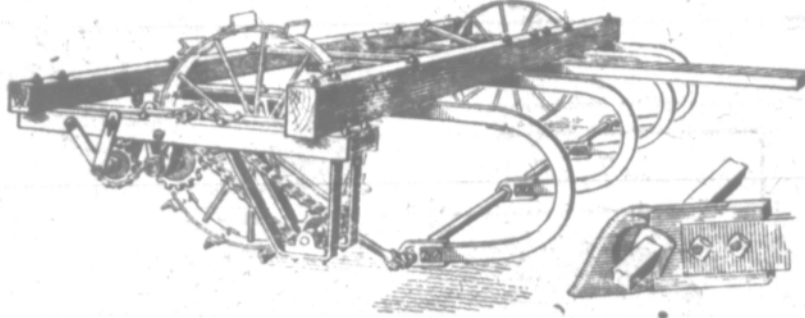

## Board of Regents O.A.C. to Visit Moro

The board of regents of O. A. C. will be at Moro Tuesday afternoon, June 30th, to inspect the local experiment station. They will arrive in time for lunch, spend the afternoon on the station, and remain in Moro Tuesday night.

The Moro Community club is sponsoring a banquet in honor of the visit of the board to which any citizen of the county—and his wife—are invited to attend. Those who desire to avail themselves of the opportunity to meet with the club are asked to notify the secretary, I. M. Peterson, so that the club and hotel management will know how many to arrange for at the banquet. The charge will be 75 cents a plate. Notification should be made not later than Tuesday morning.

The members of the board of regents who are expected are J. K. Weatherford, Albany, president; Jefferson Myers, Portland; E. E. Wilson, Corvallis; Sam Brown, Gervais; E. B. Aldrich, Pendleton; E. A. Palmer, Hood River; Mrs. W. S. Kinney, Astoria. Director J. T. Jardine of Corvallis and Governor Pierce are also expected to be numbered in the party.

Glenn McLachlin, eldest son of D. J. McLachlin received a broken cheek bone Monday when a horse on a harrow team kicked him in the face. The boy was harrowing on the McLachlin farm when a single tree became twisted. When he stooped to unhitch the trace to straighten it out the horse became frightened and the injury resulted. The boy was brought to Moro for treatment by Dr. Froyd who was with L. D. Eaton in The Dalles. Not finding Dr. Froyd at Moro, Mr. McLachlin had his son taken to Dr. Wonderlick at Wasco.

E. E. Barnum was in town Thursday from The Dalles. He has just returned from Pueblo, Colorado, where he was called when his son Lester was recently shot by the police of that city. The affair was caused by misunderstanding on the part of young Barnum. He had arrived in the town late at night, on his way home to The Dalles, and when called upon to halt started to run, whereupon the police shot at and hit him. It was subsequently proven that he was not connected in any way with any crime venture.

Supt. D. E. Stephens left for Portland on Thursday to meet with W. M. Jardine, federal secretary of agriculture. Secretary Jardine and Supt. Stephens were raised in the same community in southern Utah and were also college classmates. Secretary Jardine, while not able to visit Moro experiment station, is no stranger to either Moro or the station. He has visited here a number of times when connected with the work of O. A. C. and helped establish the station in 1909.

Mr. Lyman was surprised to find that Dr. J. A. Wonderlick had just preceded him in locating at Wasco. They are old time friends and were neighbor boys on farms in Washington county.

Victor S. McDonald and wife, from Long Beach, California, were visitors in Moro this week on a motor trip to their old home at Walla Walla. Mr. McDonald is a cousin of R. J. Ginn and Neil McDonald and a former resident of Sherman county having moved from here 33 years ago. When a resident of Sherman county, Mr. McDonald owned and farmed the land now owned by P. J. Dillinger.

## Arlington People Plan Big July Celebration

The business men of Arlington are making every possible preparation for staging one of the snappiest 4th of July celebrations ever held in that city.

Special features of the days program will include a 24-round boxing card, open air exercises, a ball game between Condon and Arlington, parade, sports, races, dancing, bucking contest and many special stunts and amusements.

A dozen special committees are at work on the various features of the program. Realizing that it was Arlington's turn to celebrate this year, and finding out that the neighbor towns were expecting a big day at Arlington, the people have set about the job in earnest and intend to offer the thousands of visitors just as lively a program and as good a time as is possible.

Receipts of the public service commission from the gross earnings tax on public utilities are reduced nearly 50 per cent under the interpretation of the law made by Attorney-General Van Winkle. The opinion holds that the tax applies only to purely intrastate business and that any income of the utilities from interstate business having an origin in Oregon cannot be taxed.

Governor Pierce will be asked to call a special session of the Oregon legislature to further the Roosevelt highway. The movement was started at a meeting of the North Bend chamber of commerce, when a resolution was adopted to that effect. Other bodies along the route of the Roosevelt highway will be asked to join in the resolution asking the governor to the session.

## IN MEMORIAM

Louis David Eaton, resident farmer living southwest of Grass Valley, died at a hospital in The Dalles Tuesday morning from an attack of intestinal obstruction. Funeral services were conducted from Moro Presbyterian church, Rev. R. A. Feenstra preaching the sermon Wednesday afternoon. Interment being in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at this place, under the auspices of the Masonic lodge of Grass Valley, of which Mr. Eaton was a member.

Louis David Eaton was born August 1st, 1858, at Travers City, Michigan. He was married to Lissa Hampton October, 1889. He is survived by a son, Karl Eaton of Grass Valley; a sister, Mrs. Ella Thompson, living at Oswego; a brother, Darwin Eaton, and a sister, Mrs. Harriett Thompson, both living in British Columbia; and two grand children.

A total registration of 3371 regular enrolled students with a grand total of 4651, including summer session and short courses, is reported by the registrar of the Oregon agricultural college for the school year just closed.

A contract under which the state fish commission was to employ Hugh Mitchell, director of hatcheries, for four years at a monthly salary of \$350, is invalid, according to a legal opinion handed down by the attorney general.

The Cascades were pierced by a 3650-foot tunnel Friday when two crews of workers met under the summit of the mountains near the north west end of Odell lake, completing the longest tunnel of the Eugene-Klamath Falls line.

Mayor Keizer of North Bend refuses to accept the resignation of Chief of Police Jackson, who, he says is too valuable a man for the city to lose. Chief Jackson resigned when the city council ordered a reduction in his allowance for automobile upkeep.

The first lookouts in the Stuslav national forest for the season were instructed to take their posts by Ralph S. Shelley, supervisor of the forest. A new lookout tower is being built on Belle mountain in Tillamook county and a new telephone line is being built to the station.
