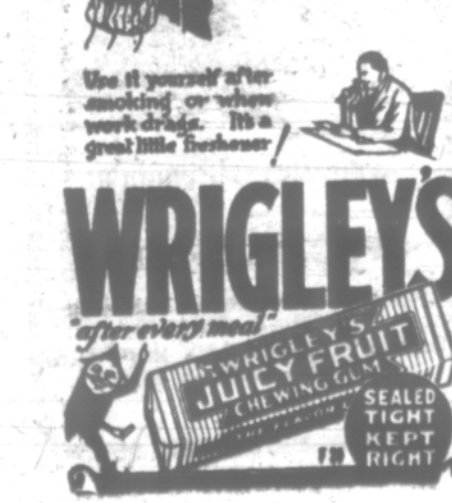

Pertinent Facts Concerning Your Federal Income Tax Payments

Final Article.
Where by reason of illness or absence from home additional time for filing an income tax return is required, the taxpayer should address to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C., a request for an extension. Collectors of internal revenue are not, as under preceding acts, permitted to grant such extensions. The request must be made before the return is due—on or before March 15, 1925, if made on the calendar year basis—and must contain a full recital for the causes of the delay.

An extension of time for filing the return does not extend the time of payment of the tax or any installment thereof unless so specified in the extension. As a condition of granting an extension, the commissioner may require the submission of a tentative return and estimate of the amount of the tax, and the payment of at least one-fourth of the estimated amount.

All the pupils and teachers of Moro school were greatly pleased this week to learn of the rapid recovery in health that Miss Dorothy Perkins is making and that she is now able to see visitors. Miss Perkins is teacher of the 3d and 4th grades.

Effective action has been taken on two plays that is planned to be given soon by members of the senior and junior classes of Moro high school.

The first play to be given will be by the junior class entitled "Take my Advice." The second play entitled "His Uncle's Niece" will be given by the senior class following presentation of the junior class play.

The basketball game played at Wasco last Friday between the girls teams of the Wasco and Moro high schools was the deciding one of the series for the championship honors for the county. Wasco girls won by a 15-16 score, but they did it by using plays they had learned while playing against the Moro team. A large number of spectators at the game were from Moro school.

The three basketball games staged during the last week-end between the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college were exciting events when measured by the interest taken by pupils and faculty of Moro schools. Almost all the students were wishing the U. of O. would win, while the faculty was about equally divided between the two contestants.

The first game was won by O. A. C. and some of the faculty were glib and the most of the students felt likewise. The second game was won by U. of O. and then gloom descended upon the opposing camp. The third and deciding game of the series was played on the Willamette university gym floor and resulted in victory for O. A. C. Now some of the faculty members are explaining basketball plays to student losers.

Attempts by legislators of Oregon to reduce the automobile license fees and increase the tax on gasoline met with stern resistance. Nor was consideration given to old cars. The committee was afraid to tamper with the schedule of license fees, fearing it might upset the financial structure on which the millions of dollars of highway bonds, now outstanding, are to be retired.

O. A. Ramsey and wife accompanied by M. R. Schadewitz and wife drove to Portland last Sunday where Mrs. Ramsey submitted to a major operation at St. Vincent hospital. Messrs. Hilton, manager of the Tumalum lumber company at Kent, was arrested in The Dalles Saturday night on a warrant issued out of the justice court at Grass Valley charging him with a statutory offense against a 14-year old girl living near Kent. Hilton was visiting with his wife, ill in a hospital in The Dalles, at the time of his arrest. He is reported to have denied the charge. Preliminary hearing was held at Grass Valley on Monday and the accused bound over to the grand jury with bonds set at \$2500. At last accounts the accused had not been able to secure the full amount of bonds necessary.

Movie News of the Current Week

Superb and magnificent are the settings and scenic backgrounds to be seen in "The Eternal City," a First National picture produced by George Fitzmaurice, which is coming to Moro theatre on Saturday. Adapted from the famous novel by Sir Hall Caine by Ouida Bergere, the story is enacted by a brilliant cast which includes Barbara La Marr, Lionel Barrymore, Bert Lytell, Richard Bennett and Montagu Love.

The exceptional beauty of the production is due to the fact that it was made in sunny Italy, and the landscapes which form the background of the outdoor scenes have never before been used in a photoplay, giving "The Eternal City" a considerable degree of pictorial freshness.

"Sherlock Jr." coming to Moro theatre on Sunday afternoon is Buster Keaton's third feature length comedy to be presented by Joseph M. Schenck through Metro.
