

COOLIDGE PLEADS FOR WORLD COURT

Washington.—The administration's stand in favor of American participation in the world court was reaffirmed by President Coolidge in an address delivered at the White House to delegates attending the national conference on the cause and cure of war.

This step the president characterized as the next move that should be taken by the United States toward outlawing war.

He suggested also that the nation and the world should "turn the light of more information and better understanding upon the problems of diplomacy."

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Wettest Hours of Day. The late afternoon and early evening hours are the wettest of the day. Investigation by weather bureau observers in different parts of this country show that in some sections twice as much rain falls on the average between 5 and 8 p. m., as does between 9 a. m. and noon. This peculiarity of the weather is more pronounced in warm than in cool weather and is due to the rising temperature during the forenoon which enables the atmosphere to hold an increasing amount of water vapor, a condition which is reversed in the late hours of the day and complicated also by the frequency of summer thunderstorms during those hours.

Old Mourning Customs. The Scriptures set forth many interesting details concerning the method of Jewish mourning. The next of kin closed the eyes of the deceased; the corpse was bathed and, if a person of any consequence, the body was laid for a time in spices, or was anointed with them, swathed in linen bandages and deposited in a tomb. The mourners went bareheaded and barefooted covered their mouths and kept silence, wore black cloth and sat in ashes. Funeral songs were sung by hired singers and splendid sepulchers containing numerous niches were carved out of rock. As a niche was filled, a stone was rolled against the opening.
