Historic Stage Coach Now on View at DeMoss

Several improvements have been added to DeMoss park during the past year by R. C. Byers, chairman of the county park commission. A wide foot bridge 40 feet long has been built over the swale in the park and new buildings built. One of the new buildings was built by the DeMoss brothers to house their old historic western stage coach, built on one of their early tours of the western states. This coach is the same one in which Horace Greeley made a speaking tour of the west and also the one made famous by the writings of Mark Twain. The building in which the coach is housed has glass enclosed sides through which it can be viewed without damage caused by relic hunters.
