Reports received at the offices of the state forestry department in Salem indicate that most of the timber fires are now under control.

Work of filling in the city of Reedport with dredgings from the Umpqua and Schofield rivers is under way.

A fine brown sand is being obtained from the Umpqua river channel for the fill, which dries off as soon as pumping stops. This project will cost nearly \$100,000.

Representatives of the Housewives' council of Portland, the state grange, Umatilla Rapids' association and a number of other organizations held a meeting in Salem to discuss proposed legislation authorizing the development of hydroelectric power in Oregon under state supervision.

Of the \$350,000 lent wheat farmers in the frost-damaged areas of Oregon under an act of the 1925 legislature \$193,452 has been paid back together with interest at the rate of 5 per cent. With the exception of those in Morrow county all loans returned to the state have been paid in full.

A rich gold strike, thought to be the famous Beavert creek mine of the early days of Crook county, was reported 17 miles from Paulina on the line between Crook county and Grant county. Already more than a dozen claims have been staked. The find was made by G. P. Lee, veteran sheep man.

Major Colner of the army engineers' office of Portland has designated September 10 for a hearing in Marshfield on the proposal to bridge Coos bay between Marshfield and East Side with a bascule bridge costing \$300,000. The people of Coos county voted in favor of the bridge at a special election July 13.

Edward Osterander, member of the public service commission, is in Chicago to attend a conference involving the western railroads' application for an increase in rates. It originally was proposed to request an increase in rates of approximately 11 per cent, but this figure recently was reduced to 5 per cent.
