with the Dawes plan to take over the operation of German railways under private management, the German State Railway company constitutes what is said to be the largest railway system in the world, having 33,000 miles of road.

The original cost of the system, extending into every part of Germany, was \$4,000,000,000. Present capitalization amounts of \$3,095,000,000 common stock issued to the German government of the German states, and \$2,000,000,000 first mortgage reparation bonds, guaranteed by the German government, which have been issued to a trustee appointed by the reparations commission.

Egypt Protests to League of Nations.

Geneva.—The league of nations received a protest from the Egyptian senate, condemning Great Britain's recent action in Egypt. The document was couched in terms similar to the protest received from the Egyptian chamber of deputies, characterizing the British demands for satisfaction for the assassination of Sir Lee Stack, the sirdar, as excessive and iniquitous.

France Acts to Pay U. S. Loan.

Washington, D. C.—After a lapse of more than two years the French government has actually begun preliminary negotiations looking to an adjustment of her debt to the United States. It was learned officially here. Jules Jusserand, the retiring French ambassador, who is to relinquish his post here in February, already has held one conference with Secretary of the Treasury Mellon on the matter, and it is expected that another will be held before M. Jusserand returns to Paris.

Income Tax Reduction to Be Delayed.

Washington, D. C.—Further tax reduction will not be attempted until late next year, Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee announced. If the treasury surplus on June 30 warrants it, an extra session of congress may be called in September to undertake the downward revision of taxes, but nothing can be done before June 30, Smoot said.

ALL OF SHEDD BANK ROBBERS CAPTURED

Albany, Or.—Clarence Boggie of Lebanon, ex-deputy sheriff of Linn county and well-known resident, was arrested as the fourth suspect in the robbery Saturday of the bank at Shedd, Or., and according to officers, confessed his part in the crime. The arrest was made late Sunday on the William Smith farm, 14 miles south-east of Lebanon, by Sheriff Richard and Kenneth Bloom, assistant state traffic officer.

The bank at Shedd, 14 miles south of Albany on the Pacific highway, was held up at noon Saturday and the robbers made away with \$399.85. Three of the robbers were recaptured within two hours and a half after the robbery. The prisoners gave their names and ages as: C. Cropleigh, 17; M. Silder, 24, and L. Nelson, 24.

CENSUS OF FARMS NOW IN PROGRESS

Washington, D. C.—Taking the measure of the farmers and the farms of the country, in accordance with an act of congress requiring the enumeration of a census of agriculture every five years, began December 1 and will continue until completed, which is expected to be on or before January 31 of 1925.

There were 6,448,343 farms in the country at the last decennial census in 1920 and the value of the properties was \$17,824,100,838.

The inquiries which the farmers will be asked to answer number 178 and include the facts concerning farm, tenure, acreage, values, debt, expenses, co-operation in marketing, farm facilities including the number of tractors and whether the farm is equipped with a radio outfit, population, crops harvested, forests and forest products, and livestock and livestock products. The information furnished will be strictly confidential under all circumstances and will not be used as a basis of taxation.

REPUBLICAN COSTS GIVEN

90,605 Persons Give \$3,063,962; Surplus Totals \$355,264.

Washington, D. C.—The recent campaign cost the republican national committee \$3,063,962, William M. Butler, chairman, announced, adding that a surplus of \$355,264, which compares with the deficit of about \$2,000,000 incurred in 1920, remained in the treasury after all expenditures had been met.

"The campaign was financed by 90,605 individual contributors," said Mr. Butler. "Of this number, 83,399 made individual contributions of less than \$100."

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Cabinet Has Grown

When George Washington was President, there were five men sitting about the table with him as his first cabinet.
