

GERM DEATH PLOT TO GET MONEY TOLD

Chicago, Ill.—Typhoid fever germs which killed William Nelson McKinlock, "millionaire orphan," were given William Darling Shepherd, foster-father and chief heir, upon his promise to pay \$100,000 after settlement of the estate, C. C. Falman, head of the school of bacteriology, told Robert E. Crowe, state's attorney Tuesday.

Falman said that he advised the method of administering the germs and advised Shepherd as to further steps so as to assure the death of the rich youth.

The new development came when Falman, grilled in Shepherd's presence, after three days of questioning, shook his finger in Shepherd's face and said:

"I gave those typhoid germs to Shepherd. He told me in plain words that he wanted them to inoculate somebody with and that it was a million dollar deal. He told me he would pay me plenty when he got the million."

"You're a liar," Shepherd retorted, but assistant prosecutor said his denial lacked the emphasis and vigor of his previous assertions.

Kid McCoy Is Found Guilty.

Los Angeles, Cal.—Kid McCoy, ex pugilist, recently convicted of manslaughter in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Theresa Mors here last August, was convicted in superior court of three counts of assault growing out of a shooting affray in Mrs. Mors' antique shop the morning after her death.

Wheat Growers Advocate Co-operative Marketing.

Spokane, Wash.—Co-operative marketing organizations with local representatives similar to private concerns were advocated at a conference of wheat growers of the inland empire here.

Newton Jenkins of Chicago, attorney for the Illinois Agricultural association, declared that the "farmer has a natural monopoly. He should be able to make use of that monopoly."

Walter J. Robinson, manager of the Washington Wheat Growers' association, said that organization's co-operative marketing plan failed "because it did not take in local farmers' organizations."

ARGUMENT HEARD ON OREGON SCHOOL LAW

Washington, D.C.—The compulsory education law of Oregon, requiring that after September of next year all children between the ages of 8 and 16, with a few exceptions, shall attend public schools, was reached in the supreme court Monday for oral argument in two cases brought by the state to have set aside the injunction of the federal district court against its enforcement.

Although it was thought the cases might not bring a sweeping opinion from the court on the constitutional right of states to control the education of children within their borders, the controversy has attracted wide attention in education and religious circles. The array of counsel brought into court included former Senator George E. Chamberlain, W. S. Moore, A. H. Putney and P. Q. Nyce for the state, William W. Guthrie, for the society of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, and John C. Veatch, for the Hill Military academy.

State Court is Upheld Washington, D. C.—Persons charged with violating the Volstead act can be tried in state courts, the supreme court declared in substance, dismissal for want of jurisdiction a case brought from Humboldt county, California.

Chicago Malady on Wane Falling Off in Influenza-Pneumonia Cases Shown. Chicago.—Chicago's influenza-pneumonia attack appeared on the wane, when reports to the city health department showed a marked falling off in the number of deaths and new cases.

The last available record shows a total of 800 deaths since March 1. Approximately 100 new cases of the malady, which affects the respiratory organs and brings on influenza and pneumonia, were reported during the same period.

Isle of Pines Treaty Ratified. Washington, D. C.—The senate ratified the Isle of Pines treaty with minor reservations; sent the Lausanne treaty to re-establish relations with Turkey back to committee and voted 74 to 2, to make the world court question a special order for next December 17.

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GERMANY INVITED TO ENTER LEAGUE

Move Thought Significant in Developing Future Harmony in Europe.

Geneva.—The league of nations council, closing the most important meeting in its history with what is generally admitted to be a constructive move of great significance for future harmony in Europe, adjourned after expressing a sincere wish to see Germany associated in its labors by joining the league and thus play in the organization of peace a part corresponding to Germany's position in the world.

This action is deemed significant because it represents the first word addressed to Germany by the allies on a basis of perfect equality. Germans here following the council proceedings are openly pleased at the prospect of the letter which the council has sent to the Berlin government.

The league of nations disarmament and security protocol, put out of present consideration, at least, by the rejection of it, voiced by Great Britain on behalf of herself and all her dominions except Ireland, was referred by the council of the league to the next league assembly, together with the pronouncements made upon it by the British and representatives of other powers.

SIGNERS OF RECALL WIN

Keelo City Attorney's Charge of Libel Not Sustained. Keelo, Wash.—Judge Campbell of Grays Harbor county, sitting for Judge Kirby, sustained the demurrer filed by Attorney Casey for 14 defendants charged with criminal libel for signing the recall charges against City Attorney Stone. Judge Campbell held that the right to sign a recall charge is the privilege conferred by the statutes and that a signer of recall charges must not be guilty of libel, even though the recall charge is untrue.

The decision will be appealed to the supreme court by Mr. Stone, who was charged with "conspiracy with liquor law violation" in the recall petitions.

Arms Parley Resolution is Offered. Washington, D. C.—Senator Shipstead, farmer-labor, Minnesota, introduced a resolution declaring the senate in readiness to receive from President Coolidge proposals for concluding international agreements for the limitation of armaments, for the prohibition of warfare and for codification of the rules of warfare. The resolution was ordered to lie on the table.
