**OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST**

**Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.**

September exports from Portland represented a combined value of \$6,559,234.

The newly constructed union high school at Nehalem was dedicated Friday evening.

Dr. C. M. Dodson, 83, for 43 years a prominent citizen of Baker, died at his home in that city.

The Douglas & Taylor furniture store at Corvallis was damaged to the extent of \$8000 by fire.

The Anderson & Middleton Lumber company of Cottage Grove has doubled its woods crew at Rajada.

An average of 300 cases of salmon daily are being packed at the Allen & Hendrickson cannery at Rainier.

Portland bank clearings for September were the greatest for any month this year, aggregating \$177,130,874.95.

Mrs. Mary Morrison, 65, committed suicide by hanging herself to a rafter in the attic of the P. E. Allen home at Nehalem.

A thousand cases of Lane county canned pears have just been shipped to London, England, by the Eugene Fruit Growers' association.

In a raid upon lodging houses and places of business at Oakridge, five men and three women were arrested on charges of selling liquor.

Latest reports issued by E. B. Lemon, registrar, give a total of 1153 students registered for the fall term at the Oregon Agricultural college.

Dr. J. M. Kavanaugh of Pendleton has been appointed coroner of Umatilla county by the county court. He succeeds the late Dr. H. S. Garfield.

Eugene bank clearings made another record in September. The total for the month was \$2,778,223.02, and \$20,122,997 for the first nine months of the year.

Directors of the Bend Commercial club have approved plans for an industrial survey of Bend and the trade territory in central Oregon tributary to Bend.

The first radio fog signal to be installed on land in the 17th lighthouse district probably will go into operation on Cape Blanco some time in November.

Sidney Shaw, 28, of Long Creek, who with his wife was engaged as an apple picker, committed suicide at the Odell orchard home of W. L. Spierbon at Hood River.

A price of \$11 per ton for alfalfa hay in the stack has been fairly well established in several localities in Umatilla county by purchases made by livestock men.

September had the largest total of building permits of any month in the history of Medford, \$229,090 worth of permits having been granted by the city building department.

Because the danger season has passed, protection men have been called in from the Mount Hood forest. Approximately 60 men, including 17 look-outs have been relieved.

The city of Gold Hill has commenced the reconstruction of its water main system with the proceeds from a \$15,000 bond issue. The system was installed more than 25 years ago.

Sale of the Klamath Lumber & Mill Work company to R. P. Ellingson of Hawkins, Wis., was announced at Klamath Falls. The new owner will take over the plant November 14.

The W. A. Woodard Lumber company at Cottage Grove will put into operation at once the mill which was closed down several months ago when its new mill was put into operation.

The largest class ever enrolled in the Oregon Normal school at Month-mouth for a term of the regular school year was registered last week for the fall term, the total enrollment reaching 880.

Work on the south unit of the Sky-line trail is still being rushed, with Ranger J. A. Graham in charge of 45 men, and the work will continue until now comes. This government work is being pushed to make that section of the Mount Hood national forest accessible for fire fighters in the dangerous season.

**KELSO MYSTERY BELIEVED SOLVED**

**Officials Arrest One Man in Connection With Dovery Murder.**

Kelso, Wash. — With the arrest of one man and the statement of officers late Sunday night, the mystery of the Thomas Dovery murder in Kelso on June 19, is believed solved.

Luke S. May, Seattle criminologist engaged by the county to investigate the murder, and Sheriff Clark Studebaker made a trip into Oregon Saturday and arrested one W. L. Thompson, alias William Reese, working in a railroad camp about 70 miles from Eugene. He was brought to the county jail.

Thomas Dovery was killed for purposes of robbery and revenge by a gang of itinerant "petty crooks and tinhorn sports," and not for political purposes, it was announced.

John W. Smith, Portland police character, and itinerant prizefighter promoter, whose efforts to stage a prizefight in Kelso were blocked by Dovery and his associates, was named as one of the actual killers by Luke S. May. Requests for Smith's apprehension are being broadcast over the country by Sheriff Studebaker of Cowlitz county.

It was on the slender clue of a stolen revolver, discarded by the murderer after the killing, that Mr. May based his case. Microscopic examination of the weapon led to the real owner of the revolver, a Portland man. He in turn furnished information which pointed the finger of suspicion at Smith and several of his associates

Survivors Defend Shenandoah Chief Lakehurst, N. J.—The theory of Captain Anton Heinen, veteran airplane pilot, that the primary cause of the Shenandoah disaster was a failure of Commander Zachary Lansdowne and other officers to heed obvious danger signals, was disputed by two survivors who testified before the naval court of inquiry. The survivors were Colonel C. G. Hall, army service observer on board, and Lieutenant Joseph B. Anderson, the ship's aerologist. Anderson said that Heinen's whole theory was based upon inadequate and erroneous information while Colonel Hall said emphatically that had he been in command of the Shenandoah he would have taken no course of action different from that which Commander Lansdowne followed.

**LEGIONNAIRES GREET CHIEF**

President Visits Omaha to Address and Review Ex-Service Men.  
 Omaha, Neb. — President Coolidge came to Omaha Tuesday to address the American Legion convention and review the annual legion parade.

The president and Mrs. Coolidge were greeted at Union station by James A. Drain, national commander of the American Legion, whose wife had come from Washington on the presidential train, Governor McMulien of Nebraska, Mayor Dahlman of Omaha, and a score of prominent citizens and legion officials. Hundreds of former service men jammed the train shed and station, and as the president passed they all cheered.

President Coolidge, addressing the American Legion convention, declared that the result of the World war will be lost and the nations of the world will prepare for another conflict unless racial antagonisms are demolished and a universal attitude of toleration is created.

"If our country is to have any position of leadership," he added, "I trust it may be in that direction, and I believe that the place where it should begin is at home."

Boston Man Named Fleet Head.  
 Washington, D. C.—Leigh Q. Palmer was removed Tuesday as president of the Emergency Fleet corporation and Elmer Crowley of Boston was named to succeed him. The action was taken by the Shipping Board and with other changes announced, amounted to a general shake-up in the fleet corporation personnel.

State Fair Receipts Break Record.
